Mr. STUMP introduced the following joint resolution; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States to provide for 4-year terms for Representatives and to provide that no person may serve as a Representative for more than 12 years.

1 Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives 2 of the United States of America in Congress assembled 3 (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the fol-4 lowing article is proposed as an amendment to the Con-5 stitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all 6 intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when 7 ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission
 by the Congress:

"ARTICLE—

4 "SECTION 1. The term of office of a Representative,
5 other than a term of office of a Representative served by
6 virtue of an election or appointment to fill a vacancy, shall
7 be 4 years, beginning with the first election of Representa8 tives occurring after this article becomes operative.

9 "SECTION 2. No person may serve more than 12 10 years as a Representative. However, this Article shall not 11 prevent any person holding the office of Representative 12 during the term within which this article becomes opera-13 tive from holding the office of Representative during the 14 remainder of such term.

15 "SECTION 3. For purposes of this article, time served
16 as a Representative by virtue of an election or appoint17 ment to fill a vacancy shall not be included in determining
18 the number of years a person has served as a Representa19 tive.".
