Mr. Kleczka introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Commerce

A BILL

Prohibiting the manufacture, sale, delivery, or importation of school buses that do not have seat belts.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. PROHIBITION.
- 4 No person shall manufacture, sell, deliver, or import
- 5 any school bus, constructed after the effective date of this
- 6 Act, for use by a person described in section 2 to provide
- 7 transportation service, unless such school bus is equipped
- 8 with a seat belt for each passenger riding in such school
- 9 bus.

1 SEC. 2. PERSONS TO WHICH PROHIBITION APPLIES.

- 2 The prohibition set forth in section 1 shall apply to—
- 3 (1) any school bus, as such term is defined in
- 4 section 4221(d)(7)(C) of the Internal Revenue Code
- 5 of 1986; and
- 6 (2) any Federal, State, or local government en-
- 7 tity, school district, or other public or private entity
- 8 providing transportation to passengers by school
- 9 bus.

10 SEC. 3. CIVIL PENALTIES; SECRETARY'S AUTHORITY TO

- 11 **COMPROMISE.**
- 12 (a) Amount of Penalties.—Whoever violates any
- 13 provision of this Act, or any regulation issued thereunder,
- 14 shall be subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$1,000
- 15 for each such violation. A violation with respect to each
- 16 school bus shall constitute a separate violation, except that
- 17 the maximum civil penalty shall not exceed \$800,000 for
- 18 any related series of violations.
- 19 (b) Compromise of Penalties.—Any such civil
- 20 penalty may be compromised by the Secretary of Trans-
- 21 portation. In determining the amount of such penalty, or
- 22 the amount agreed upon in compromise, the appropriate-
- 23 ness of such penalty to the size of the business of the per-
- 24 son charged and the gravity of the violation shall be con-
- 25 sidered.

1 SEC. 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.

- 2 This Act shall take effect 90 days after the date of
- 3 its enactment.
