# A BILL

To amend title 28, United States Code, to allow a judge to whom a case is transferred to retain jurisdiction over certain multidistrict litigation cases for trial.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Multidistrict Trial Ju-
- 5 risdiction Act of 1999".
- 6 SEC. 2. MULTIDISTRICT LITIGATION.
- 7 Section 1407 of title 28, United States Code, is
- 8 amended—

- 1 (1) in the third sentence of subsection (a), by
  2 inserting "or ordered transferred to the transferee
  3 or other district under subsection (i)" after "termi4 nated"; and
- 5 (2) by adding at the end the following new sub-6 section:
- 7 "(i) Any action transferred under this section by the 8 panel may be transferred for trial purposes, by the judge 9 or judges of the transferee district to whom the action was 10 assigned, to the transferee or other district in the interest 11 of justice and for the convenience of the parties and wit-12 nesses.".

### 13 SEC. 3. EFFECTIVE DATE.

The amendments made by this Act shall apply to any 15 civil action pending on or brought on or after the date 16 of the enactment of this Act.
