A BILL

To provide for the establishment of a School Security Technology Center and to authorize grants for local school security programs, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Safe School Security
5 Act of 1999”.

6 **SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF SCHOOL SECURITY TECH-** 7 **NOLOGY CENTER.**

8 (a) SCHOOL SECURITY TECHNOLOGY CENTER.—

1 (1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Attorney General,
2 the Secretary of Education, and the Secretary of
3 Energy shall enter into an agreement for the estab-
4 lishment at the Sandia National Laboratories, in
5 partnership with the National Law Enforcement and
6 Corrections Technology Center—Southeast, of a cen-
7 ter to be known as the “School Security Technology
8 Center”. The School Security Technology Center
9 shall be administered by the Attorney General.

10 (2) FUNCTIONS.—The School Security Tech-
11 nology Center shall be a resource to local edu-
12 cational agencies for school security assessments, se-
13 curity technology development, technology avail-
14 ability and implementation, and technical assistance
15 relating to improving school security. In addition,
16 the Center shall provide a free information service,
17 using print, electronic media, and the Internet, for
18 schools, principals, school security officers, parent-
19 teacher associations, and community safety groups,
20 regarding comprehensive technical or non-technical
21 measures to improve security.

22 (b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
23 authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section—

24 (1) \$3,600,000 for fiscal year 2000;

25 (2) \$3,700,000 for fiscal year 2001; and

1 (3) \$3,800,000 for fiscal year 2002.

2 **SEC. 3. INFORMATION SERVICES FOR SAFETY.**

3 Section 4116(a)(1)(B) of the Safe and Drug-Free
4 Schools and Communities Act of 1994 (20 U.S.C.
5 7116(a)(1)(B)) is amended by inserting after “safety” the
6 following: “and include the establishment or expansion of
7 a free information service, using print, electronic media,
8 and the Internet, for parents, principals, school security
9 officers, parent-teacher associations, and community safe-
10 ty groups regarding comprehensive technical and non-
11 technical measures to improve safety”.

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
