Mr. UDALL of Colorado introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Resources

## A BILL

To designate the James Peak Wilderness in the Arapaho National Forest in the State of Colorado, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- This Act may be cited as the "James Peak Wilder-
- 5 ness Act of 1999".
- 6 SEC. 2. DESIGNATION OF JAMES PEAK WILDERNESS, COLO-
- 7 RADO.
- 8 (a) Inclusion With Other Colorado Wilder-
- 9 NESS AREAS.—Section 2(a) of the Colorado Wilderness
- 10 Act of 1993 (Public Law 103–77; 107 Stat. 756) is

- 1 amended by adding at the end the following new para-
- 2 graph:
- 3 "(20) Certain lands in the Arapaho National
- 4 Forest which comprise approximately 22,000 acres,
- 5 as generally depicted on a map entitled 'Proposed
- 6 James Peak Wilderness', dated June 1999 and
- 7 which shall be known as the James Peak Wilder-
- 8 ness.".
- 9 (b) Map and Boundary Descriptions.—As soon
- 10 as practicable after the date of enactment of this Act, the
- 11 Secretary of Agriculture shall file with the Committee on
- 12 Resources of the House of Representatives and the Com-
- 13 mittee on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate
- 14 a map and a boundary description of the James Peak Wil-
- 15 derness. The map and boundary description shall have the
- 16 same force and effect as if included in the Colorado Wil-
- 17 derness Act of 1993, except that the Secretary may cor-
- 18 rect clerical and typographical errors in the map and
- 19 boundary descriptions. The map and boundary description
- 20 shall be on file and available for public inspection in the
- 21 Office of the Chief of the Forest Service, Department of
- 22 Agriculture.
- 23 SEC. 3. INHOLDINGS IN JAMES PEAK WILDERNESS.
- 24 (a) State Land Board Lands.—If the Colorado
- 25 State Land Board informs the Secretary of Agriculture

- 1 that the Board is willing to transfer to the United States
- 2 some or all of the lands owned by the Board located within
- 3 the James Peak Wilderness in the Arapaho National For-
- 4 est, Colorado, the Secretary shall promptly seek to reach
- 5 agreement with the Board regarding terms and conditions
- 6 for acquisition of the lands by the United States by pur-
- 7 chase or exchange.
- 8 (b) Jim Creek Inholding.—The Secretary of Agri-
- 9 culture shall enter into negotiations with the owner of
- 10 lands located within the portion of the Jim Creek drainage
- 11 within the James Peak Wilderness for the purpose of ac-
- 12 quiring the lands by purchase or exchange.
- 13 (c) Report.—Upon conclusion of an agreement for
- 14 acquisition by the United States of lands referred to in
- 15 subsection (a) or (b), or one year after the date of enact-
- 16 ment of this Act, whichever occurs first, the Secretary of
- 17 Agriculture shall submit to the Committee on Resources
- 18 of the House of Representatives and the Committee on
- 19 Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate a report con-
- 20 cerning any such agreement or the status of negotiations
- 21 pursuant to such subsections. The report shall indicate to
- 22 what extent funds are available to the Secretary as of the
- 23 date of the report for the acquisition of the lands and
- 24 whether additional funds need to be appropriated or other-
- 25 wise made available to the Secretary for such purpose.

### 1 SEC. 4. ALICE TOWNSHIP AND ST. MARY'S GLACIER, COLO-

- 2 RADO.
- 3 (a) Services and Facilities.—Following the con-
- 4 sultation required by subsection (c), the Forest Supervisor
- 5 of the Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forests in the
- 6 State of Colorado (in this section referred to as the "For-
- 7 est Supervisor") shall establish a trailhead and cor-
- 8 responding facilities and services to regulate use of Na-
- 9 tional Forest System lands adjacent to Alice Township
- 10 and St. Mary's Glacier in the State of Colorado. The facili-
- 11 ties and services shall include, but are not limited to, the
- 12 following:
- 13 (1) Trailhead parking.
- 14 (2) Public restroom accommodations.
- 15 (3) Trailhead and trail maintenance.
- 16 (b) Personnel.—The Forest Supervisor shall assign
- 17 Forest Service personnel to provide appropriate manage-
- 18 ment and oversight of the area described in subsection (a).
- 19 (c) Consultation.—The Forest Supervisor shall
- 20 consult with the Clear Creek County Commissioners and
- 21 residents in the immediate vicinity of Alice Township and
- 22 St. Mary's Glacier regarding the appropriate location of
- 23 facilities and services in the area described in subsection
- 24 (a). This consultation should include any other appro-
- 25 priate measures that may be needed in this area to provide
- 26 access by emergency or law enforcement vehicles or that

- 1 is necessary for public health or that impede access by
- 2 local residents.
- 3 (d) Report.—After the consultation required by sub-
- 4 section (b), the Forest Supervisor shall submit to the
- 5 Committee on Resources and the Committee on Appro-
- 6 priations of the House of Representatives and the Com-
- 7 mittee on Energy and Natural Resources and the Com-
- 8 mittee on Appropriations of the Senate a report regarding
- 9 the amount of any additional funding required to imple-
- 10 ment appropriate measures to provide the facilities and
- 11 services specified in subsections (a), (b), and (c).

#### 12 SEC. 5. POTENTIAL WILDERNESS LANDS.

- 13 (a) Definition.—In this section, the term "potential
- 14 wilderness lands" means lands that are identified as "po-
- 15 tential wilderness" on the map referred to in paragraph
- 16 (20) of section 2(a) of the Colorado Wilderness Act of
- 17 1993, as added by section 2(a) of this Act, designating
- 18 the James Peak Wilderness in the Arapaho National For-
- 19 est, Colorado.
- 20 (b) Management.—Potential wilderness lands shall
- 21 be managed as components of the National Wilderness
- 22 Preservation System upon publication in the Federal Reg-
- 23 ister of a notice by the Secretary of Agriculture that all
- 24 structures on the lands have been removed and all uses

- 1 of the lands inconsistent with the Wilderness Act (16
- 2 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.) have ceased.
- 3 (c) Removal of Radio Tower.—As soon as prac-
- 4 ticable after the date of enactment of this Act, the Sec-
- 5 retary of Agriculture shall remove the abandoned radio
- 6 tower and associated structures located on Mount Eva on
- 7 the potential wilderness lands.
