Mr. RILEY (for himself, Mr. SOUDER, Mr. COOKSEY, Mr. THUNE, and Mr. BRADY of Texas) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on House Administration, and in addition to the Committee on Government Reform, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To eliminate automatic pay adjustments for Members of Congress.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Congressional Pay In-
5 tegrity and Accountability Act of 1999”.

6 **SEC. 2. ELIMINATION OF AUTOMATIC PAY ADJUSTMENTS.**

7 Section 601(a) of the Legislative Reorganization Act
8 of 1946 (2 U.S.C. 31) is amended to read as follows:

1 “SEC. 601. (a) Until adjusted under section 225 of
2 the Federal Salary Act of 1967 (2 U.S.C. 351 and follow-
3 ing) or other provision of law, the annual rate of pay for—

4 “(1) each Senator, Member of the House of
5 Representatives, and Delegate to the House of Rep-
6 resentatives, and the Resident Commissioner from
7 Puerto Rico,

8 “(2) the President pro tempore of the Senate,
9 the majority leader and the minority leader of the
10 Senate, and the majority leader and the minority
11 leader of the House of Representatives, and

12 “(3) the Speaker of the House of Representa-
13 tives,

14 shall be the rate payable for such position as of the date
15 of enactment of the Congressional Pay Integrity and Ac-
16 countability Act of 1999.”.

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
