Mr. Romero-Barceló introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Banking and Financial Services

A BILL

To authorize the President to award a gold medal on behalf of the Congress to Senator John Herschel Glenn, Jr., in recognition of his outstanding and enduring contributions toward American society for more than fifty years.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "John Glenn Congres-
- 5 sional Gold Medal Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress finds that—

1	(1) John Herschel Glenn, Jr., was born on July
2	18, 1921, in Cambridge, Ohio;
3	(2) before he started school, John Glenn and
4	his family moved to nearby New Concord, Ohio;
5	(3) John Glenn graduated from New Concord
6	High School and enrolled in Muskingum College;
7	(4) John Glenn enlisted in the Naval Aviation
8	Cadet Program shortly after the attack on Pearl
9	Harbor and was commissioned in the United States
10	Marine Corps in 1943;
11	(5) John Glenn served in combat in the South
12	Pacific and also requested combat duty during the
13	Korean conflict;
14	(6) as a dedicated military officer, John Glenn
15	flew 149 missions during two wars;
16	(7) John Glenn received many honors for his
17	military service, including the Distinguished Flying
18	Cross on six occasions and the Air Medal with 18
19	clusters;
20	(8) John Glenn served several years as a test
21	pilot on Navy and Marine Corps jet fighters and at-
22	tack aircraft;
23	(9) as a test pilot, John Glenn set a trans-
24	continental speed record in 1957 by completing the

1	first flight to average supersonic speeds from Los
2	Angeles to New York;
3	(10) as a pioneer in the unknown realm of
4	space exploration, John Glenn was selected in 1959
5	as one of the original seven astronauts in the United
6	States space program;
7	(11) John Glenn on February 20, 1962, became
8	the first American to orbit the earth, completing
9	three orbits in a five-hour flight;
10	(12) John Glenn retired from the Marine Corps
11	in 1965 after 23 years of distinguished service to his
12	country;
13	(13) John Glenn became an outstanding busi-
14	ness executive in his native State of Ohio and also
15	took an active part in politics and in early environ-
16	mental protection efforts;
17	(14) John Glenn won his Senate seat in 1974
18	while carrying all 88 Ohio counties in the election;
19	(15) John Glenn won re-election to the Senate
20	in 1980 and in 1986, and in 1992 John Glenn made
21	history by becoming the first popularly elected Sen-
22	ator from Ohio to win four consecutive terms;
23	(16) John Glenn has set a proud example for
24	all Americans as a husband, father, and family man;

- 1 (17) John Glenn in 1998 returned to space 2 after 36 years as a member of the crew of the space 3 shuttle Discovery, serving as a payload specialist and 4 as a subject for basic research on how weightlessness 5 affects the body of an older person;
- 6 (18) having retired from the Senate after 24 7 years of distinguished service, John Glenn has given 8 the United States five decades of dedicated patriot-9 ism, valor, and leadership; and
- 10 (19) John Glenn is a man of vision and a man 11 of action who has greatly inspired the people of the 12 United States and who will serve as a powerful role 13 model for the new millennium.

14 SEC. 3. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.

- 15 (a) Presentation Authorized.—The President is 16 authorized to present, on behalf of the Congress, to Sen-17 ator John Herschel Glenn, Jr., a gold medal of appro-18 priate design, in recognition of his significant contribu-19 tions to American society for more than fifty years.
- 20 (b) Design and Striking.—For purposes of the 21 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary 22 of the Treasury shall strike a gold medal with suitable em- 23 blems, devices, and inscriptions, to be determined by the 24 Secretary.

- 1 (c) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATION.—Effective
- 2 February 1, 1999, there are authorized to be appropriated
- 3 \$30,000 to carry out this section.

4 SEC. 4. DUPLICATE MEDALS.

- 5 (a) STRIKING AND SALE.—The Secretary of the
- 6 Treasury may strike and sell duplicates in bronze of the
- 7 gold medal struck pursuant to section 3 under such regu-
- 8 lations as the Secretary may prescribe, at a price sufficient
- 9 to cover the cost thereof, including labor, materials, dies,
- 10 use of machinery, and overhead expenses, and the cost of
- 11 the gold medal.
- 12 (b) Reimbursement of Appropriation.—The ap-
- 13 propriation used to carry out section 3 shall be reimbursed
- 14 out of the proceeds of sales under subsection (a).
- 15 SEC. 5. NATIONAL MEDALS.
- 16 The medals struck pursuant to this Act are national
- 17 medals for purposes of chapter 51 of title 31, United
- 18 States Code.
