5	The Bretton Woods Agreements Act (22 U.S.C. 286–
6	286mm) is amended by adding at the end the following:
7	"SEC. 61. CONDITIONAL OPPOSITION OF THE UNITED
8	STATES TO FUND AND BANK LOANS TO INDO-
9	NESIA.
10	"The Secretary of the Treasury shall instruct the
11	United States Executive Directors at the Fund and the
12	Bank to use the voice, vote, and influence of the United
13	States to oppose the provision by the Fund or the Bank
14	of any new loan, any extension of any existing loan, and
15	any payment remaining to be made on any existing loan,
16	to the Government of Indonesia, until the President of the
17	United States is satisfied that the violence and human
18	rights violations in East Timor that have resulted from
19	the August 30, 1999, referendum on independence for
20	East Timor have been ended.".

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
