A BILL

- To impose an immediate suspension of assistance to the Government of Indonesia until the results of the August 30, 1999, vote in East Timor have been implemented, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "East Timor Self-Deter-

5 mination Act of 1999".

1 SEC. 2. FINDING; PURPOSE.

2 (a) CONGRESSIONAL FINDING.—Congress recognizes
3 that the Government of Indonesia took a positive and con4 structive step by agreeing on September 12, 1999, to the
5 deployment of an international peacekeeping force to East
6 Timor.

7 (b) PURPOSE.—The purpose of this Act is to encour-8 age the Government of Indonesia to take such additional 9 steps as are necessary to create a peaceful environment 10 in which the United Nations Assistance Mission in East 11 Timor (UNAMET) can fulfill its mandate and implement 12 the results of the August 30, 1999, vote on East Timor's 13 political status.

14 SEC. 3. SUSPENSION OF ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE.

15 (a) Multilateral Economic Assistance.—

16 (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in sub-17 section (c), the Secretary of the Treasury shall in-18 struct the United States executive directors to the 19 international financial institutions to oppose, and 20 vote against, any extension by those institutions of 21 any financial assistance (including any technical as-22 sistance or grant) of any kind to the Government of 23 Indonesia.

24 (2) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of
25 Congress that the international financial institutions
26 should withhold the balance of any undisbursed ap•HR 2895 IH

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proved loans or other assistance to the Government
 of Indonesia.

3 (3) INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS 4 DEFINED.—In this subsection, the term "international financial institution" includes the Inter-5 6 national Monetary Fund, the International Bank for 7 Reconstruction and Development, the International 8 Development Association, the International Finance 9 Corporation, the Multilateral Investment Guaranty 10 Agency, and the Asian Development Bank.

11 (b) RESTRICTION ON BILATERAL ECONOMIC ASSIST-12 ANCE.—Except as provided in subsection (c), none of the 13 funds appropriated or otherwise made available to carry out chapter 1 of part I (relating to development assist-14 15 ance) or chapter 4 of part II (relating to economic support fund assistance) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 16 17 may be available for Indonesia, except subject to the pro-18 cedures applicable to reprogramming notifications under 19 section 634A of that Act.

(c) EXCEPTION.—Subsections (a) and (b) shall not
apply to the provision of humanitarian assistance (such
as food or medical assistance) to Indonesia or East Timor.
(d) CONDITIONS FOR TERMINATION.—The measures
described in subsections (a) and (b) shall apply until the
President determines and certifies to the appropriate con-

1	gressional committees that the Government of Indonesia
2	is cooperating with efforts by the international community
3	to establish a safe and secure environment in East Timor
4	and is taking significant steps to—
5	(1) end the violence perpetrated by units of the
6	Indonesian armed forces and by armed militias op-
7	posed to the independence of East Timor;
8	(2) enable displaced persons and refugees to re-
9	turn home;
10	(3) ensure freedom of movement within East
11	Timor, including access by humanitarian organiza-
12	tions to all areas of East Timor; and
13	(4) enable UNAMET to resume its mandate,
14	without threat or intimidation to its personnel.
15	SEC. 4. SUSPENSION OF SECURITY ASSISTANCE.
16	(a) Prohibitions on Cooperation and Sup-
17	PORT.—
18	(1) Assistance.—None of the funds appro-
19	priated or otherwise made available under the fol-
20	lowing provisions of law (including unexpended bal-
21	ances of prior year appropriations) may be available
22	for Indonesia:
23	(A) The Foreign Military Financing Pro-
24	gram under section 23 of the Arms Export
25	Control Act.

(B) Chapter 2 of part II of the Foreign
 Assistance Act of 1961 (relating to military assistance).

4 (C) Chapter 5 of part II of the Foreign 5 Assistance Act of 1961 (relating to inter-6 national military education and training assist-7 ance).

8 (2) LICENSING.—None of the funds appro-9 priated or otherwise made available under the fol-10 lowing provisions of law (including unexpended bal-11 ances of prior year appropriations) may be available 12 for licensing exports of defense articles or defense 13 services to Indonesia under section 38 of the Arms 14 Export Control Act.

15 (3) Deliveries.—No defense article or defense 16 service may be exported or delivered to Indonesia or 17 East Timor by any United States person (as defined 18 in section 16 of the Export Administration Act of 19 1979 (50 U.S.C. app. 2415) or any other person 20 subject to the jurisdiction of the United States ex-21 cept as may be necessary to support the operations 22 of an international peacekeeping force in East Timor 23 or in connection with the provision of humanitarian 24 assistance.

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1	(b) Conditions for Termination.—The measures
2	described in subsection (a) shall apply with respect to the
3	Government of Indonesia until the President determines
4	and certifies to the appropriate congressional committees
5	that—
6	(1) a generally safe and secure environment ex-
7	ists in East Timor, including—
8	(A) an end to the violence perpetrated by
9	units of the Indonesian armed forces and by
10	armed militias opposed to the independence of
11	East Timor;
12	(B) the ability of displaced persons and
13	refugees to return home;
14	(C) freedom of movement within East
15	Timor, including access by humanitarian orga-
16	nizations to all areas of East Timor; and
17	(D) the ability of UNAMET to resume its
18	mandate, without threat or intimidation to its
19	personnel;
20	(2) the armed forces of Indonesia clearly—
21	(A) have ceased engaging in violence in
22	East Timor;
23	(B) have ceased their support and training
24	of armed militias opposed to the independence
25	of East Timor; and

1 (C) are withdrawing their forces from East 2 Timor in cooperation with a United Nations-su-3 pervised process of transferring sovereignty 4 from Indonesia to an independent East Timor; 5 and 6 (3) significant steps have been taken to imple-7 ment the results of the August 30, 1999, vote on 8 East Timor's political status, which expressed the 9 will of a majority of the Timorese people. 10 SEC. 5. MULTILATERAL EFFORTS. 11 The President should continue to coordinate with 12 other countries, particularly member states of the Asia-13 Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Forum, to develop a comprehensive, multilateral strategy to further the pur-14 15 poses of this Act, including urging other countries to take measures similar to those described in this Act. 16 17 SEC. 6. APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES DE-18 FINED.

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In this Act, the term "appropriate congressional committees" means the Committee on Foreign Relations and
the Committee on Appropriations of the Senate and the
Committee on International Relations and the Committee
on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

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
