Mr. TOWNS introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Commerce

A BILL

To authorize the Secretary of Health and Human Services to fund adolescent health demonstration projects.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. ESTABLISHMENT OR SUPPORT OF DEM-**
4 **ONSTRATION PROJECTS.**

5 The Secretary of Health and Human Services (here-
6 inafter in this Act referred to as the “Secretary”) shall
7 make grants in fiscal years 2000 through 2004 to public
8 and nonprofit private entities to establish or support ado-
9 lescent health demonstration projects in secondary schools
10 or entities associated with secondary schools for the pur-

pose of demonstrating how such projects may be established throughout the United States.

SEC. 2. PROJECT REQUIREMENTS.

An adolescent health demonstration project established or supported under section 1 shall (1) provide nutrition and hygiene counseling, health care related to sports, family planning information and services, prenatal and postpartum care, family life and parenting counseling, and alcohol and drug abuse education and treatment, (2) serve adolescents before their graduation from high school, (3) encourage family participation, to the extent practical, (4) obtain the approval of the school board in the locality to be served by the project before the project is implemented, (5) furnish such reports and data as the Secretary may require, including, at a minimum, the number and characteristics of individuals served, the services provided, and the results achieved, and (6) establish a community advisory committee to oversee the establishment and implementation of such project. Such community advisory committee shall include students, parents, school personnel, physicians, religious and business leaders, and other community representatives and shall establish policies for the project with respect to the services to be provided under the projects, the populations to be served, the personnel

1 who will provide services, fees to be charged, and other
2 policy issues.

3 **SEC. 3. AREAS TO BE SERVED.**

4 In making grants under section 1, the Secretary shall
5 give priority to applications for projects which will serve
6 areas with low-income residents or minority populations.

7 **SEC. 4. ABORTION RESTRICTION.**

8 None of the funds provided under a grant under sec-
9 tion 1 may be used to perform or pay for abortions.

10 **SEC. 5. REPORT.**

11 The Secretary shall, in each fiscal year, set aside not
12 more than 5 percent of the amount appropriated for
13 grants under section 1 to evaluate the operations of the
14 projects for which grants were made under such section.
15 Not later than December 1, 2004, the Secretary shall re-
16 port to the Congress the result of such evaluation together
17 with such recommendations as the Secretary may have re-
18 specting the extension of the grant authority under section
19 1 or the establishment of a continuing service program.

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
