A BILL

To designate segments and tributaries of White Clay Creek, Delaware and Pennsylvania, as a component of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "White Clay Creek Wild
- 3 and Scenic Rivers System Act".
- 4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

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- 5 Congress finds that—
- 6 (1) Public Law 102–215 (105 Stat. 1664) di-7 rected the Secretary of the Interior, in cooperation 8 and consultation with appropriate State and local 9 governments and affected landowners, to conduct a 10 study of the eligibility and suitability of White Clay 11 Creek, Delaware and Pennsylvania, and the tribu-12 taries of the creek for inclusion in the National Wild 13 and Scenic Rivers System;
 - (2) as a part of the study described in paragraph (1), the White Clay Creek Wild and Scenic Study Task Force and the National Park Service prepared a watershed management plan for the study area entitled "White Clay Creek and Its Tributaries Watershed Management Plan", dated May 1998, that establishes goals and actions to ensure the long-term protection of the outstanding values of, and compatible management of land and water resources associated with, the watershed; and
 - (3) after completion of the study described in paragraph (1), Chester County, Pennsylvania, New Castle County, Delaware, Newark, Delaware, and 12

2	tershed boundaries passed resolutions that—					
3	(A) expressed support for the White Clay					
4	Creek Watershed Management Plan;					
5	(B) expressed agreement to take action to

9	inclusion in the National Wild and Scenic Riv

11	SEC. 3. DESIGNATION OF WHITE CLAY CREEK.					
12	Section 3(a) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16					
13	U.S.C. 1274(a)) is amended by adding at the end the fol-					
14	lowing:					
15	"(162) White Clay Creek, Delaware and Penn-					
16	SYLVANIA.—The 190 miles of river segments of White Clay					
17	Creek (including tributaries of White Clay Creek and all					
18	second order tributaries of the designated segments) in the					
19	States of Delaware and Pennsylvania, as depicted on the					
20	recommended designation and classification maps (dated					
21	June 2000), to be administered by the Secretary of the Inte-					
22	rior, as follows:					
23	"(A) 30.8 miles of the east branch, including					
24	Trout Run, beginning at the headwaters within West					
25	Marlborough township downstream to a point that i					

- 1 500 feet north of the Borough of Avondale wastewater 2 treatment facility, as a recreational river.
- "(B) 15.0 miles of the east branch beginning at 3 the southern boundary line of the Borough of Avondale to a point where the East Branch enters 5 6 New Garden Township at the Franklin Township 7 boundary line, including Walnut Run and Broad 8 Run outside the boundaries of the White Clay Creek 9 Preserve, as a recreational river.
 - "(C) 4.0 miles of the east branch that flow through the boundaries of the White Clay Creek Preserve, Pennsylvania, beginning at the northern boundary line of London Britain township and downstream to the confluence of the middle and east branches, as a scenic river.
 - "(D) 6.8 miles of the middle branch, beginning at the headwaters within Londonderry township downstream to a point that is 500 feet north of the Borough of West Grove wastewater treatment facility, as a recreational river.
 - "(E) 14 miles of the middle branch, beginning at a point that is 500 feet south of the Borough of West Grove wastewater treatment facility downstream to the boundary of the White Clay Creek Preserve in London Britain township, as a recreational river.

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- "(F) 2.1 miles of the middle branch that flow within the boundaries of the White Clay Creek Preserve in London Britain township, as a scenic river.
 - "(G) 17.2 miles of the west branch, beginning at the headwaters within Penn township downstream to the confluence with the middle branch, as a recreational river.
 - "(H) 12.7 miles of the main stem, excluding Lamborn Run, that flow through the boundaries of the White Clay Creek Preserve, Pennsylvania and Delaware, and White Clay Creek State Park, Delaware, beginning at the confluence of the east and middle branches in London Britain township, Pennsylvania, downstream to the northern boundary line of the city of Newark, Delaware, as a scenic river.
 - "(I) 5.4 miles of the main stem (including all second order tributaries outside the boundaries of the White Clay Creek Preserve and White Clay Creek State Park), beginning at the confluence of the east and middle branches in London Britain township, Pennsylvania, downstream to the northern boundary of the city of Newark, Delaware, as a recreational river.

"(J) 16.8 miles of the main stem beginning at 1 2 Paper Mill Road downstream to the Old Route 4 3 bridge, as a recreational river. "(K) 4.4 miles of the main stem beginning at the southern boundary of the property of the corporation 5 6 known as United Water Delaware downstream to the 7 confluence of White Clay Creek with the Christina 8 River, as a recreational river. 9 "(L) 1.3 miles of Middle Run outside the boundaries of the Middle Run Natural Area, as a rec-10 11 reational river. 12 "(M) 5.2 miles of Middle Run that flow within 13 the boundaries of the Middle Run Natural Area, as a 14 scenic river. 15 "(N) 15.6 miles of Pike Creek, as a recreational river. 16 17 "(O) 38.7 miles of Mill Creek, as a recreational 18 river.". 19 SEC. 4. BOUNDARIES. 20 With respect to each of the segments of White Clay 21 Creek and its tributaries designated by the amendment made by section 3, in lieu of the boundaries provided for in section 3(b) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C.

1274(b)), the boundaries of the segment shall be 250 feet

- 1 as measured from the ordinary high water mark on both
- 2 sides of the segment.

3 SEC. 5. ADMINISTRATION.

- 4 (a) By Secretary of the Interior.—The segments
- 5 designated by the amendment made by section 3 shall be
- 6 administered by the Secretary of the Interior (referred to
- 7 in this Act as the "Secretary"), in cooperation with the
- 8 White Clay Creek Watershed Management Committee as
- 9 provided for in the plan prepared by the White Clay Creek
- 10 Wild and Scenic Study Task Force and the National Park
- 11 Service, entitled "White Clay Creek and Its Tributaries Wa-
- 12 tershed Management Plan" and dated May 1998 (referred
- 13 to in this Act as the "Management Plan").
- 14 (b) Requirement for Comprehensive Manage-
- 15 Ment Plan.—The Management Plan shall be considered to
- 16 satisfy the requirements for a comprehensive management
- 17 plan under section 3(d) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act
- 18 (16 U.S.C. 1274(d)).
- 19 (c) Cooperative Agreements.—In order to provide
- 20 for the long-term protection, preservation, and enhancement
- 21 of the segments designated by the amendment made by sec-
- 22 tion 3, the Secretary shall offer to enter into a cooperative
- 23 agreement pursuant to sections 10(c) and 11(b)(1) of the
- 24 Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1281(e), 1282(b)(1))

- 1 with the White Clay Creek Watershed Management Com-
- 2 mittee as provided for in the Management Plan.
- 3 SEC. 6. FEDERAL ROLE IN MANAGEMENT.
- 4 (a) In General.—The Director of the National Park
- 5 Service (or a designee) shall represent the Secretary in the
- 6 implementation of the Management Plan, this Act, and the
- 7 Wild and Scenic Rivers Act with respect to each of the seg-
- 8 ments designated by the amendment made by section 3, in-
- 9 cluding the review, required under section 7(a) of the Wild
- 10 and Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1278(a)), of proposed fed-
- 11 erally-assisted water resources projects that could have a di-
- 12 rect and adverse effect on the values for which the segment
- 13 is designated.
- 14 (b) Assistance.—To assist in the implementation of
- 15 the Management Plan, this Act, and the Wild and Scenic
- 16 Rivers Act with respect to each of the segments designated
- 17 by the amendment made by section 3, the Secretary may
- 18 provide technical assistance, staff support, and funding at
- 19 a cost to the Federal Government in an amount, in the ag-
- 20 gregate, of not to exceed \$150,000 for each fiscal year.
- 21 (c) Cooperative Agreements.—Any cooperative
- 22 agreement entered into under section 10(e) of the Wild and
- 23 Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1281(e)) relating to any of
- 24 the segments designated by the amendment made by section
- 25 3—

1	(1) shall be consistent with the Management					
2	Plan; and					
3	(2) may include provisions for financial or other					
4	assistance from the United States to facilitate th					
5	long-term protection, conservation, and enhancemen					
6	of the segments.					
7	(d) National Park System.—Notwithstanding sec					
8	3 tion 10(c) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C					
9	9 1281(c)), any portion of a segment designated by a					
10	0 amendment made by section 3 that is not in the Nation					
11	Park System as of the date of the enactment of this A					
12	shall not, under this Act—					
13	(1) be considered a part of the National Park					
14	System;					
15	(2) be managed by the National Park Service; or					
16	(3) be subject to laws (including regulations)					
17	that govern the National Park System.					
18	SEC. 7. STATE REQUIREMENTS.					
19	State and local zoning laws and ordinances, as in ef-					
20	fect on the date of the enactment of this Act, shall be consid-					
21	ered to satisfy the standards and requirements under section					
22	6(c) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1277(c)					
23	with respect to the segment designated by the amendment					
24	made by section 3.					

1 SEC. 8. NO LAND ACQUISITION.

- 2 The Federal Government shall not acquire, by any
- 3 means, any right or title in or to land, any easement, or
- 4 any other interest along the segments designated by the
- 5 amendment made by section 3 for the purpose of carrying
- 6 out the amendment or this Act.

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
