### A BILL

- To require the Secretary of the Interior to establish a program to provide assistance in the conservation of neotropical migratory birds.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Neotropical Migratory
3 Bird Conservation Act".

#### 4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

5 The Congress finds the following:

6 (1) Neotropical migratory bird populations in 7 nations within the range of neotropical migratory 8 birds have continued to decline to the point that the 9 long-term survival of various species in the wild is in 10 jeopardy.

(2) 90 North American bird species are listed as
endangered species or threatened species under section
4 of the Endangered Species Act of 1973, and 124
species of migratory birds are currently on the United
States Fish and Wildlife Service's List of Migratory
Nongame Birds of Management Concern.

17 (3) The United States, through 4 bilateral trea18 ties, has responsibility of maintaining healthy popu19 lations of 778 species of migratory nongame birds
20 and 58 species of migratory game birds that migrate
21 between the Caribbean, Latin America, and North
22 America.

23 (4) The Government of Mexico presently lists ap24 proximately 390 bird species as endangered, threat25 ened, vulnerable, or rare.

(5) Healthy bird populations provide important
 economic benefits, such as control of detrimental in sects on agricultural crops, thus preventing the loss of
 millions of dollars each year to farming and timber
 interests.

6 (6) Neotropical migratory birds travel across 7 many international borders, therefore the conservation 8 of these species requires that safeguards be established 9 at both the beginning and end of the migration 10 routes, as well as at essential stopover areas along the 11 way.

(7) Because the challenges facing the conservation of neotropical migratory birds are so great, resources to date have not been sufficient to cope with
continued loss of habitat and the consequent reduction
of neotropical migratory bird populations.

17 (8) To reduce, remove, or otherwise effectively
18 address these threats through the long-term viability
19 of populations of neotropical migratory birds in the
20 wild will require the joint commitment and efforts of
21 nations within the range of neotropical migratory
22 birds and the private sector.

23 (9) A Neotropical Migratory Bird Conservation
24 fund would provide much-needed support for projects
25 aimed at protecting critical habitat for declining mi-

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1	gratory bird species, in an innovative way that pro-
2	motes conservation partnerships and cost sharing
3	through joint Federal and non-Federal support mech-
4	anisms.
5	SEC. 3. PURPOSES.
6	The purposes of this Act are the following:
7	(1) To perpetuate healthy populations of
8	neotropical migratory birds.
9	(2) To assist in the conservation and protection
10	of neotropical migratory birds by supporting con-
11	servation initiatives in Canada, Latin America, and
12	the Caribbean.
13	(3) To provide financial resources and to foster
14	international cooperation for those initiatives.
15	SEC. 4. DEFINITIONS.
16	In this Act:
17	(1) ACCOUNT.—The term "Account" means the
18	Neotropical Migratory Bird Conservation Account es-
19	tablished by section 9(a).
20	(2) Conservation.—The term "conservation"
21	means the use of methods and procedures necessary to
22	bring a species of neotropical migratory bird to the
23	point at which there are sufficient populations in the
24	wild to ensure the long-term viability of the species,
25	including—

1	(A) protection and management of
2	neotropical migratory bird populations;
3	(B) maintenance, management, protection,
4	and restoration of neotropical migratory bird
5	habitat;
6	(C) research and monitoring;
7	(D) law enforcement; and
8	(E) community outreach and education.
9	(3) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
10	the Secretary of the Interior.
11	SEC. 5. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.
12	(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall establish a pro-
13	gram to provide financial assistance for projects outside of
14	the United States to promote the conservation of neotropical
15	migratory birds.
16	(b) PROJECT APPLICANTS.—A project proposal may be
17	submitted by—
18	(1) an individual, corporation, partnership,
19	trust, association, or other private entity;
20	(2) an officer, employee, agent, department, or
21	instrumentality of the Federal Government, of any
22	State, municipality, or political subdivision of a
23	State, or of any foreign government;
24	(3) a State, municipality, or political subdivi-
25	sion of a State;

1	(4) any other entity subject to the jurisdiction of
2	the United States or of any foreign country; and
3	(5) an international organization (as defined in
4	section 1 of the International Organizations Immuni-
5	ties Act (22 U.S.C. 288)).
6	(c) PROJECT PROPOSALS.—To be considered for finan-
7	cial assistance for a project under this Act, an applicant
8	shall submit a project proposal that—
9	(1) includes—
10	(A) the name of the individual responsible
11	for the project;
12	(B) a succinct statement of the purposes of
13	the organization that will conduct the project
14	and of the project;
15	(C) a description of the qualifications of in-
16	dividuals conducting the project; and
17	(D) an estimate of the funds and time nec-
18	essary to complete the project, including sources
19	and amounts of matching funds;
20	(2) demonstrates that the project will enhance
21	the conservation of neotropical migratory bird species
22	in Latin America, the Caribbean, or the United
23	States;

1	(3) includes mechanisms to ensure adequate local
2	public participation in project development and im-
3	plementation;
4	(4) contains assurances that the project will be
5	implemented in consultation with relevant wildlife
6	management authorities and other appropriate gov-
7	ernment officials with jurisdiction over the resources
8	addressed by the project;
9	(5) demonstrates sensitivity to local historic and
10	cultural resources and complies with applicable laws;
11	(6) describes how the project will promote sus-
12	tainable, effective, long-term programs to conserve
13	neotropical migratory birds;
14	(7) provides any other information that the Sec-
15	retary considers to be necessary for evaluating the
16	proposal; and
17	(8) provides assurances of the financial viability
18	of the applicant and the project by providing finan-
19	cial information to prove the applicant's ability to
20	complete the project.
21	(d) Project Reporting.—Each recipient of assist-
22	ance for a project under this Act shall submit to the Sec-
23	retary such periodic reports as the Secretary considers to
24	be necessary. Each report shall include all information re-

quired by the Secretary for evaluating the progress and out-1 2 come of the project. 3 (e) Cost Sharing.— 4 (1) FEDERAL SHARE.—The Federal share of the 5 cost of each project shall be not greater than 33 per-6 cent. 7 (2) Non-federal share.— 8 (A) SOURCE.—The non-Federal share re-9 quired to be paid for a project shall not be de-10 rived from any Federal grant program. 11 (B) FORM OF PAYMENT.—The non-Federal 12 share of the costs of a project carried out with 13 assistance under this Act may be paid in cash 14 or in kind. 15 (f) Purchase of Land Only From Willing Sell-ERS.—Amounts of financial assistance provided under this 16 Act shall not be used to acquire any land or interest in 17 land except from a willing seller. 18 19 SEC. 6. DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY. 20 In carrying out this Act, the Secretary shall— 21 (1) develop guidelines for the solicitation of pro-22 posals for projects eligible for financial assistance 23 under section 5; 24 (2)encourage submission of proposals for 25 projects eligible for financial assistance under section

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1	5, particularly proposals from relevant wildlife man-
2	agement authorities;
3	(3) select proposals for financial assistance that
4	satisfy the requirements of section 5, giving priority
5	to proposals that address conservation needs not ade-
6	quately addressed by existing efforts and that are sup-
7	ported by relevant wildlife management authorities;
8	and
9	(4) generally implement this Act in accordance
10	with its purposes.
11	SEC. 7. COOPERATION.
12	(a) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out this Act, the Sec-
13	retary shall—
14	(1) support and coordinate existing efforts to
15	conserve neotropical migratory bird species,
16	through—
17	(A) facilitating meetings among persons in-
18	volved in such efforts;
19	(B) promoting the exchange of information
20	among such persons;
21	(C) developing and entering into agreements
22	with other Federal agencies, foreign, State, and
23	local governmental agencies, and nongovern-

1	(D) conducting such other activities as the
2	Secretary considers to be appropriate; and
3	(2) coordinate activities and projects under this
4	Act with existing efforts in order to enhance conserva-
5	tion of neotropical migratory bird species.
6	(b) Advisory Group.—
7	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may establish
8	an advisory group in accordance with this subsection
9	to advise the Secretary regarding the implementation
10	of this Act.
11	(2) Membership.—An advisory group estab-
12	lished under this subsection shall consist of individ-
13	uals who represent public and private organizations
14	that are actively involved in the conservation of
15	neotropical migratory birds.
16	(3) Public participation.—
17	(A) MEETINGS.—An advisory group estab-
18	lished under this subsection shall—
19	(i) ensure that each meeting of the ad-
20	visory group is open to the public; and
21	(ii) provide, at each meeting of the ad-
22	visory group, an opportunity for interested
23	persons to present oral or written state-
24	ments concerning items on the agenda for
25	the meeting.

1	(B) NOTICE.—The Secretary shall provide
2	to the public timely notice of each meeting of the
3	advisory group.

4 (C) MINUTES.—The Secretary shall keep
5 and make available to the public minutes of each
6 meeting of the advisory group.

7 (4) EXEMPTION.—The Federal Advisory Com8 mittee Act (5 App. U.S.C.) shall not apply to the es9 tablishment and activities of an advisory group in
10 accordance with this subsection.

#### 11 SEC. 8. REPORT TO CONGRESS.

Not later than October 1, 2002, the Secretary shall submit to Congress a report on the results and effectiveness of
the program carried out under this Act, including recommendations concerning how the Act might be improved
and whether the program should be continued in the future. **SEC. 9. NEOTROPICAL MIGRATORY BIRD CONSERVATION**ACCOUNT.

(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the Multinational Species Conservation Fund of the Treasury a
separate account to be known as the "Neotropical Migratory
Bird Conservation Account", which shall consist of amounts
deposited into the Account by the Secretary of the Treasury
under subsection (b).

1	(b) Deposits Into the Account.—The Secretary of
2	the Treasury shall deposit into the Account—
3	(1) all amounts received by the Secretary in the
4	form of donations under subsection (d); and
5	(2) other amounts appropriated to the Account.
6	(c) USE.—
7	(1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to paragraph (2), the
8	Secretary may use amounts in the Account, without
9	further Act of appropriation, to carry out this Act.
10	(2) Administrative expenses.—Of amounts in
11	the Account available for each fiscal year, the Sec-
12	retary may expend not more than 6 percent to pay
13	the administrative expenses necessary to carry out
14	this Act.
15	(d) Acceptance and Use of Donations.—The Sec-
16	retary may accept and use donations to carry out this Act.
17	Amounts received by the Secretary in the form of donations
18	shall be transferred to the Secretary of the Treasury for de-
19	posit into the Account.
20	SEC. 10. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
21	There is authorized to be appropriated to the Account
22	to carry out this Act \$8,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2000
23	through 2002, to remain available until expended.

#### 1 SEC. 11. PRIVATE PROPERTY.

- 2 Nothing in this Act shall place restrictions on commer-
- 3 cial or private use of private property in the United States,
- 4 nor shall there be any taking of private land in the United
- 5 States under this Act.
