A BILL

To reduce the number of executive branch political appointees.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 SECTION 1. REDUCTION IN NUMBER OF POLITICAL AP-4 POINTEES. 5 (a) DEFINITION.—For purposes of this section, the term "political appointee" means any individual who— 7 (1) is employed in a position listed in sections 8 5312 through 5316 of title 5, United States Code 9 (relating to the Executive Schedule);

(3) is employed in a position in the executive branch of the Government under schedule C of subpart C of part 213 of title 5 of the Code of Federal Regulations.

10 (b) LIMITATION.—The President, acting through the 11 Office of Management and Budget and the Office of Per-12 sonnel Management, shall take such actions as necessary (including reduction-in-force actions under applicable pro-13 14 cedures) to ensure that the number of political appointees shall not, during any fiscal year beginning after September 15 30, 2000, exceed a total of 2,000 (determined on a full-16 time equivalent basis). 17

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
