RESOLUTION

- Expressing the disapproval of the House of Representatives regarding Presidential circumvention of the legislative authority of the Congress to set public policy.
- Whereas article I, section 1 of the Constitution specifies that "All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States";
- Whereas a "republic" is defined as "a government in which supreme power resides in a body of citizens entitled to vote and is exercised by elected officers and representatives responsible to them and governing according to law";
- Whereas individual Americans consistently express their opinions to Members of Congress;

- Whereas Members of Congress are duly elected and serve to uphold the Constitution and represent the views of their constituents; and
- Whereas the administration has encouraged litigation against law-abiding private companies in order to force the adoption of certain policy initiatives: Now, therefore, be it
- Resolved, That it is the sense of the House of Rep resentatives that the President and appointed members
 and staff of the executive branch should not use litigation
 in a coercive manner in order to circumvent the legislative
 function of the Congress.
