# A BILL

- To establish the Galisteo Basin Archaeological Protection Sites, to provide for the protection of archaeological sites in the Galisteo Basin of New Mexico, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
  - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
  - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Galisteo Basin Archae-
  - 5 ological Protection Act".
  - 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
  - 7 (a) The Congress finds the following:

- 1 (1) The Galisteo Basin and surrounding area of
  2 New Mexico is the location of many well preserved
  3 prehistoric and historic archaeological resources of
  4 Native American and Spanish colonial cultures;
  5 (2) These resources include the largest ruins of
  6 Pueblo Indian settlements in the United States,
  7 spectacular examples of Native American rock art,
- 9 (3) These resources are being threatened by 10 natural causes, urban development, vandalism, and 11 uncontrolled excavations.

and ruins of Spanish colonial settlements; and

- 12 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to provide 13 for the preservation, protection, and interpretation of the
- 14 nationally significant archaeological resources in the
- 15 Galisteo Basin in New Mexico.

- 16 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF GALISTEO BASIN ARCHAE-
- 17 OLOGICAL PROTECTION SITES.
- 18 (a) In General.—The archaeological sites listed in
- 19 subsection (b), as generally depicted on a map entitled
- 20 "Galisteo Basin Archaeological Protection Sites," and
- 21 dated May 1999, are hereby designated as "Galisteo Basin
- 22 Archaeological Protection Sites" (in this Act referred to
- 23 as the "archaeological protection sites").
- 24 (b) Sites Described.—The archaeological sites re-
- 25 ferred to in subsection (a) consist of 26 sites in the

1 Galisteo Basin, New Mexico, totaling approximately 4022

- 3 (c) AVAILABILITY OF MAP.—The Secretary shall
- 4 keep the map referred to in subsection (a) on file for pub-
- 5 lic inspection in appropriate offices in New Mexico of the
- 6 Bureau of Land Management and the National Park Serv-
- 7 ice.
- 8 (d) Boundary Adjustments.—The Secretary may
- 9 make minor boundary adjustments by publishing notice
- 10 thereof in the Federal Register.

#### 1 SEC. 4. ADDITIONAL SITES.

- 2 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Interior (in
- 3 this Act referred to as the "Secretary") shall—
- 4 (1) continue to search for additional Native
- 5 American and Spanish colonial sites in the Galisteo
- 6 Basin area of New Mexico; and
- 7 (2) submit to Congress, within three years after
- 8 the date funds become available and thereafter as
- 9 needed, his recommendations for additions to, dele-
- tions from, and modifications of the boundaries of
- 11 the list of archaeological protection sites in section
- 4 of this Act.
- 13 (b) Additions Only by Statute.—Additions to or
- 14 deletions from the list in section 3(b) shall be made only
- 15 by an Act of Congress.
- 16 SEC. 5. ADMINISTRATION.
- 17 (a) In General.—The Secretary shall administer
- 18 the archaeological protection sites, which are located on
- 19 Federal lands, in accordance with the provisions of this
- 20 Act, the Archaeological Resources Protection Act of 1979
- 21 (16 U.S.C. 470aa et seq.), and the Native American
- 22 Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (25 U.S.C. 3001)
- 23 et seq.), and other applicable laws in a manner that will
- 24 protect, preserve, and maintain the archaeological re-
- 25 sources and provide for research thereon.
- 26 (b) Management Plan.—

(1) In General.—Within three complete fiscal 1 2 years after the date funds are made available, the 3 Secretary shall prepare and transmit to the Committee on Energy and Resources of the United 5 States Senate and the Committee on Natural Re-6 sources of the United States House of Representa-7 tives, a general management plan for the identifica-8 tion, research, protection, and public interpretation 9 of the archaeological protection sites located on Fed-10 eral land and for those sites for which the Secretary 11 has entered into Cooperative Agreements regarding 12 sites that are located on private or state lands.

(2) Consultation.—The plan shall be developed by the Secretary in consultation with the Governor of New Mexico, the New Mexico State Land Commissioner, affected Native American pueblos, and other interested parties.

#### 18 SEC. 6. COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.

The Secretary is authorized to enter into cooperative agreements with the owners of non-Federal land with regard to the inclusion of the archaeological protection sites located on their property. The purposes of such an agreement shall be to protect, preserve, maintain, and administer the archaeological resources and associated lands of such a site. Where appropriate, such agreement may also

- 1 provide for public interpretation of an archaeological pro-
- 2 tection site.

#### 3 SEC. 7. ACQUISITIONS.

- 4 (a) In General.—The Secretary is authorized to ac-
- 5 quire lands and interests therein within the boundaries of
- 6 the archaeological protection sites, and access thereto, by
- 7 donation, by purchase with donated or appropriated funds,
- 8 or by exchange.
- 9 (b) Consent of Owner Required.—The Secretary
- 10 may only acquire lands or interests therein within the con-
- 11 sent of the owner thereof.
- 12 (c) STATE LANDS.—The Secretary may acquire lands
- 13 or interests therein owned by the State of New Mexico
- 14 or a political subdivision thereof only by donation or ex-
- 15 change.

#### 16 SEC. 8. WITHDRAWAL.

- 17 Subject to valid existing rights, all Federal lands
- 18 within the protection sites are hereby withdrawn—
- 19 (1) from all forms of entry, appropriation, or
- disposal under the public land laws and all amend-
- 21 ments thereto;
- 22 (2) from location, entry, and patent under the
- 23 mining law and all amendments thereto; and

- 1 (3) from disposition under all laws relating to
- 2 mineral and geothermal leasing, and all amendments
- 3 thereto.

#### 4 SEC. 9. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATION.

- 5 There are authorized to be appropriated such sums
- 6 as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this

7 act.
