Mr. BENNETT from the Committee on Appropriations, reported the following original bill; which was read twice and placed on the calendar

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**A BILL**

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*  
3       That the following sums are appropriated, out of any  
4       money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the  
5       Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September  
6       30, 2000, and for other purposes, namely:

## 1 TITLE I—CONGRESSIONAL OPERATIONS

## 2 SENATE

## 3 EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

4 For expense allowances of the Vice President,  
5 \$10,000; the President Pro Tempore of the Senate,  
6 \$10,000; Majority Leader of the Senate, \$10,000; Minor-  
7 ity Leader of the Senate, \$10,000; Majority Whip of the  
8 Senate, \$5,000; Minority Whip of the Senate, \$5,000; and  
9 Chairmen of the Majority and Minority Conference Com-  
10 mittees, \$3,000 for each Chairman; in all, \$56,000.

## 11 REPRESENTATION ALLOWANCES FOR THE MAJORITY AND

## 12 MINORITY LEADERS

13 For representation allowances of the Majority and

4 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

5 SECTION 1. Effective in the case of any fiscal year  
6 which begins on or after October 1, 1999, clause (iii) of  
7 paragraph (3)(A) of section 506(b) of the Supplemental  
8 Appropriations Act, 1973 (2 U.S.C. 58(b)) is amended to  
9 read as follows:

10 “(iii) subject to subparagraph (B), in case the  
11 Senator represents Alabama, \$184,476, Alaska,  
12 \$252,784, Arizona, \$200,830, Arkansas, \$169,453,  
13 California, \$474,426, Colorado, \$189,246, Con-  
14 necticut, \$161,999, Delaware, \$128,102, Florida,  
15 \$305,664, Georgia, \$213,982, Hawaii, \$280,277,  
16 Idaho, \$164,491, Illinois, \$268,850, Indiana,  
17 \$196,677, Iowa, \$172,129, Kansas, \$169,343, Ken-

9       SEC. 2. Effective on and after October 1, 1999, each  
 10      of the dollar amounts contained in the table under section  
 11      105(d)(1)(A) of the Legislative Branch Appropriations  
 12      Act, 1968 (2 U.S.C. 61–1(d)(1)(A)) shall be deemed to  
 13      be the dollar amounts in that table, as increased by section  
 14      8 of Public Law 105–275, increased by an additional  
 15      \$50,000 each.

16       SEC. 3. SENATE OFFICE SPACE ALLOCATIONS. Sec-  
 17      tion 3 under the heading “ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS”  
 18      in the appropriation for the Senate in the Legislative  
 19      Branch Appropriations Act, 1975 (2 U.S.C. 59; 88 Stat.  
 20      428) is amended—

21               (1) in subsection (b)—

22                       (A) by striking paragraphs (1) and (2) and  
 23                       inserting the following:

24                       “(1) 5,000 square feet if the population of the  
 25                       State of the Senator is less than 3,000,000;”;

1 (B) by striking “8,000” in paragraph (13)  
2 and inserting “8,200”; and

3 (C) by redesignating paragraphs (3)  
4 through (13) as paragraphs (2) through (12),  
5 respectively; and  
6 (2) in subsection (c)(2)—

7 (A) by striking “\$30,000” and inserting  
8 “\$40,000”;

9 (B) by striking “4,800” and inserting  
10 “5,000”;

11 (C) by striking “\$734” and inserting  
12 “\$1,000”; and

13 (D) by adding at the end the following:  
14 “Effective beginning with the 106th Congress,  
15 the aggregate amount in effect under this para-  
16 graph for any Congress shall be increased by  
17 the inflation adjustment factor for the calendar  
18 year in which the Congress begins. For pur-  
19 poses of the preceding sentence, the inflation  
20 adjustment factor for any calendar year is a  
21 fraction the numerator of which is the implicit  
22 price deflator for the gross domestic product as  
23 computed and published by the Department of  
24 Commerce for the preceding calendar year and



1           the denominator of which is such deflator for  
2           the calendar year 1998.”.

3           SEC. 4. Section 6(c) of the Legislative Branch Appro-  
4       priations Act, 1999 (Public Law 105–275; 2 U.S.C. 121b–  
5       1(c)) is amended by adding at the end the following:

6           “(3) The provisions of section 4 of the Act of July  
7       31, 1946 (40 U.S.C. 193d), except for the provisions relat-  
8       ing to solicitation, shall not apply to any activity carried  
9       out pursuant to this section, subject to approval of such  
10      activities by the Committee on Rules and Administra-  
11      tion.”.

12          SEC. 5. The first section of Public Law 87–82 (40  
13       U.S.C. 174j–1) is amended by adding at the end the fol-  
14       lowing: “The provisions of section 4 of the Act of July  
15       31, 1946 (40 U.S.C. 193d), except for the provisions relat-  
16       ing to solicitation, shall not apply to any activity carried  
17       out pursuant to this section, subject to the approval of  
18       such activities by the Committee on Rules and Administra-  
19       tion.”.

20          SEC. 6. The Legislative Counsel may, subject to the  
21       approval of the President pro tempore of the Senate, des-  
22       ignate one of the Senior Counsels appointed under section  
23       102 of the Legislative Branch Appropriation Act, 1979  
24       (2 U.S.C. 274 note; Public Law 95–391; 92 Stat. 771)  
25       as Deputy Legislative Counsel. The Deputy Legislative

1 Counsel shall perform the functions of the Legislative  
 2 Counsel during the absence or disability of the Legislative  
 3 Counsel, or when the office is vacant.

4 SEC. 7. Section 814(i) of the Foreign Relations Au-  
 5 thorization Act, Fiscal Years 1986 and 1987 (22 U.S.C.  
 6 2291 note) is amended by striking “September 30, 1999”  
 7 and inserting “September 30, 2002”.

9 For Joint Committees, as follows:

### 10 JOINT ECONOMIC COMMITTEE

11 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Economic  
 12 Committee, \$3,200,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary  
 13 of the Senate.

### 14 JOINT COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

15 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on  
 16 Taxation, \$6,456,000, to be disbursed by the Chief Ad-  
 17 ministrative Officer of the House.

### 18 JOINT COMMITTEE ON THE LIBRARY

19 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on  
 20 the Library, \$500,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary  
 21 of the Senate.

22 For other joint items, as follows:

### 23 OFFICE OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN

24 For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-  
 25 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending

1 Physician and his assistants, including: (1) an allowance  
 2 of \$1,500 per month to the Attending Physician; (2) an  
 3 allowance of \$500 per month each to three medical officers  
 4 while on duty in the Office of the Attending Physician;  
 5 (3) an allowance of \$500 per month to one assistant and  
 6 \$400 per month each not to exceed eleven assistants on  
 7 the basis heretofore provided for such assistants; and (4)  
 8 \$1,002,600 for reimbursement to the Department of the  
 9 Navy for expenses incurred for staff and equipment as-  
 10 signed to the Office of the Attending Physician, which  
 11 shall be advanced and credited to the applicable appropria-  
 12 tion or appropriations from which such salaries, allow-  
 13 ances, and other expenses are payable and shall be avail-  
 14 able for all the purposes thereof, \$1,898,000, to be dis-  
 15 bursed by the Chief Administrative Officer of the House.

## 16 CAPITOL POLICE BOARD

### 17 CAPITOL POLICE

#### 18 SALARIES

19 For the Capitol Police Board for salaries of officers,  
 20 members, and employees of the Capitol Police, including  
 21 overtime, hazardous duty pay differential, clothing allow-  
 22 ance of not more than \$600 each for members required  
 23 to wear civilian attire, and Government contributions for  
 24 health, retirement, Social Security, and other applicable  
 25 employee benefits, \$80,783,000, of which \$38,648,000 is

1 provided to the Sergeant at Arms of the House of Rep-  
 2 resentatives, to be disbursed by the Chief Administrative  
 3 Officer of the House, and \$42,135,000 is provided to the  
 4 Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper of the Senate, to be  
 5 disbursed by the Secretary of the Senate: *Provided*, That,  
 6 of the amounts appropriated under this heading, such  
 7 amounts as may be necessary may be transferred between  
 8 the Sergeant at Arms of the House of Representatives and  
 9 the Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper of the Senate, upon  
 10 approval of the Committee on Appropriations of the House  
 11 of Representatives and the Committee on Appropriations  
 12 of the Senate.

#### 13 GENERAL EXPENSES

14 For the Capitol Police Board for necessary expenses  
 15 of the Capitol Police, including motor vehicles, commu-  
 16 nications and other equipment, security equipment and in-  
 17 stallation, uniforms, weapons, supplies, materials, train-  
 18 ing, medical services, forensic services, stenographic serv-  
 19 ices, personal and professional services, the employee as-  
 20 sistance program, not more than \$2,000 for the awards  
 21 program, postage, telephone service, travel advances, relo-  
 22 cation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Federal  
 23 Law Enforcement Training Center, and \$85 per month  
 24 for extra services performed for the Capitol Police Board  
 25 by an employee of the Sergeant at Arms of the Senate

1 or the House of Representatives designated by the Chair-  
 2 man of the Board, \$7,913,000, to be disbursed by the  
 3 Chief Administrative Officer of the House of Representa-  
 4 tives: *Provided*, That, notwithstanding any other provision  
 5 of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police  
 6 at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis-  
 7 cal year 2000 shall be paid by the Secretary of the Treas-  
 8 ury from funds available to the Department of the Treas-  
 9 ury.

#### 10 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

11 SEC. 101. Amounts appropriated for fiscal year 2000  
 12 for the Capitol Police Board for the Capitol Police may  
 13 be transferred between the headings “SALARIES” and  
 14 “GENERAL EXPENSES” upon the approval of—

15 (1) the Committee on Appropriations of the  
 16 House of Representatives, in the case of amounts  
 17 transferred from the appropriation provided to the  
 18 Sergeant at Arms of the House of Representatives  
 19 under the heading “SALARIES”;

20 (2) the Committee on Appropriations of the  
 21 Senate, in the case of amounts transferred from the  
 22 appropriation provided to the Sergeant at Arms and  
 23 Doorkeeper of the Senate under the heading “SALA-  
 24 RIES”; and

6 For salaries and expenses of the Capitol Guide Serv-  
7 ice and Special Services Office, \$2,336,000, to be dis-  
8 bursed by the Secretary of the Senate: *Provided*, That no  
9 part of such amount may be used to employ more than  
10 forty-three individuals: *Provided further*, That the Capitol  
11 Guide Board is authorized, during emergencies, to employ  
12 not more than two additional individuals for not more  
13 than 120 days each, and not more than ten additional in-  
14 dividuals for not more than six months each, for the Cap-  
15 itol Guide Service.

For the preparation, under the direction of the Committees on Appropriations of the Senate and the House of Representatives, of the statements for the first session of the One Hundred Sixth Congress, showing appropriations made, indefinite appropriations, and contracts authorized, together with a chronological history of the regular appropriations bills as required by law, \$30,000, to be paid to the persons designated by the chairmen of such committees to supervise the work.

## 2                   SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3           For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compli-  
4   ance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional  
5   Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$2,000,000.

## 6                   CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

## 7                   SALARIES AND EXPENSES

8           For salaries and expenses necessary to carry out the  
9   provisions of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (Pub-  
10   lic Law 93–344), including not more than \$2,500 to be  
11   expended on the certification of the Director of the Con-  
12   gressional Budget Office in connection with official rep-  
13   resentation and reception expenses, \$26,221,000: *Pro-*  
14   *vided*, That no part of such amount may be used for the  
15   purchase or hire of a passenger motor vehicle.

## 16                   ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

## 17                   CAPITOL BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

## 18                   CAPITOL BUILDINGS

## 19                   SALARIES AND EXPENSES

20           For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, the As-  
21   sistant Architect of the Capitol, and other personal serv-  
22   ices, at rates of pay provided by law; for surveys and stud-  
23   ies in connection with activities under the care of the Ar-  
24   chitect of the Capitol; for all necessary expenses for the  
25   maintenance, care and operation of the Capitol and elec-  
26   trical substations of the Senate and House office buildings

1 under the jurisdiction of the Architect of the Capitol, in-  
2 cluding furnishings and office equipment, including not  
3 more than \$1,000 for official reception and representation  
4 expenses, to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol  
5 may approve; for purchase or exchange, maintenance and  
6 operation of a passenger motor vehicle; and not to exceed  
7 \$20,000 for attendance, when specifically authorized by  
8 the Architect of the Capitol, at meetings or conventions  
9 in connection with subjects related to work under the Ar-  
10 chitect of the Capitol, \$48,195,000, of which \$7,620,000  
11 shall remain available until expended.

12 CAPITOL GROUNDS

13 For all necessary expenses for care and improvement  
14 of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House  
15 office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant, \$5,627,000,  
16 of which \$330,000 shall remain available until expended.

17 SENATE OFFICE BUILDINGS

18 For all necessary expenses for maintenance, care and  
19 operation of Senate office buildings; and furniture and  
20 furnishings to be expended under the control and super-  
21 vision of the Architect of the Capitol, \$64,038,000, of  
22 which \$22,305,000 shall remain available until expended.

23 CAPITOL POWER PLANT

24 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care  
25 and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heat-  
26 ing, power (including the purchase of electrical energy)



1 and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and  
 2 House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and  
 3 the grounds about the same, Botanic Garden, Senate ga-  
 4 rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from  
 5 plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government  
 6 Printing Office and Washington City Post Office, and  
 7 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-  
 8 preme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the  
 9 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the  
 10 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be  
 11 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of  
 12 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited  
 13 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation,  
 14 \$45,006,000, of which \$6,000,000 shall remain available  
 15 until expended: *Provided*, That not more than \$4,000,000  
 16 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed to this appro-  
 17 priation as herein provided shall be available for obligation  
 18 during fiscal year 2000.

## 19 LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

### 20 CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH SERVICE

#### 21 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

22 For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions  
 23 of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of  
 24 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Anno-  
 25 tated Constitution of the United States of America,

1 \$71,244,000: *Provided*, That no part of such amount may  
 2 be used to pay any salary or expense in connection with  
 3 any publication, or preparation of material therefor (ex-  
 4 cept the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued by  
 5 the Library of Congress unless such publication has ob-  
 6 tained prior approval of either the Committee on House  
 7 Administration of the House of Representatives or the  
 8 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate.

9 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE

10 CONGRESSIONAL PRINTING AND BINDING

11 For authorized printing and binding for the Congress  
 12 and the distribution of Congressional information in any  
 13 format; printing and binding for the Architect of the Cap-  
 14 itol; expenses necessary for preparing the semimonthly  
 15 and session index to the Congressional Record, as author-  
 16 ized by law (44 U.S.C. 902); printing and binding of Gov-  
 17 ernment publications authorized by law to be distributed  
 18 to Members of Congress; and printing, binding, and dis-  
 19 tribution of Government publications authorized by law to  
 20 be distributed without charge to the recipient,  
 21 \$77,704,000: *Provided*, That this appropriation shall not  
 22 be available for paper copies of the permanent edition of  
 23 the Congressional Record for individual Representatives,  
 24 Resident Commissioners or Delegates authorized under 44  
 25 U.S.C. 906: *Provided further*, That this appropriation

1 shall be available for the payment of obligations incurred  
 2 under the appropriations for similar purposes for pre-  
 3 ceding fiscal years: *Provided further*, That notwithstanding  
 4 the 2-year limitation under section 718 of title 44, United  
 5 States Code, none of the funds appropriated or made  
 6 available under this Act or any other Act for printing and  
 7 binding and related services provided to Congress under  
 8 chapter 7 of title 44, United States Code, may be ex-  
 9 pended to print a document, report, or publication after  
 10 the 27-month period beginning on the date that such docu-  
 11 ment, report, or publication is authorized by Congress to  
 12 be printed, unless Congress reauthorizes such printing in  
 13 accordance with section 718 of title 44, United States  
 14 Code.

15       This title may be cited as the “Congressional Oper-  
 16 ations Appropriations Act, 2000”.

#### 19                                       SALARIES AND EXPENSES

20       For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care  
 21 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries,  
 22 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-  
 23 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger  
 24 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-  
 25 mittee on the Library, \$3,428,000.

## SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress not otherwise provided for, including development and maintenance of the Union Catalogs; custody and custodial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; cleaning, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the Library; preparation and distribution of catalog records and other publications of the Library; hire or purchase of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the Library of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly chargeable to the income of any trust fund held by the Board, \$250,491,000, of which not more than \$6,500,000 shall be derived from collections credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2000, and shall remain available until expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter 1301; 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than \$350,000 shall be derived from collections during fiscal year 2000 and shall remain available until expended for the development and maintenance of an international legal information database and activities related thereto: *Provided*, That the Library of Congress may not obligate or expend any funds derived from collections under the Act of June

1 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for obliga-  
2 tion or expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided fur-*  
3 *ther*, That the total amount available for obligation shall  
4 be reduced by the amount by which collections are less  
5 than the \$6,850,000: *Provided further*, That of the total  
6 amount appropriated, \$10,321,380 is to remain available  
7 until expended for acquisition of books, periodicals, news-  
8 papers, and all other materials including subscriptions for  
9 bibliographic services for the Library, including \$40,000  
10 to be available solely for the purchase, when specifically  
11 approved by the Librarian, of special and unique materials  
12 for additions to the collections: *Provided further*, That of  
13 the total amount appropriated, \$2,347,000 is to remain  
14 available until expended for the acquisition and partial  
15 support for implementation of an Integrated Library Sys-  
16 tem (ILS): *Provided further*, That of the total amount ap-  
17 propriated, \$600,000 is to remain available until expended  
18 for the purpose of digitizing archival materials relating to  
19 ethnic groups of California, including Japanese Ameri-  
20 cans, which amount shall be transferred to an educational  
21 archive able to conduct such a project as approved by the  
22 Library.

## COPYRIGHT OFFICE

## SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Copyright Office, including publication of the decisions of the United States courts involving copyrights, \$37,628,000, of which not more than \$20,800,000, to remain available until expended, shall be derived from collections credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2000 under 17 U.S.C. 708(d): *Provided*, That the Copyright Office may not obligate or expend any funds derived from collections under 17 U.S.C. 708(d), in excess of the amount authorized for obligation or expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided further*, That not more than \$5,454,000 shall be derived from collections during fiscal year 2000 under 17 U.S.C. 111(d)(2), 119(b)(2), 802(h), and 1005: *Provided further*, That the total amount available for obligation shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are less than \$26,254,000: *Provided further*, That not more than \$100,000 of the amount appropriated is available for the maintenance of an “International Copyright Institute” in the Copyright Office of the Library of Congress for the purpose of training nationals of developing countries in intellectual property laws and policies: *Provided further*, That not more than \$7,250 may be expended, on the certification of the Librarian of Congress, in connection with

1 official representation and reception expenses for activities  
 2 of the International Copyright Institute and for copyright  
 3 delegations, visitors, and seminars.

4 BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED  
 5 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

6 For salaries and expenses to carry out the Act of  
 7 March 3, 1931 (chapter 400; 46 Stat. 1487; 2 U.S.C.  
 8 135a), \$47,984,000, of which \$14,019,000 shall remain  
 9 available until expended.

10 FURNITURE AND FURNISHINGS

11 For necessary expenses for the purchase, installation,  
 12 maintenance, and repair of furniture, furnishings, office  
 13 and library equipment, \$5,415,000.

14 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

15 SEC. 201. Appropriations in this Act available to the  
 16 Library of Congress shall be available, in an amount of  
 17 not more than \$198,390, of which \$59,300 is for the Con-  
 18 gressional Research Service, when specifically authorized  
 19 by the Librarian, for attendance at meetings concerned  
 20 with the function or activity for which the appropriation  
 21 is made.

22 SEC. 202. (a) No part of the funds appropriated in  
 23 this Act shall be used by the Library of Congress to ad-  
 24 minister any flexible or compressed work schedule which—

1           (1) applies to any manager or supervisor in a  
2           position the grade or level of which is equal to or  
3           higher than GS-15; and

4           (2) grants such manager or supervisor the right  
5           to not be at work for all or a portion of a workday  
6           because of time worked by the manager or super-  
7           visor on another workday.

8           (b) For purposes of this section, the term “manager  
9           or supervisor” means any management official or super-  
10          visor, as such terms are defined in section 7103(a)(10)  
11          and (11) of title 5, United States Code.

12          SEC. 203. Appropriated funds received by the Library  
13          of Congress from other Federal agencies to cover general  
14          and administrative overhead costs generated by per-  
15          forming reimbursable work for other agencies under the  
16          authority of 31 U.S.C. 1535 and 1536 shall not be used  
17          to employ more than 65 employees and may be expended  
18          or obligated—

19                 (1) in the case of a reimbursement, only to such  
20                 extent or in such amounts as are provided in appro-  
21                 priations Acts; or

22                 (2) in the case of an advance payment, only—  
23                         (A) to pay for such general or administra-  
24                         tive overhead costs as are attributable to the  
25                         work performed for such agency; or



1 (B) to such extent or in such amounts as  
2 are provided in appropriations Acts, with re-  
3 spect to any purpose not allowable under sub-  
4 paragraph (A).

5 SEC. 204. Of the amounts appropriated to the Li-  
6 brary of Congress in this Act, not more than \$5,000 may  
7 be expended, on the certification of the Librarian of Con-  
8 gress, in connection with official representation and recep-  
9 tion expenses for the incentive awards program.

10 SEC. 205. Of the amount appropriated to the Library  
11 of Congress in this Act, not more than \$12,000 may be  
12 expended, on the certification of the Librarian of Con-  
13 gress, in connection with official representation and recep-  
14 tion expenses for the Overseas Field Offices.

15 SEC. 206. (a) For fiscal year 2000, the obligational  
16 authority of the Library of Congress for the activities de-  
17 scribed in subsection (b) may not exceed \$98,788,000.

18 (b) The activities referred to in subsection (a) are re-  
19 imburseable and revolving fund activities that are funded  
20 from sources other than appropriations to the Library in  
21 appropriations Acts for the legislative branch.

22 SEC. 207. The Library of Congress may use available  
23 funds, now and hereafter, to enter into contracts for the  
24 lease or acquisition of severable services for a period that  
25 begins in one fiscal year and ends in the next fiscal year

1 and to enter into multi-year contracts for the acquisition  
 2 of property and services pursuant to sections 303L and  
 3 304B, respectively, of the Federal Property and Adminis-  
 4 trative Services Act (41 U.S.C. 253l and 254c).

5 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

6 LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

7 STRUCTURAL AND MECHANICAL CARE

8 For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and  
 9 structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library  
 10 buildings and grounds, \$17,327,000, of which \$5,740,000  
 11 shall remain available until expended.

12 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE

13 OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DOCUMENTS

14 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

15 For expenses of the Office of Superintendent of Doc-  
 16 uments necessary to provide for the cataloging and index-  
 17 ing of Government publications and their distribution to  
 18 the public, Members of Congress, other Government agen-  
 19 cies, and designated depository and international exchange  
 20 libraries as authorized by law, \$29,986,000: *Provided*,  
 21 That travel expenses, including travel expenses of the De-  
 22 pository Library Council to the Public Printer, shall not  
 23 exceed \$150,000: *Provided further*, That amounts of not  
 24 more than \$2,000,000 from current year appropriations  
 25 are authorized for producing and disseminating Congres-

1 sional serial sets and other related publications for 1998  
2 and 1999 to depository and other designated libraries.

3 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

4 For payment to the “Government Printing Office re-  
5 volving fund”, \$5,000,000, to remain available until ex-  
6 pended, for air-conditioning systems and elevator repair.

7 The Government Printing Office is hereby authorized  
8 to make such expenditures, within the limits of funds  
9 available and in accord with the law, and to make such  
10 contracts and commitments without regard to fiscal year  
11 limitations as provided by section 9104 of title 31, United  
12 States Code, as may be necessary in carrying out the pro-  
13 grams and purposes set forth in the budget for the current  
14 fiscal year for the Government Printing Office revolving  
15 fund: *Provided*, That not more than \$2,500 may be ex-  
16 pended on the certification of the Public Printer in connec-  
17 tion with official representation and reception expenses:  
18 *Provided further*, That the revolving fund shall be available  
19 for the hire or purchase of not more than twelve passenger  
20 motor vehicles: *Provided further*, That expenditures in con-  
21 nection with travel expenses of the advisory councils to  
22 the Public Printer shall be deemed necessary to carry out  
23 the provisions of title 44, United States Code: *Provided*  
24 *further*, That the revolving fund shall be available for tem-  
25 porary or intermittent services under section 3109(b) of

1 title 5, United States Code, but at rates for individuals  
 2 not more than the daily equivalent of the annual rate of  
 3 basic pay for level V of the Executive Schedule under sec-  
 4 tion 5316 of such title: *Provided further*, That the revolv-  
 5 ing fund and the funds provided under the heading “OF-  
 6 FICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DOCUMENTS, SALARIES  
 7 AND EXPENSES” together may not be available for the full-  
 8 time equivalent employment of more than 3,383  
 9 workyears: *Provided further*, That activities financed  
 10 through the revolving fund may provide information in any  
 11 format: *Provided further*, That the revolving fund shall not  
 12 be used to administer any flexible or compressed work  
 13 schedule which applies to any manager or supervisor in  
 14 a position the grade or level of which is equal to or higher  
 15 than GS-15: *Provided further*, That expenses for attend-  
 16 ance at meetings shall not exceed \$75,000.

## 17 GENERAL ACCOUNTING OFFICE

### 18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For necessary expenses of the General Accounting  
 20 Office, including not more than \$7,000 to be expended on  
 21 the certification of the Comptroller General of the United  
 22 States in connection with official representation and recep-  
 23 tion expenses; temporary or intermittent services under  
 24 section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, but at rates  
 25 for individuals not more than the daily equivalent of the

1 annual rate of basic pay for level IV of the Executive  
2 Schedule under section 5315 of such title; hire of one pas-  
3 senger motor vehicle; advance payments in foreign coun-  
4 tries in accordance with 31 U.S.C. 3324; benefits com-  
5 parable to those payable under sections 901(5), 901(6),  
6 and 901(8) of the Foreign Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C.  
7 4081(5), 4081(6), and 4081(8)); and under regulations  
8 prescribed by the Comptroller General of the United  
9 States, rental of living quarters in foreign countries,  
10 \$382,298,000: *Provided*, That notwithstanding 31 U.S.C.  
11 9105 hereafter amounts reimbursed to the Comptroller  
12 General pursuant to that section shall be deposited to the  
13 appropriation of the General Accounting Office then avail-  
14 able and remain available until expended, and not more  
15 than \$1,400,000 of such funds shall be available for use  
16 in fiscal year 2000: *Provided further*, That this appropria-  
17 tion and appropriations for administrative expenses of any  
18 other department or agency which is a member of the  
19 Joint Financial Management Improvement Program  
20 (JFMIP) shall be available to finance an appropriate  
21 share of JFMIP costs as determined by the JFMIP, in-  
22 cluding the salary of the Executive Director and secre-  
23 tarial support: *Provided further*, That this appropriation  
24 and appropriations for administrative expenses of any  
25 other department or agency which is a member of the Na-

1 tional Intergovernmental Audit Forum or a Regional  
 2 Intergovernmental Audit Forum shall be available to fi-  
 3 nance an appropriate share of either Forum's costs as de-  
 4 termined by the respective Forum, including necessary  
 5 travel expenses of non-Federal participants. Payments  
 6 hereunder to either Forum or the JFMIP may be credited  
 7 as reimbursements to any appropriation from which costs  
 8 involved are initially financed: *Provided further*, That this  
 9 appropriation and appropriations for administrative ex-  
 10 penses of any other department or agency which is a mem-  
 11 ber of the American Consortium on International Public  
 12 Administration (ACIPA) shall be available to finance an  
 13 appropriate share of ACIPA costs as determined by the  
 14 ACIPA, including any expenses attributable to member-  
 15 ship of ACIPA in the International Institute of Adminis-  
 16 trative Sciences.

### 17 TITLE III—GENERAL PROVISIONS

18 SEC. 301. No part of the funds appropriated in this  
 19 Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private  
 20 vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as  
 21 may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-  
 22 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the  
 23 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate  
 24 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

1       SEC. 302. No part of the funds appropriated in this  
2 Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year  
3 2000 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

4       SEC. 303. Whenever in this Act any office or position  
5 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of  
6 1929 is appropriated for or the rate of compensation or  
7 designation of any office or position appropriated for is  
8 different from that specifically established by such Act,  
9 the rate of compensation and the designation in this Act  
10 shall be the permanent law with respect thereto: *Provided*,  
11 That the provisions in this Act for the various items of  
12 official expenses of Members, officers, and committees of  
13 the Senate and House of Representatives, and clerk hire  
14 for Senators and Members of the House of Representa-  
15 tives shall be the permanent law with respect thereto.

16       SEC. 304. The expenditure of any appropriation  
17 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-  
18 ment contract, pursuant to 5 U.S.C. 3109, shall be limited  
19 to those contracts where such expenditures are a matter  
20 of public record and available for public inspection, except  
21 where otherwise provided under existing law, or under ex-  
22 isting Executive order issued pursuant to existing law.

23       SEC. 305. (a) It is the sense of the Congress that,  
24 to the greatest extent practicable, all equipment and prod-

1 icts purchased with funds made available in this Act  
2 should be American-made.

3 (b) In providing financial assistance to, or entering  
4 into any contract with, any entity using funds made avail-  
5 able in this Act, the head of each Federal agency, to the  
6 greatest extent practicable, shall provide to such entity a  
7 notice describing the statement made in subsection (a) by  
8 the Congress.

9 (c) If it has been finally determined by a court or  
10 Federal agency that any person intentionally affixed a  
11 label bearing a “Made in America” inscription, or any in-  
12 scription with the same meaning, to any product sold in  
13 or shipped to the United States that is not made in the  
14 United States, such person shall be ineligible to receive  
15 any contract or subcontract made with funds provided  
16 pursuant to this Act, pursuant to the debarment, suspen-  
17 sion, and ineligibility procedures described in section  
18 9.400 through 9.409 of title 48, Code of Federal Regula-  
19 tions.

20 SEC. 306. Such sums as may be necessary are appro-  
21 priated to the account described in subsection (a) of sec-  
22 tion 415 of Public Law 104–1 to pay awards and settle-  
23 ments as authorized under such subsection.

24 SEC. 307. Amounts available for administrative ex-  
25 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates



1 in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council  
2 (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall  
3 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC  
4 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total  
5 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legisla-  
6 tive branch entities (in such allocations among the entities  
7 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$1,500.

8 SEC. 308. Section 316 of Public Law 101–302 is  
9 amended in the first sentence of subsection (a) by striking  
10 “1999” and inserting “2000”.

11 SEC. 309. For purposes of section 8147 of title 5,  
12 United States Code, the Government Printing Office is not  
13 considered an agency which is required by statute to sub-  
14 mit an annual budget pursuant to or as provided by chap-  
15 ter 91 of title 31, United States Code, and is not required  
16 to pay an additional amount for the cost of administration.

17 SEC. 310. Chapter 5 of title II of division B of the  
18 Omnibus Consolidated and Emergency Supplemental Ap-  
19 propriations Act, 1999 (Public Law 105–277; 112 Stat.  
20 2681–569) is amended in the matter under the sub-  
21 heading “CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER” under the heading  
22 “ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL” by striking “the  
23 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate, the  
24 Committee on House Oversight of the House of Rep-  
25 resentatives, the Committees on Appropriations of the

1 House of Representatives and of the Senate, and other  
 2 appropriate committees of the House of Representatives  
 3 and of the Senate” and inserting “the United States Cap-  
 4 itol Preservation Commission established under section  
 5 801 of the Arizona-Idaho Conservation Act of 1988 (40  
 6 U.S.C. 188a)”.

7       SEC. 311. (a) The National Park Service (in this sec-  
 8 tion referred to as the “sponsor”) may during each of cal-  
 9 endar years 1999 and 2000 sponsor a series of three con-  
 10 certs by the National Symphony Orchestra (in this section  
 11 each concert referred to as an “event”) on the Capitol  
 12 Grounds. Such concerts shall be held on Memorial Day,  
 13 4th of July, and Labor Day of each such calendar year,  
 14 or on such alternate dates during that calendar year as  
 15 the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Com-  
 16 mittee on Rules and Administration of the Senate may  
 17 jointly designate.

18       (b)(1) Under conditions to be prescribed by the Ar-  
 19 chitect of the Capitol and the Capitol Police Board, each  
 20 event authorized by subsection (a)—

21               (A) shall be free of admission charge and open  
 22       to the public, with no preferential seating except for  
 23       security purposes as determined in accordance with  
 24       subsection (d), and

1           (B) shall be arranged not to interfere with the  
2       needs of Congress.

3       (2) The sponsor shall assume full responsibility for  
4 all expenses and liabilities incident to all activities associ-  
5 ated with each event.

6       (3) Pursuant to section 451 of the Legislative Reor-  
7 ganization Act of 1970 (40 U.S.C. 193m-l), the Comp-  
8 troller General of the United States shall perform an an-  
9 nual audit of the events for each of calendar years 1999  
10 and 2000 and provide a report on each audit to the Speak-  
11 er of the House of Representatives and the Chairman of  
12 the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration not  
13 later than December 15 of the calendar year for which  
14 the audit was performed.

15       (c)(1) Subject to the approval of the Architect of the  
16 Capitol, the sponsor may erect upon the Capitol Grounds  
17 such stage, sound amplification devices, and other related  
18 structures and equipment as may be required for each  
19 event.

20       (2) Subject to the restrictions contained in subsection  
21 (d), the concerts held on Memorial Day and 4th of July  
22 (or their alternate dates) may be broadcast over radio, tel-  
23 evision, and other media outlets.

24       (3) In order to permit the setting up and taking down  
25 of structures and equipment and the conducting of dress

1 rehearsals, the Architect of the Capitol may permit the  
2 sponsor to use the West Central Front of the United  
3 States Capitol for each event for not more than—

4 (A) six days if the concert is televised, and

5 (B) four days if the concert is not televised.

6 The Architect may not schedule any use under this para-  
7 graph if it would interfere with any concert to be per-  
8 formed by a military band of the United States.

9 (4) The Architect of the Capitol and the Capitol Po-  
10 lice Board are authorized to make any such additional ar-  
11 rangements as may be required to carry out each event.

12 (d)(1) The Capitol Police Board shall for each  
13 event—

14 (A) provide for all security related needs, and

15 (B) provide for enforcement of the restrictions  
16 contained in section 4 of the Act of July 31, 1946  
17 (40 U.S.C. 193d; 60 Stat. 718), concerning sales,  
18 displays, advertisements, and solicitations on the  
19 Capitol Grounds, as well as other restrictions appli-  
20 cable to the Capitol Grounds.

21 (2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), credits may be  
22 appropriately given to private sponsors of an event at the  
23 conclusion of any broadcast of the event.

24 (3) The Architect of the Capitol and the Capitol Po-  
25 lice Board shall enter into an agreement with the sponsor,

1 and such other persons participating in an event as the  
 2 Architect of the Capitol and the Capitol Police Board con-  
 3 siderers appropriate, under which the sponsor and such per-  
 4 sons agree to comply with the requirements of this sub-  
 5 section. The agreement shall specifically prohibit the use  
 6 for a commercial purpose of any photograph taken at, or  
 7 broadcast production of, the event.

8       SEC. 312. TRADE DEFICIT REVIEW COMMISSION. (a)  
 9 APPROPRIATIONS.—Section 127(i) of the Trade Deficit  
 10 Review Commission Act (19 U.S.C. 2213 note) is amend-  
 11 ed by adding at the end the following new sentence:

12 “Amounts appropriated pursuant to this subsection shall  
 13 remain available until the date which is 90 days after the  
 14 date on which the Commission submits the final report  
 15 described in subsection (e).”.

16       (b) APPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN PAY AUTHORITIES  
 17 TO MEMBERS OF THE COMMISSION.—Section 127(g) of  
 18 the Trade Deficit Review Commission Act is amended by  
 19 adding at the end the following new paragraph:

20               “(6) APPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN PAY AUTHORI-  
 21 TIES.—

22               “(A) IN GENERAL.—An individual who is a  
 23 member of the Commission and is an annuitant  
 24 or otherwise covered by section 8344 or 8468 of  
 25 title 5, United States Code, by reason of mem-

1           bership on the Commission is not subject to the  
 2           provisions of section 8344 or 8468 (whichever  
 3           is applicable) with respect to such membership.

4           “(B) UNIFORMED SERVICE.—An individual  
 5           who is a member of the Commission and is a  
 6           member or former member of a uniformed serv-  
 7           ice is not subject to the provisions of sub-  
 8           sections (b) and (c) of section 5532, United  
 9           States Code, with respect to membership on the  
 10          Commission.”.

11          (c) TERMINATION OF COMMISSION AND OTHER MAT-  
 12          TERS.—Section 127 of the Trade Deficit Review Commis-  
 13          sion Act is amended by adding at the end the following  
 14          new subsections:

15          “(j) FEDERAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE ACT.—The  
 16          provisions of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (Public  
 17          Law 92-463; 5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the Com-  
 18          mission.

19          “(k) TERMINATION.—The Commission shall termi-  
 20          nate 90 days after the date on which the Commission sub-  
 21          mits the final report under subsection (e).”.

22          This Act may be cited as the “Legislative Branch Ap-  
 23          propriations Act, 2000”.
