(3) Revisions and Later submissions.—The Secretary shall permit late submissions and revisions of submissions after the final list of approved itineraries is published under paragraph (4)(C) and before the date that is 90 days before the start date of a requested itinerary, but a late submission or revision by a higher priority cruise vessel may not displace a priority assigned on the basis of timely submission by a lower priority cruise vessel. If operators of comparable vessels submit comparable requests within 30 days of each other, the priorities of this section apply at the discretion of the Secretary.

(4) Scheduling.—

(A) ACTION BY SECRETARY.—Within 60 days after receiving an itinerary submitted under this subsection, the Secretary shall—

(i) review the schedule for compliance with the priorities established by this section;

(ii) advise affected eruise ship operators of any specific itinerary that is not

1	available and the reason it is not available;

3	(iii) publish a proposed list of ap-
4	proved itineraries.
5	(B) OPERATORS RESPONSE.—If the Sec-
6	retary advises an operator under subparagraph
7	(A)(ii) that a requested itinerary is not avail-

9	retary's advice within 30 days after it is re-
10	ceived by the operator by appealing the Sec-
11	retary's decision or by submitting a new
12	itinerary proposal.
13	(C) RESOLUTION OF CONFLICTS.—As soon
14	as practicable after the end of the 30-day pe-
15	riod described in subparagraph (B), the Sec-
16	retary shall—
17	(i) resolve any appeals and consider
18	new itinerary proposals;
19	(ii) advise cruise ship operators who
20	responded under subparagraph (B) of the
21	Secretary's decision with respect to the ap-

23	(iii) publish a final list of approved
24	itineraries.

1 (f) ITINERARIES BEFORE FINAL LIST IS FIRST PUB-2 LISHED.—

- (1) REQUESTS. For itineraries before the first calendar year for which the Secretary publishes a final list of approved itineraries under subsection (e), the operator of a cruise vessel may submit a request for an itinerary to be sailed before that calendar year.
- (2) Conflicting Higher Priority USE.—If the itinerary submitted by an operator under paragraph (1) conflicts with an itinerary in use by a vessel with a higher priority under this section, the Secretary shall disapprove the request and notify the operator of the disapproval and the reason for the disapproval within 5 days (Saturdays, Sundays, and legal public holidays (as defined in section 6103 of title 5, United States Code, excepted) after the request is received.
 - (3) No initial conflict.—If the itinerary submitted by an operator under paragraph (1) does not conflict with an itinerary in use by a vessel with a higher priority under this section, the Secretary shall publish the request and the requested itinerary immediately. If, within 30 days after the request is published, the operator of a cruise vessel with a

- higher priority under this section requests the use of 1 2 the published itinerary, then the Secretary shall 3 deny the published request and approve the request 4 for the higher priority vessel. If no operator of a 5 cruise vessel with a higher priority under this section 6 requests the use of the published itinerary within 30 7 days after it is published, the Secretary shall ap-8 prove the requested itinerary and publish notice of 9 the approval.
- 10 (4) Publication of interim itineraries.—
 11 Until the first publication of a final list of approved
 12 itineraries under subsection (e), the Secretary shall
 13 publish, on a quarterly basis, a list of itineraries approved under this subsection.
- 15 (g) REPORT.—The Secretary shall issue an annual
 16 report on the number of operating days used by each
 17 eruise vessel assigned a priority under this section.

18 SEC. 106. CONSTRUCTION STANDARDS.

An eligible cruise vessel for which the Secretary has issued a permit under section 101(a) is deemed to be in compliance with the requirements of section 3309 of title 46, United States Code, if it meets the standards and conditions for the issuance of a control verification certificate for a cruise vessel documented under the laws of a foreign country embarking passengers in the United States.

22	SEC. 101. DOMESTIC CRUISE VESSEL.
23	(a) In General.—Notwithstanding the provisions of
24	section 8 of the Act of June 19, 1886 (46 U.S.C. App. 289),
25	section 27 of the Act of June 5, 1920, commonly known

- 1 as the Jones Act, (46 U.S.C. App. 883), section 27A of that
- 2 Act, (46 U.S.C. App. 883-1), and section 12106 of title 46,
- 3 United States Code, the Secretary shall issue a certificate
- 4 of documentation with a temporary coastwise endorsement
- 5 for an eligible cruise vessel not built in the United States
- 6 to operate in domestic itineraries in the transportation of
- 7 passengers in the coastwise trade between ports in the
- 8 United States if the vessel meets the requirements of this
- 9 title.
- 10 (b) Termination of Authority of
- 1 the Secretary to issue a certificate of documentation under
- 12 subsection (a) begins on the day after the date of enactment

If certificates of documentation are issued 15 under section 101(a) for more than 1 vessel for an op-16 erator, the construction contract required by the pre-17 ceding sentence shall provide for the construction of 1 18 more vessel than the number of vessels for which cer-19 tificates of documentation are issued with a total 20 combined berth or stateroom capacity equal to at least 21 the total combined berth or stateroom capacity of the 22 vessels for which the certificates of documentation are 23 issued.
 - (2) Demonstration of Capability Re-Quired.—For purposes of this subsection, a construc-

1	tion contract for which financing is not provided
2	under title XI of the Merchant Marine Act, 1936 (46

- Neither an eligible cruise vessel operating in domestic

- 18 (1) operate as a ferry;
- 19 (2) regularly carry for hire both passengers and

- 23 SEC. 105. PRIORITIES WITHIN DOMESTIC MARKETS.
- 24 (a) Notification of Secretary.—

1	(1) New vessels.—Any person eligible under
2	section 12102 of title 46, United States Code, to docu-
3	ment a vessel under chapter 121 of that title that en-
4	ters into a contract with a United States shippard for
5	the construction of a cruise vessel that—
6	(A) will be at least 20,000 gross registered
7	tons,
8	(B) will have no fewer than 800 passenger
9	berths, and
10	(C) is otherwise eligible for a certificate of

- 5 issue new or otherwise available permits to United States-
- 6 flag vessels carrying passengers for hire to enter Glacier
- 7 Bay or any other area within the jurisdiction of the Na-
