# A BILL

- To provide incentives for States to establish and administer periodic teacher testing and merit pay programs for elementary school and secondary school teachers.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; FINDINGS; AND PURPOSES.

- 4 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
  5 "Measures to Encourage Results in Teaching Act of
  6 1999".
- 7 (b) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-8 ing:

(1) All students deserve to be taught by welleducated, competent, and qualified teachers.

3 (2) More than ever before, education has and 4 will continue to become the ticket not only to eco-5 nomic success but to basic survival. Students will 6 not succeed in meeting the demands of a knowledge-7 based, 21st century society and economy if the stu-8 dents do not encounter more challenging work in 9 school. For future generations to have the opportu-10 nities to achieve success the future generations will 11 need to have an education and a teacher workforce 12 second to none.

(3) No other intervention can make the difference that a knowledgeable, skillful teacher can
make in the learning process. At the same time,
nothing can fully compensate for weak teaching that,
despite good intentions, can result from a teacher's
lack of opportunity to acquire the knowledge and
skill needed to help students master the curriculum.

(4) The Federal Government established the
Dwight D. Eisenhower Professional Development
Program in 1985 to ensure that teachers and other
educational staff have access to sustained and highquality professional development. This ongoing development must include the ability to demonstrate

and judge the performance of teachers and other in structional staff.

(5) States should evaluate their teachers on the
basis of demonstrated ability, including tests of subject matter knowledge, teaching knowledge, and
teaching skill. States should develop a test for their
teachers and other instructional staff with respect to
the subjects taught by the teachers and staff, and
should administer the test every 3 to 5 years.

10 (6) Evaluating and rewarding teachers with a 11 compensation system that supports teachers who be-12 come increasingly expert in a subject area, are pro-13 ficient in meeting the needs of students and schools, 14 and demonstrate high levels of performance meas-15 ured against professional teaching standards, will 16 encourage teachers to continue to learn needed skills 17 and broaden teachers' expertise, thereby enhancing 18 education for all students.

19 (c) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are as fol-20 lows:

(1) To provide incentives for States to establish

2	programs that have a significant impact on teacher
3	salary scales.
4	(3) To encourage programs that recognize and
5	reward the best teachers, and encourage those teach-
6	ers that need to do better.
7	SEC. 2. STATE INCENTIVES FOR TEACHER TESTING AND
8	MERIT PAY.
9	(a) AMENDMENTS.—Title II of the Elementary and
10	Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 6601 et
11	seq.), is amended—
12	(1) by redesignating part E as part F;
13	(2) by redesignating sections 2401 and 2402 as
14	sections 2501 and 2502, respectively; and
15	(3) by inserting after part D the following:
16	"PART E—STATE INCENTIVES FOR TEACHER
17	TESTING AND MERIT PAY
18	"SEC. 2401. STATE INCENTIVES FOR TEACHER TESTING
19	AND MERIT PAY.
20	"(a) STATE AWARDS.—Notwithstanding any other
21	provision of this title, from funds described in subsection
22	(b) that are made available for a fiscal year, the Secretary
23	shall make an award to each State that—
24	"(1) administers a test to each elementary
25	school and secondary school teacher in the State,

with respect to the subjects taught by the teacher,
 every 3 to 5 years; and

3 "(2) has an elementary school and secondary
4 school teacher compensation system that is based on
5 merit.

6 "(b) AVAILABLE FUNDING.—The amount of funds 7 referred to in subsection (a) that are available to carry 8 out this section for a fiscal year is 50 percent of the 9 amount of funds appropriated to carry out this title that 10 are in excess of the amount so appropriated for fiscal year 11 2000, except that no funds shall be available to carry out 12 this section for any fiscal year for which—

13 "(1) the amount appropriated to carry out this
14 title exceeds \$600,000,000; or

15 "(2) each of the several States is eligible to re-16 ceive an award under this section.

17 "(c) AWARD AMOUNT.—A State shall receive an 18 award under this section in an amount that bears the 19 same relation to the total amount available for awards 20 under this section for a fiscal year as the number of States 21 that are eligible to receive such an award for the fiscal 22 year bears to the total number of all States so eligible for 23 the fiscal year. "(d) USE OF FUNDS.—Funds provided under this
 section may be used by the States to carry out the activi ties described in section 2207.

4 "(e) DEFINITION OF STATE.—For the purpose of
5 this section, the term 'State' means each of the 50 States
6 and the District of Columbia.".

7 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by8 subsection (a) shall take effect on October 1, 2000.

### 9 SEC. 3. TEACHER TESTING AND MERIT PAY.

10 (a) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding any other provi11 sion of law, a State may use Federal education funds—

(1) to carry out a test of each elementary
school or secondary school teacher in the State with
respect to the subjects taught by the teacher; or

15 (2) to establish a merit pay program for the16 teachers.

(b) DEFINITIONS.—In this section, the terms "elementary school" and "secondary school" have the meanings given the terms in section 14101 of the Elementary
and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 8801).
