## A BILL

To establish America's education goals.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
  3 TITLE I—AMERICA'S EDUCATION
  4 GOALS
  5 SEC. 101. PURPOSE.
  6 The purpose of this title is to establish America's
- 8 SEC. 102. AMERICA'S NATIONAL EDUCATION GOALS.
- 9 Congress declares that America's Education Goals
- 10 are the following:

Education Goals.

- 11 (1) SCHOOL READINESS.—(A) All children in
- 12 America will start school ready to learn.

| 17 | cantly reduced through enhanced prenatal            |
| 18 | health systems.                                     |
| 19 | (2) School completion.—(A) The high                 |
| 20 | school graduation rate will increase to at least 90 |
| 21 | percent.  |
| 22 | (B) The objectives for this goal are that—          |
| 23 | (i) the Nation must dramatically reduce its         |
| 24 | school dropout rate, and 75 percent of the stu-     |

- dents who do drop out will successfully complete a high school degree or its equivalent; and
  - (ii) the gap in high school graduation rates between American students from minority backgrounds and their non-minority counterparts will be eliminated.
  - (3) STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AND CITIZEN-SHIP.—(A) All students will leave grades 4, 8, and 12 having demonstrated competency over challenging subject matter including English, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, arts, history, and geography, and every school in America will ensure that all students learn to use their minds well, so they may be prepared for responsible citizenship, further learning, and productive employment in our Nation's modern economy.

## (B) The objectives for this goal are that—

- (i) the academic performance of all students at the elementary and secondary level will increase significantly in every quartile, and the distribution of minority students in each quartile will more closely reflect the student population as a whole;
- (ii) the percentage of all students who demonstrate the ability to reason, solve prob-

- (iv) partnerships will be established, whenever possible, among local educational agencies, institutions of higher education, parents, and local labor, business, and professional associations to provide and support programs for the professional development of educators.

- 4 (b) Appointment and Pay of Employees.—
- 5 (1) IN GENERAL.—(A) The Director may appoint not more than 4 additional employees to serve as staff to the Goals Panel without regard to the provisions of title 5, United States Code, governing appointments in the competitive service.
  - (B) The employees appointed under subparagraph (A) may be paid without regard to the provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of that title relating to classification and General Schedule pay rates, but shall not be paid a rate that exceeds the maximum rate of basic pay payable for GS-15 of the General Schedule.
  - (2) Additional Employees.—The Director may appoint additional employees to serve as staff to the Goals Panel in accordance with title 5, United States Code.
