A BILL

- To prohibit the Federal Communications Commission from applying spectrum aggregation limits to spectrum assigned by auction after 1999.

 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Third-Generation
- 5 Wireless Internet Act.".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 7 The Congress finds the following:
- 8 (1) Mobile telephony has been one of the fastest
- 9 growing industries of the telecommunications sector,

offering consumers innovative services at affordable
 rates.

3 (2) Demand for mobile telecommunications
4 services has greatly exceeded industry expectations.

5 (3) Mobile carriers are poised to bring high6 speed Internet access to consumers through wireless
7 telecommunications devices.

8 (4) Third Generation mobile systems (herein9 after referred to as "3G") are capable of delivering
10 high-speed data services for Internet access and
11 other multimedia applications.

12 (5) Advanced wireless services such as 3G may
13 be the most efficient and economic way to provide
14 high-speed Internet access to rural areas of the
15 United States.

(6) Under the current Federal Communications
Commission rules, commercial mobile service providers may not use more than 45 megahertz of combined cellular, broadband Personal Communications
Service, and Specialized Mobile Radio spectrum
within any geographic area.

(7) Assignments of additional spectrum may be
needed to enable mobile operators to keep pace with
the demand for 3G services.

1	(8) The application of the current Commission
2	spectrum cap rules to new spectrum auctioned by
3	the FCC would greatly impede the deployment of 3G
4	services.
5	SEC. 3. WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICES.
6	Section 332(c) of the Communications Act of 1934
7	(47 U.S.C. 332(c)) is amended by adding at the end there-
8	of the following:
9	"(9) Non-Application of Spectrum Aggre-
10	GATION LIMITS TO NEW AUCTIONS.—
11	"(A) The Commission may not apply sec-
12	tion 20.6(a) of its regulations (47 C.F.R.
13	20.6(a)) to a license for spectrum assigned by
14	initial auction held after December 31, 1999.
15	"(B) The Commission may relax or elimi-
16	nate the spectrum aggregation limits of section
17	20.6 of its regulations (47 C.F.R. 20.6), but

18 may not lower these limits.".
