Mr. BIDEN introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred
to the Committee on the Judiciary

A BILL

To extend the authorization for the Violent Crime Reduction
Trust Fund.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. EXTENSION OF VIOLENT CRIME REDUCTION**
4 **TRUST FUND.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 310001(b) of the Violent
6 Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 (42
7 U.S.C. 14211) is amended by striking paragraphs (1)
8 through (5) and inserting the following:

9 “(1) for fiscal year 2001, \$6,025,000,000;

10 “(2) for fiscal year 2002, \$6,169,000,000;

11 “(3) for fiscal year 2003, \$6,316,000,000;

1 “(4) for fiscal year 2004, \$6,458,000,000; and
 2 “(5) for fiscal year 2005, \$6,616,000,000.”.

3 (b) DISCRETIONARY LIMITS.—Title XXXI of the Vio-
 4 lent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 (42
 5 U.S.C. 14211 et seq.) is amended by inserting after sec-
 6 tion 310001 the following:

7 **“SEC. 310002. DISCRETIONARY LIMITS.**

8 “For the purposes of allocations made for the discre-
 9 tionary category pursuant to section 302(a) of the Con-
 10 gressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 633(a)), the term
 11 ‘discretionary spending limit’ means—

12 “(1) with respect to fiscal year 2001—

13 “(A) for the discretionary category,
 14 amounts of budget authority and outlays nec-
 15 essary to adjust the discretionary spending lim-
 16 its to reflect the changes in subparagraph (B)
 17 as determined by the Chairman of the Budget
 18 Committee; and

19 “(B) for the violent crime reduction cat-
 20 egory: \$6,025,000,000 in new budget authority
 21 and \$5,718,000,000 in outlays;

22 “(2) with respect to fiscal year 2002—

23 “(A) for the discretionary category,
 24 amounts of budget authority and outlays nec-
 25 essary to adjust the discretionary spending lim-

1 its to reflect the changes in subparagraph (B)
2 as determined by the Chairman of the Budget
3 Committee; and

4 “(B) for the violent crime reduction cat-
5 egory: \$6,169,000,000 in new budget authority
6 and \$6,020,000,000 in outlays;

7 “(3) with respect to fiscal year 2003—

8 “(A) for the discretionary category,
9 amounts of budget authority and outlays nec-
10 essary to adjust the discretionary spending lim-
11 its to reflect the changes in subparagraph (B)
12 as determined by the Chairman of the Budget
13 Committee; and

14 “(B) for the violent crime reduction cat-
15 egory: \$6,316,000,000 in new budget authority
16 and \$6,161,000,000 in outlays;

17 “(4) with respect to fiscal year 2004—

18 “(A) for the discretionary category,
19 amounts of budget authority and outlays nec-
20 essary to adjust the discretionary spending lim-
21 its to reflect the changes in subparagraph (B)
22 as determined by the Chairman of the Budget
23 Committee; and

1 “(B) for the violent crime reduction cat-
2 egory: \$6,459,000,000 in new budget authority
3 and \$6,303,000,000 in outlays; and

4 “(5) with respect to fiscal year 2005—

5 “(A) for the discretionary category,
6 amounts of budget authority and outlays nec-
7 essary to adjust the discretionary spending lim-
8 its to reflect the changes in subparagraph (B)
9 as determined by the Chairman of the Budget
10 Committee; and

11 “(B) for the violent crime reduction cat-
12 egory: \$6,616,000 in new budget authority and
13 \$6,452,000,000 in outlays;

14 as adjusted in accordance with section 251(b) of the
15 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control
16 Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)) and section 314 of
17 the Congressional Budget Act of 1974.”.
