Mr. Kennedy introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

A BILL

- To amend the Energy Policy and Conservation Act to ensure that petroleum importers, refiners, and wholesalers accumulate minimally adequate supplies of home heating oil to meet reasonably foreseeable needs in the northeastern States.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Stable Oil Supply
 - 5 (SOS) Home Heating Act".
 - 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.
 - 7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

- 1 (1) more than 35 percent of families in the
 2 northeastern United States depend on oil to heat
 3 their homes each winter, and most of those families
 4 have no practical alternative to paying the going
 5 price for heating oil or seeking public or private as6 sistance to pay for heating oil;
 - (2) consumers experienced sudden and dramatic increases in prices for home heating oil during the winters of 1989, 1996, and 1999, causing hardship to families and other people of the United States, including people on fixed and low incomes, people living in rural areas, the elderly, farmers, truckers and the driving public, and governments that pay home heating oil bills;
 - (3) a substantial part of each sudden increase in home heating oil prices has been caused by vastly inadequate supplies of home heating oil accumulated during the summer, fall, and winter months by importers, refiners, and wholesalers; and
 - (4) increased stability in home heating oil prices is necessary to maintain the economic vitality of the Northeast.
- 23 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to ensure 24 that minimally adequate stocks of home heating oil are 25 accumulated in the Northeast to meet reasonably foresee-

2	heating oil inventory' means a heating oil inven-
3	tory held by an importer, refiner, or wholesaler.
4	"(B) Exclusion.—The term 'primary
5	heating oil inventory' does not include any in-
6	ventory held by a retailer for the direct sale to
7	an end user of home heating oil."; and

1	SEC. 4. HOME HEATING OIL RESERVE FOR THE NORTH
2	EAST.
3	Part B of the Energy Policy and Conservation Act
4	(15 U.S.C. 6231 et seq.) is amended by inserting after
5	section 157 the following:
6	"SEC. 157A. VOLUNTARY PLANS FOR HOME HEATING OIL
7	RESERVE.
8	"(a) Submission and Development of Vol-
9	UNTARY PLANS.—Importers, refiners, and wholesalers
10	that hold primary heating oil inventories for sale to mar-
11	kets in the Northeast, acting individually or in 1 or more
12	groups, should, for the purposes of ensuring stability in
13	energy fuel markets and protecting consumers from dra-
14	matic swings in price—
15	"(1) develop voluntary plans, in consultation
16	with interested individuals from nonprofit organiza-
17	tions and the public and private sectors, to maintain
18	readily available minimum product inventories of
19	heating oil in the Northeast, possibly in combination
20	with the hedging of future inventories, to mitigate
21	the risk of severe price increases to consumers and
22	to reduce adverse impacts on the regional and na
23	tional economies; and
24	"(2) submit the voluntary plans to the Sec-
25	retary not later than 180 days after the date of en-

1	"(b) Certification and Report.—
2	"(1) In general.—If the Secretary determines
3	that a plan submitted under subsection (a)—
4	"(A) is likely to achieve the purposes of
5	this Act, the Secretary shall so certify, and the
6	importer, refiner, or wholesaler shall implement
7	the plan; or
8	"(B) is not likely to achieve the purposes
9	of this section, the Secretary shall issue a state-
10	ment explaining why the plan does not appear
11	likely to achieve those purposes.
12	"(2) Report.—Not later than 240 days after
13	the date of enactment of this section, the Secretary
14	shall submit to Congress a report describing the
15	findings and reasons for a certification or failure to
16	certify a plan under this subsection.
17	"(c) Defense to Antitrust Actions.—
18	"(1) In general.—There shall be available as
19	a defense to a civil or criminal action brought under
20	the antitrust laws (or any similar State law) with re-
21	spect to an action taken to develop and carry out a
22	voluntary plan under subsection (a) by an importer
23	refiner, or wholesaler the fact that—
24	"(A) the action is taken—

1	"(i) in the course of developing the
2	voluntary plan; and
3	"(ii) in the course of carrying out the
4	voluntary plan, if the voluntary plan is cer-
5	tified by the Secretary under subsection
6	(b);
7	"(B) the action is not taken for the pur-
8	pose of injuring competition; and
9	"(C) the importer, refiner, or wholesaler is
10	in compliance with this section.
11	"(2) Limitation.—Except in the case of an ac-
12	tion taken to develop a voluntary plan, the defense
13	provided in paragraph (1) shall be available only if
14	the person asserting the defense demonstrates that
15	the action was specified in, or within the reasonable
16	contemplation of, a voluntary plan certified by the
17	Secretary.
18	"(3) Burden of Proof.—A person inter-
19	posing the defense under paragraph (1) shall have
20	the burden of proof, except that the burden shall be
21	on the person against which the defense is asserted
22	with respect to whether an action is taken for the
23	purpose of injuring competition.
24	"(d) Report.—Not later than 1 year after the date
25	of enactment of this section, and annually thereafter, the

- 1 Secretary shall submit to Congress a report describing the
- 2 results of the implementation of all voluntary plans cer-
- 3 tified under this section, including specific compliance by
- 4 importers, refiners, and wholesalers that serve the North-
- 5 east market with respect to the adequacy of the home
- 6 heating oil supply.
- 7 "(e) Plan Adopted by Secretary.—If, by the
- 8 date that is 240 days after the date of enactment of this
- 9 section, for each importer, refiner, and wholesaler in the
- 10 Northeast, a certified plan is not implemented in accord-
- 11 ance with subsection (b), the Secretary shall adopt and
- 12 implement a plan in accordance with section 157B.
- 13 "SEC. 157B. HOME HEATING OIL RESERVE FOR THE NORTH-
- 14 EAST.
- 15 "(a) Establishment of Private Home Heating
- 16 OIL RESERVES.—If a certified plan described in section
- 17 157A is not implemented in accordance with that section
- 18 for each importer, refiner, and wholesaler that stores home
- 19 heating oil for sale in the Northeast, not later than 300
- 20 days after the date of enactment of this section, the Sec-
- 21 retary shall establish a private home heating oil reserve
- 22 for the Northeast in accordance with this section.
- 23 "(b) Inventory.—
- 24 "(1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in para-
- graph (2), the Secretary shall periodically monitor

supply levels as necessary to ensure that each importer, refiner, and wholesaler of home heating oil that stores home heating oil for sale in the Northeast shall have in inventory and readily available to refiners in the Northeast a quantity of home heating oil that the Secretary determines is equal to the quantity that each importer, refiner, or wholesaler may reasonably be expected to require to supply the needs of its customers during the present or following winter season without subjecting consumers to sudden price increases that are due in part to inadequate buildup of heating oil inventories.

- "(2) LIMITATION.—The Secretary shall not require any importer, refiner, or wholesaler to store any product under paragraph (1) in a quantity greater than 95 percent of the average storage capacity for home heating oil reasonably available to the importer, refiner, or wholesaler during the preceding 2 years.
- "(3) Increased inventory.—If the Secretary determines that an inventory of home heating oil does not meet the requirement of under paragraph (1), the Secretary may direct an importer, refiner, or wholesaler to acquire, store, and maintain in readily available inventories any quantity of home heating

- oil that the Secretary determines to be necessary to supply heating oil needs in the Northeast without subjecting consumers to sudden price increases that are due in part to inadequate buildup of heating oil

- 6 "(4) REGULATIONS.—As soon as practicable 7 after the date of enactment of this section, the Sec-8 retary shall promulgate regulations necessary to 9 carry out this section, including regulations that—
- 10 "(A) authorize civil penalties to enforce 11 this section; and
- 12 "(B) provide that the Secretary shall co-13 operate with State energy authorities in car-14 rying out this section.
- "(c) EXCESS INVENTORY.—At the end of each winter season, the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency shall take appropriate and reasonable action to enable importers, refiners, and wholesalers of home heating oil to sell any remaining excess inventories of heat-
- 20 ing oil that the importers, refiners, and wholesalers may21 have.
- 22 "(d) Implementation.—In implementing this sec-
- 23 tion, the Secretary shall ensure, to the maximum extent
- 24 practicable, that the manner of implementation supports

- 1 the maintenance of an economically sound and competitive
- 2 petroleum industry.
- 3 "(e) Report.—Not later than 1 year after the imple-
- 4 mentation of a plan under this section, the Secretary shall
- 5 submit to Congress a report describing the results of the
- 6 implementation of the plan, including specific compliance
- 7 by importers, refiners, and wholesalers in the Northeast
- 8 with respect to home heating oil supply buildup.".
