Mr. DeWine introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

## A BILL

To provide for teacher training facilities.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "Teacher Quality Act of 1999".

SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.

(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

(1) individuals entering a classroom should have

a sound grasp of the subject the individuals intend

to teach, and the individuals should know how to

- 1 (2) the quality of teachers impacts student 2 achievement;
- 3 (3) people who enter the teaching profession 4 through alternative certification programs can ben-5 efit from having the opportunity to attend a teacher 6 training facility;
  - (4) teachers need to increase their subject matter knowledge;
  - (5) less than 40 percent of the individuals teaching the core subjects (English, mathematics, science, social studies, and foreign languages) majored or minored in the core subjects; and
  - (6) according to the Third International Mathematics and Science Study, American high school seniors finished near the bottom of the study in both science and mathematics.
- 17 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to 18 strengthen teacher training programs by establishing a 19 private and public partnership to create the best teacher 20 training facilities in the world to ensure that teachers re-21 ceive unlimited access to the most updated technology and 22 skills training in education, so that students can benefit

from the teachers' knowledge and experience.

- 24 SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.
- 25 In this Act:

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- 1 (1) Local Educational agency.—The term
- 2 "local educational agency" has the meaning given
- 3 the term in section 14101 of the Elementary and
- 4 Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 8801).
- 5 (2) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
- 6 the Secretary of Education.

#### 7 SEC. 4. GRANTS.

- 8 (a) In General.—From amounts appropriated
- 9 under section 5 for a fiscal year the Secretary shall award
- 10 grants to local educational agencies to enable the local
- 11 educational agencies to establish teacher training facilities
- 12 for elementary and secondary school teachers.
- 13 (b) Competitive Basis.—The Secretary shall award
- 14 grants under this Act on a competitive basis.
- 15 (c) Partnership Contract Required.—In order
- 16 to receive a grant under this Act, a local educational agen-
- 17 cy shall enter into a contract with a nongovernmental or-
- 18 ganization to establish a teacher training facility.
- 19 (d) Applications.—Each local educational agency
- 20 desiring a grant under this Act shall submit to the Sec-
- 21 retary an application at such time, in such manner, and
- 22 accompanied by such information as the Secretary may
- 23 require. Each such application shall contain an assurance
- 24 that the local educational agency—

1	(1) will raise matching funds, from public or
2	private sources, for the support of the teacher train-
3	ing facility in an amount equal to the amount of
4	funds provided under the grant;

- (2) will train the teachers employed by the local educational agency at the teacher training facility for a period of 10 years after the date the agency enters into the contract described in subsection (c); and
- 10 (3) will spend not less than 0.5 percent of the 11 local educational agency's total school budget for 12 each fiscal year to support the teacher training facil-13 ity.
- 14 (e) AMOUNT.—The Secretary shall award each grant 15 under this section in an amount that is not less than 16 \$1,000,000 and not more than \$4,000,000.

### 17 SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out 19 this Act \$8,000,000 for fiscal year 2000, \$12,000,000 for 20 fiscal year 2001, \$12,000,000 for fiscal year 2002, and 21 \$16,000,000 for fiscal year 2003.

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
