Mr. COVERDELL (for himself, Mr. THURMOND, Mr. CLELAND, and Mr. HOLLINGS) introduced the following joint resolution; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

JOINT RESOLUTION

To grant the consent of Congress to the boundary change between Georgia and South Carolina.

1 *Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives*

2 *of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. CONSENT OF CONGRESS.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—The consent of Congress is given
5 to the establishment of the boundary between the States
6 of Georgia and South Carolina.

7 (b) NEW BOUNDARY.—The boundary referred to in
8 subsection (a) is the boundary—

1 (1) agreed to by the State of Georgia in Act
2 Number 1044 (S.B. No. 572) approved by the Gov-
3 ernor on April 5, 1994; and

4 (2) agreed to by the State of South Carolina in
5 Act Number 1315 (G.B. No. 415) approved by the
6 Governor on May 29, 1996.

7 (c) COMPACT.—The Acts referred to in subsection (b)
8 are recognized by Congress as an interstate compact pur-
9 suant to section 10 of article IV of the United States Con-
10 stitution.
