Mr. ROGERS of Michigan submitted the following concurrent resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Armed Services, and in addition to the Committee on International Relations, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Expressing appreciation to the courageous men and women of the Armed Forces and to participating nations for their dedication and sacrifice in Operation Enduring Freedom.

Whereas on October 7, 2001, the Armed Forces commenced air strikes on the Taliban regime in Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom, and the courageous men and women of the Armed Forces have demonstrated their sacrifice and dedication during this operation;

Whereas many nations have joined the fight against terrorism by offering a range of military and other assistance for this endeavor; and

Whereas Operation Enduring Freedom has thus far achieved broad military success, essentially ending the domination of the al Qaeda terrorist network in Afghanistan by driving the Taliban from power in that nation: Now, therefore, be it

1 *Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate*
 2 *concurring)*, That the Congress—

3 (1) recognizes and commends the men and
 4 women of the Armed Forces and their families for
 5 their dedication and sacrifice in the defense of free-
 6 dom during Operation Enduring Freedom; and

7 (2) recognizes and commends the members of
 8 the global coalition participating in Operation En-
 9 during Freedom, especially the United Kingdom,
 10 Australia, Canada, the Czech Republic, France, Ger-
 11 many, Italy, Japan, New Zealand, Poland, Russia,
 12 and Turkey.
