## A BILL

To protect school web pages from fraud and related activity.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “School Safety En-  
5       hancement and Website Protection Act of 2001”.

6       **SEC. 2. PROTECTION OF SCHOOL WEB PAGES FROM FRAUD**  
7       **AND RELATED ACTIVITY.**

8       Section 1030 of title 18, United States Code, is  
9       amended—

10               (1) in section (a)(2)(A), by inserting before the  
11       semicolon at the end the following: “, or contained

1 in an educational record of an educational institu-  
2 tion”;

3 (2) in subsection (e)(2)(A)—

4 (A) by striking “a financial institution”  
5 and inserting “an educational institution, a fi-  
6 nancial institution,”; and

7 (B) by striking “the financial institution”  
8 and inserting “the educational institution, the  
9 financial institution,”;

10 (3) in subsection (e)(8)(D), by striking “; and”  
11 and inserting “, or poses a threat to public health  
12 or safety;”;

13 (4) in subsection (e)(9), by striking the period  
14 at the end and inserting “; and”; and

15 (5) in subsection (e), by adding at the end the  
16 following new paragraph:

17 “(10) the term ‘educational institution’ includes  
18 an elementary school (as defined in section 14101 of  
19 the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of  
20 1965 (20 U.S.C. 8801)), secondary school (as de-  
21 fined in such section), and institution of higher edu-  
22 cation (as defined in section 101 of the Higher Edu-  
23 cation Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001)).”.
