A BILL

To provide for demonstration and evaluation of, and dissemination of information concerning, promising approaches to promoting and supporting involved, committed, and responsible fatherhood, and promoting and supporting healthy marriages, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- This Act may be cited as the "Promotion and Sup-
- 5 port of Responsible Fatherhood and Healthy Marriage Act
- 6 of 2001".

1 SEC. 2. FATHERHOOD PROGRAM.

2	Title IV of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 601
3	et seq.) is amended by inserting after part B the following
4	"PART C—FATHERHOOD PROGRAM
5	"SEC. 441. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.
6	"(a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds that there is
7	substantial evidence strongly indicating the urgent need
8	to promote and support involved, committed, and respon-
9	sible fatherhood, and to encourage and support healthy
10	marriages between parents raising children, including data
11	demonstrating the following:-
12	"(1) In approximately 90 percent of cases
13	where a parent is absent, that parent is the father
14	"(2) By some estimates, 60 percent of children
15	born in the 1990s will spend a significant portion of
16	their childhood in a home without a father.
17	"(3) Nearly 75 percent of children in single-
18	parent homes will experience poverty before they are
19	11 years old, compared with only 20 percent of chil-
20	dren in 2-parent families.
21	"(4) Low income is positively correlated with
22	children's difficulties with education, social adjust-
23	ment, and delinquency, and single-parent households
24	constitute a disproportionate share of low-income
25	households.

- 1 "(5) Where families (whether intact or with a 2 parent absent) are living in poverty, a significant 3 factor is the father's lack of job skills.
 - "(6) Children raised in 2-parent married families, on average, fare better as a group in key areas, including better school performance, reduced rates of substance abuse, crime, and delinquency, fewer health, emotional, and behavioral problems, lower rates of teenage sexual activity, less risk of abuse or neglect, and lower risk of teen suicide.
 - "(7) Committed and responsible fathering during infancy and early childhood contributes to the development of emotional security, curiosity, and math and verbal skills.
 - "(8) An estimated 24,000,000 children (33.5 percent) live apart from their biological father.
 - "(9) A recent national survey indicates that of all children under age 18 not living with their biological father, 29 percent had not seen their father even once in the last 12 months.
- 21 "(b) Purposes.—The purposes of this part are:
 - "(1) To provide for projects and activities by public entities and by nonprofit community entities, including religious organizations, designed to test

promising approaches to accomplishing the following objectives:

"(A) Promoting responsible, caring, and effective parenting through counseling, mentoring, and parenting education, dissemination of educational materials and information on parenting skills, encouragement of positive father involvement, including the positive involvement of nonresident fathers, and other methods.

"(B) Enhancing the abilities and commitment of unemployed or low-income fathers to provide material support for their families and to avoid or leave welfare programs by assisting them to take full advantage of education, job training, and job search programs, to improve work habits and work skills, to secure career advancement by activities such as outreach and information dissemination, coordination, as appropriate, with employment services and job training programs, including the One-Stop delivery system established under title I of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998, encouragement and support of regular and timely pay-

1 ment of child support in appropriate cases, and 2 other methods.

"(C) Improving fathers' ability to effectively manage family business affairs by means such as education, counseling, and mentoring in matters including household management, budgeting, banking, and handling of financial transactions, time management, and home maintenance.

"(D) Encouraging and supporting healthy marriages and married fatherhood through such activities as premarital education, including the use of premarital inventories, marriage preparation programs, skills-based marriage education programs, marital therapy, couples counseling, divorce education and reduction programs, divorce mediation and counseling, relationship skills enhancement programs, including those designed to reduce child abuse and domestic violence, and dissemination of information about the benefits of marriage for both parents and children.

"(2) Through the projects and activities described in paragraph (1), to improve outcomes for children with respect to measures such as increased

- 1 family income and economic security, improved
- 2 school performance, better health, improved emo-
- 3 tional and behavioral stability and social adjustment,
- 4 and reduced risk of delinquency, crime, substance
- 5 abuse, child abuse and neglect, teen sexual activity,
- 6 and teen suicide.
- 7 "(3) To evaluate the effectiveness of various ap-
- 8 proaches and to disseminate findings concerning out-
- 9 comes and other information in order to encourage
- and facilitate the replication of effective approaches
- 11 to accomplishing these objectives.

12 "SEC. 442. DEFINITIONS.

- "In this part, the terms 'Indian tribe' and 'tribal or-
- 14 ganization' have the meanings given them in subsections
- 15 (e) and (l), respectively, of section 4 of the Indian Self-
- 16 Determination and Education Assistance Act.

17 "SEC. 443. COMPETITIVE GRANTS FOR SERVICE PROJECTS.

- 18 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may make grants
- 19 for fiscal years 2002 through 2006 to public and nonprofit
- 20 community entities, including religious organizations, and
- 21 to Indian tribes and tribal organizations, for demonstra-
- 22 tion service projects and activities designed to test the ef-
- 23 fectiveness of various approaches to accomplish the objec-
- 24 tives specified in section 441(b)(1).

1	"(b) Eligibility Criteria for Full Service
2	GRANTS.—In order to be eligible for a grant under this
3	section, except as specified in subsection (c), an entity
4	shall submit an application to the Secretary containing the
5	following:
6	"(1) Project description.—A statement
7	including—
8	"(A) a description of the project and how
9	it will be carried out, including the geographical
10	area to be covered and the number and charac-
11	teristics of clients to be served, and how it will
12	address each of the 4 objectives specified in sec-
13	tion $441(b)(1)$; and
14	"(B) a description of the methods to be
15	used by the entity or its contractor to assess
16	the extent to which the project was successful
17	in accomplishing its specific objectives and the
18	general objectives specified in section 441(b)(1).
19	"(2) Experience and qualifications.—A
20	demonstration of ability to carry out the project, by
21	means such as demonstration of experience in suc-
22	cessfully carrying out projects of similar design and
23	scope, and such other information as the Secretary
24	may find necessary to demonstrate the entity's ca-
25	pacity to carry out the project, including the entity's

- ability to provide the non-Federal share of project resources.
- "(3) Addressing child abuse and domestic

 Violence.—A description of how the entity will assess for the presence of, and intervene to resolve, domestic violence and child abuse, including how the

 entity will coordinate with State and local child protective service and domestic violence programs.
 - "(4) Addressing concerns relating to substance abuse and sexual activity.—A commitment to make available to each individual participating in the project education about alcohol, to-bacco, and other drugs, and about the health risks associated with abusing such substances, and information about diseases and conditions transmitted through substance abuse and sexual contact, including HIV/AIDS, and to coordinate with providers of services addressing such problems, as appropriate.
 - "(5) COORDINATION WITH SPECIFIED PRO-GRAMS.—An undertaking to coordinate, as appropriate, with State and local entities responsible for the programs under parts A, B, and D of this title, including programs under title I of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (including the One-Stop de-

- livery system), and such other programs as the Sec retary may require.
- "(6) Records, reports, and audits.—An agreement to maintain such records, make such reports, and cooperate with such reviews or audits as the Secretary may find necessary for purposes of oversight of project activities and expenditures.
 - "(7) Self-initiated evaluation.—If the entity elects to contract for independent evaluation of the project (part or all of the cost of which may be paid for using grant funds), a commitment to submit to the Secretary a copy of the evaluation report within 30 days after completion of the report and not more than 1 year after completion of the project.
 - "(8) Cooperation with Secretary's oversight and evaluation.—An agreement to cooperate with the Secretary's evaluation of projects assisted under this section, by means including random assignment of clients to service recipient and control groups, if determined by the Secretary to be appropriate, and affording the Secretary access to the project and to project-related records and documents, staff, and clients.
- 24 "(c) ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR LIMITED PURPOSE 25 Grants.—In order to be eligible for a grant under this

- 1 section in an amount under \$25,000 per fiscal year, an
- 2 entity shall submit an application to the Secretary con-
- 3 taining the following:
- 4 "(1) Project description.—A description of
- 5 the project and how it will be carried out, including
- 6 the number and characteristics of clients to be
- 7 served, the proposed duration of the project, and
- 8 how it will address at least 1 of the 4 objectives
- 9 specified in section 441(b)(1).
- 10 "(2) QUALIFICATIONS.—Such information as
- 11 the Secretary may require as to the capacity of the
- entity to carry out the project, including any pre-
- vious experience with similar activities.
- 14 "(3) Coordination with related pro-
- 15 Grams.—As required by the Secretary in appro-
- priate cases, an undertaking to coordinate and co-
- operate with State and local entities responsible for
- specific programs relating to the objectives of the
- 19 project including, as appropriate, jobs programs and
- programs serving children and families.
- 21 "(4) Records, Reports, and Audits.—An
- agreement to maintain such records, make such re-
- ports, and cooperate with such reviews or audits as
- the Secretary may find necessary for purposes of
- oversight of project activities and expenditures.

"(5) COOPERATION WITH SECRETARY'S OVERSIGHT AND EVALUATION.—An agreement to cooperate with the Secretary's evaluation of projects assisted under this section, by means including affording the Secretary access to the project and to
project-related records and documents, staff, and clients.

"(d) Considerations in Awarding Grants.—

- "(1) DIVERSITY OF PROJECTS.—In awarding grants under this section, the Secretary shall seek to achieve a balance among entities of differing sizes, entities in differing geographic areas, entities in urban and in rural areas, and entities employing differing methods of achieving the purposes of this section.
- "(2) Preference for projects serving Low-income fathers.—In awarding grants under this section, the Secretary may give preference to applications for projects in which a majority of the clients to be served are low-income fathers.

"(e) Federal Share.—

"(1) IN GENERAL.—Grants for a project under this section for a fiscal year shall be available for a share of the cost of such project in such fiscal year equal to—

"(A) up to 80 percent (or up to 90 per-1 2 cent, if the entity demonstrates to the Secretary's satisfaction circumstances limiting the 3 4 entity's ability to secure non-Federal resources) 5 in the case of a project under subsection (b); 6 and "(B) up to 100 percent, in the case of a 7 8 project under subsection (c). 9 "(2) Non-federal share.—The non-federal 10 share may be in cash or in kind. In determining the 11 amount of the non-Federal share, the Secretary may 12 attribute fair market value to goods, services, and 13 facilities contributed from non-Federal sources. 14 "SEC. 444. MULTICITY, MULTISTATE DEMONSTRATION 15 PROJECTS. "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may make grants 16 under this section for fiscal years 2002 through 2006 to eligible entities (as specified in subsection (b)) for 2 18 19 multicity, multistate projects demonstrating approaches to 20 achieving the objectives specified in section 441(b)(1). One 21 of the projects shall test the use of married couples to 22 deliver program services. 23 "(b) Eligible Entities.—An entity eligible for a

grant under this section must be a national nonprofit fa-

- 1 therhood promotion organization that meets the following
- 2 requirements:
- 3 "(1) Experience with fatherhood pro-
- 4 Grams.—The organization must have substantial ex-
- 5 perience in designing and successfully conducting
- 6 programs that meet the purposes described in sec-
- 7 tion 441.
- 8 "(2) Experience with multicity,
- 9 MULTISTATE PROGRAMS AND GOVERNMENT COORDI-
- 10 NATION.—The organization must have experience in
- simultaneously conducting such programs in more
- than 1 major metropolitan area in more than 1
- 13 State and in coordinating such programs, where ap-
- propriate, with State and local government agencies
- and private, nonprofit agencies (including commu-
- 16 nity-based and religious organizations), including
- 17 State or local agencies responsible for child support
- 18 enforcement and workforce development.
- 19 "(c) Application Requirements.—In order to be
- 20 eligible for a grant under this section, an entity must sub-
- 21 mit to the Secretary an application that includes the fol-
- 22 lowing:
- "(1) QUALIFICATIONS.—

1	"(A) Eligible entity.—A demonstration
2	that the entity meets the requirements of sub-
3	section (b).
4	"(B) Other.—Such other information as
5	the Secretary may find necessary to dem-
6	onstrate the entity's capacity to carry out the
7	project, including the entity's ability to provide
8	the non-Federal share of project resources.
9	"(2) Project description.—A description of
10	and commitments concerning the project design, in-
11	cluding the following:
12	"(A) IN GENERAL.—A detailed description
13	of the proposed project design and how it will
14	be carried out, which shall—
15	"(i) provide for the project to be con-
16	ducted in at least 3 major metropolitan
17	areas;
18	"(ii) state how it will address each of
19	the 4 objectives specified in section
20	441(b)(1);
21	"(iii) demonstrate that there is a suf-
22	ficient number of potential clients to allow
23	for the random selection of individuals to
24	participate in the project and for compari-
25	sons with appropriate control groups com-

1	posed of individuals who have not partici-
2	pated in such projects; and
3	"(iv) demonstrate that the project is
4	designed to direct a majority of project re-
5	sources to activities serving low-income fa-
6	thers (but the project need not make serv-
7	ices available on a means-tested basis).
8	"(B) Oversight, evaluation, and ad-
9	JUSTMENT COMPONENT.—An agreement that
10	the entity—
11	"(i) in consultation with the evaluator
12	selected pursuant to section 445, and as
13	required by the Secretary, will modify the
14	project design, initially and (if necessary)
15	subsequently throughout the duration of
16	the project, in order to facilitate ongoing
17	and final oversight and evaluation of
18	project operation and outcomes (by means
19	including, to the maximum extent feasible,
20	random assignment of clients to service re-
21	cipient and control groups), and to provide
22	for mid-course adjustments in project de-
23	sign indicated by interim evaluations;

1 "(ii) will submit to the Secretary re-2 vised descriptions of the project design as 3 modified in accordance with clause (i); and 4 "(iii) will cooperate fully with the Sec-

"(iii) will cooperate fully with the Secretary's ongoing oversight and ongoing and final evaluation of the project, by means including affording the Secretary access to the project and to project-related records and documents, staff, and clients.

"(3) Addressing child abuse and domestic violence.—A description of how the entity will assess for the presence of, and intervene to resolve, domestic violence and child abuse, including how the entity will coordinate with State and local child protective service and domestic violence programs.

"(4) Addressing concerns relating to substance abuse and sexual activity.—A commitment to make available to each individual participating in the project education about alcohol, to-bacco, and other drugs, and about the health risks associated with abusing such substances, and information about diseases and conditions transmitted through substance abuse and sexual contact, including HIV/AIDS, and to coordinate with providers of services addressing such problems, as appropriate.

"(5) Coordination with specified pro-1 2 GRAMS.—An undertaking to coordinate, as appro-3 priate, with State and local entities responsible for 4 the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, Wel-5 fare-to-Work, Child Support Enforcement, and Child 6 Welfare Service programs under title IV of the So-7 cial Security Act, programs under title I of the 8 Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (including the 9 One-Stop delivery system), and such other programs 10 as the Secretary may require.

"(6) RECORDS, REPORTS, AND AUDITS.—An agreement to maintain such records, make such reports, and cooperate with such reviews or audits (in addition to those required under the preceding provisions of paragraph (2)) as the Secretary may find necessary for purposes of oversight of project activities and expenditures.

"(d) Federal Share.—

- "(1) IN GENERAL.—Grants for a project under this section for a fiscal year shall be available for up to 80 percent of the cost of such project in such fiscal year.
- "(2) Non-federal share.—The non-federal share may be in cash or in kind. In determining the amount of the non-federal share, the Secretary may

EVALUATION. 4 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, directly or by 5 contract or cooperative agreement, shall evaluate the effectiveness of service projects funded under sections 443 and 6 444 from the standpoint of the purposes specified in sec-8 tion 441(b)(1). 9 "(b) EVALUATION Methodology.—Evaluations under this section shall— 10 "(1) include, to the maximum extent feasible, 11 12 random assignment of clients to service delivery and 13 control groups and other appropriate comparisons of 14 groups of individuals receiving and not receiving 15 services; "(2) describe and measure the effectiveness of 16 17 the projects in achieving their specific project goals; 18 and 19 "(3) describe and assess, as appropriate, the 20 impact of such projects on marriage, parenting, do-21 mestic violence, child abuse, money management,

employment and earnings, payment of child support,

and child well-being, health, and education.

- "(c) EVALUATION REPORTS.—The Secretary shall 1 publish the following reports on the results of the evalua-3 tion: "(1) An implementation evaluation report cov-4 5 ering the first 24 months of the activities under this 6 part to be completed by 36 months after initiation 7 of such activities. "(2) A final report on the evaluation to be com-8 9 pleted by September 30, 2009. 10 "SEC. 446. PROJECTS OF NATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE. 11 The Secretary is authorized, by grant, contract, or 12 cooperative agreement, to carry out projects and activities of national significance relating to fatherhood promotion, 13 including— 14 15 "(1) Collection and dissemination of in-16 FORMATION.—Assisting States, communities, and 17 private entities, including religious organizations, in 18 efforts to promote and support marriage and respon-19 sible fatherhood by collecting, evaluating, developing, 20 and making available (through the Internet and by 21 other means) to all interested parties information re-22 garding approaches to accomplishing the objectives 23 specified in section 441(b)(1).
- 24 "(2) Media campaign.—Developing, pro-25 moting, and distributing to interested States, local

governments, public agencies, and private nonprofit organizations, including charitable and religious organizations, a media campaign that promotes and encourages involved, committed, and responsible fa-

therhood and married fatherhood.

- 6 "(3) TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.—Providing tech7 nical assistance, including consultation and training,
 8 to public and private entities, including community
 9 organizations and faith-based organizations, in the
 10 implementation of local fatherhood promotion pro11 grams.
- 12 "(4) Research.—Conducting research related 13 to the purposes of this part.

14 "SEC. 447. NONDISCRIMINATION.

5

"The projects and activities assisted under this part shall be available on the same basis to all fathers and expectant fathers able to benefit from such projects and activities, including married and unmarried fathers and custodial and noncustodial fathers, with particular attention to low-income fathers, and to mothers and expectant mothers on the same basis as to fathers.

1 "SEC. 448. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS; RES-

- 2 ERVATION FOR CERTAIN PURPOSE.
- 3 "(a) AUTHORIZATION.—There are authorized to be
- 4 appropriated \$64,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2002
- 5 through 2006 to carry out the provisions of this part.
- 6 "(b) Reservation.—Of the amount appropriated
- 7 under this section for each fiscal year, 15 percent, but in
- 8 no event less than \$5,000,000, shall be available for the
- 9 costs of the multicity, multistate demonstration projects
- 10 under section 444, evaluations under section 445, and
- 11 projects of national significance under section 446.".
