A BILL

- To direct the Attorney General to establish a program for the certification of Federal pilot officers, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Federal Pilot Officer
- 5 Act of 2001".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 7 Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) On September 11, 2001, terrorists hijacked
 9 4 civilian aircraft, crashing 2 of the aircraft into the
 10 towers of the World Trade Center in New York,

1	New York, and a third aircraft into the Pentagon
2	outside of the District of Columbia.
3	(2) Thousands of innocent Americans and citi-
4	zens of other countries were killed or injured as a
5	result of these attacks, including the passengers and
6	crew of the 4 aircraft, workers in the World Trade
7	Center and in the Pentagon, rescue workers, and by-
8	standers.
9	(3) These attacks destroyed both towers of the
10	World Trade Center, as well as adjacent buildings,
11	and seriously damaged the Pentagon.
12	(4) These attacks were by far the deadliest ter-
13	rorist attacks ever launched against the United
14	States and, by targeting symbols of America, clearly
15	were intended to intimidate the Nation and weaken
16	its resolve.
17	(5) Armed pilots, copilots, and flight engineers
18	with proper training will be the last line of defense
19	against terrorists by providing cockpit security and
20	aircraft security.
21	(6) Secured doors separating the crew cabin
22	from the passenger cabin have been effective in de-
23	terring hijackings in other nations and will serve as
24	a deterrent to future contemplated acts of terrorism
25	in the United States.

1SEC. 3. AVIATION SAFETY; SUPPRESSION OF TERRORISM2ON COMMERCIAL AIRCRAFT.

3 (a) Possession of Firearms on Commercial FLIGHTS.—No Federal department or agency may pro-4 5 hibit a pilot, copilot, or flight engineer of a commercial aircraft who has successfully completed the requirements 6 7 of subsection (b), or any qualified law enforcement per-8 sonnel specifically detailed for the protection of a commer-9 cial aircraft, who is not otherwise prohibited by law from possessing a firearm, from possessing or carrying a fire-10 11 arm for the protection of the aircraft.

12 (b) FEDERAL PILOT OFFICERS.—

13 (1) ESTABLISHMENT OF PROGRAM.—The Attor-14 ney General shall establish a program to select, cer-15 tify, train, and supervise qualified volunteer pilots, 16 copilots, and flight engineers who shall be deputized 17 as Federal pilot officers. Officers certified under the 18 program shall be responsible for defending the lives 19 of the individuals in the cockpit of a commercial air-20 craft.

(2) TRAINING AND SUPERVISION; BACKGROUND
AND FITNESS EXAMINATIONS.—Under the program,
the Attorney General shall provide appropriate training and supervision of all Federal pilot officers, as
well as appropriate background and fitness examina-

tions of eligible candidates, as part of their certifi cation.

3 (3) LIMITATION ON AUTHORITY.—The author4 ity granted to a Federal pilot officer shall be limited
5 to enforcing Federal law in the cockpit of a commer6 cial aircraft, as necessary to defend the aircraft.
7 (4) REQUESTS FOR TRAINING.—The Attorney

8 General shall provide appropriate training to any
9 pilot, copilot, or flight engineer that requests train10 ing pursuant to this subsection.

11 (c) REGULATIONS.—The Attorney General may pre-12 scribe regulations to carry out this section.

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
