Mr. Bereuter introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on International Relations

A BILL

To provide assistance to address long-term food production and rural development needs in Afghanistan and the Central Asian Republics.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Afghanistan and Cen-
- 5 tral Asian Republics Sustainable Food Production Act of
- 6 2001".
- 7 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 8 Congress finds that—
- 9 (1) abject poverty and the inability to produce
- 10 food, even at the subsistence level, in the rural,

- 1 mountainous areas of Afghanistan and the Central 2 Asian Republics have plagued the region for over 20 3 years;
 - (2) extended food shortages in this region have resulted in the consumption of seed supplies and breeding livestock necessary to continue farming and food production;
 - (3) ongoing and violent conflict in the region has badly damaged or destroyed the basic irrigation systems necessary for food production;
 - (4) despite the delivery of over \$185,000,000 in aid from the United States in fiscal year 2001 toward humanitarian assistance needs in Afghanistan, millions of people remain at risk of severe malnutrition and starvation in the short- and long-terms;
 - (5) on October 4, 2001, President George W. Bush announced that the people of Afghanistan, and the governments of Pakistan, Iran, Tajikistan, Uzbekistan, and Turkmenistan will receive an additional \$320,000,000 humanitarian assistance package for emergency food and refugee assistance to address the region's immediate needs during the war on terrorism; and
 - (6) in addition to addressing short-term emergency assistance needs in Afghanistan and the

1 mountainous regions of the Central Asian Republics, 2 addressing the long-term food production and rural 3 development issues in region will be critical to at-4 taining some stability in the region. SEC. 3. ASSISTANCE. 6 (a) Assistance.—The Administrator of the United 7 States Agency for International Development shall provide 8 assistance in accordance with the provisions of this Act to develop sustainable food production for Afghanistan 10 and the mountainous regions of other countries of Central Asia through restocking seed, replacing breeding livestock, 11 12 restoring basic irrigation systems, and providing access to credit for food production, processing, or marketing enterprises through rural microenterprise loan programs. 14 15 (b) Program Objectives.— 16 GENERAL.—In providing assistance 17 under subsection (a), the Administrator shall provide 18 only grants to nongovernmental organizations for 19 the purpose of carrying out the activities described 20 in paragraph (2) in Afghanistan and the other coun-21 tries of Central Asia in accordance with this section. 22 (2) ACTIVITIES SUPPORTED.— 23 (A) IN GENERAL.—Among the activities 24 for which the Administrator may provide grants

shall be—

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1	(i) procurement of seed for local food
2	production;
3	(ii) replacement of breeding livestock;
4	(iii) restoration of basic irrigation sys-
5	tems;
6	(iv) establishment of access to credit
7	for food production, processing, or mar-
8	keting enterprises through rural micro-
9	enterprise loan programs; and
10	(v) providing technical assistance.
11	(B) Limitation.—Amounts received under
12	a grant shall not be used to carry out activities
13	related to emergencies or disasters.
14	(3) Applications.—A nongovernmental orga-
15	nization that desires to receive a grant under this
16	section shall submit an application for the grant to
17	the Administrator. The application should be devel-
18	oped by the nongovernmental organization in close
19	consultation with local indigenous entities, or associ-
20	ated persons of a village or villages, located in the
21	country within which the activities supported by the
22	grant will be carried out.
23	(4) Implementation of program objec-
24	TIVES.—In carrying out the objectives of paragraph
25	(1), the Administrator shall—

- 1 (A) coordinate the activities with govern2 ments of other countries authorized to receive
 3 grants under this section, local and regional
 4 governments of such countries, nongovern5 mental organizations operating in such coun6 tries, and private donors;
 - (B) provide minimal supplementary grants for associated administrative costs to the national and regional governments of the country for which grants to nongovernmental organizations are approved under this section;
 - (C) provide oversight of grants disbursed under this section, including procedures under which a nongovernmental organization that misuses grant funds or otherwise fails to adequately carry out the activities described in paragraph (2) should be disqualified from receiving additional grants under this section for not less than 1 year; and
 - (D) coordinate efforts with national, regional, and local government officials to conduct an annual review of disbursement of grant funds and the effectiveness of activities carried out with grant funds.

1	(c) RESTRICTION RELATING TO THE USE OF UNITED
2	STATES FUNDS IN AFGHANISTAN.—Funds made available
3	under this Act shall not be used during a fiscal year for
4	any activity in Afghanistan which is described in sub-
5	section (b)(2) unless the Secretary of State certifies for
6	the fiscal year that there has been substantial progress
7	made toward the establishment of a government in Af-
8	ghanistan that meets the following requirements:
9	(1) The government includes broad representa-
10	tion from the diverse ethnic and religious groups of
11	Afghanistan, including both men and women from
12	such groups.
13	(2) The government does not sponsor terrorism
14	or harbor terrorists.
15	(3) The government demonstrates a strong and
16	determined commitment to eliminating the produc-
17	tion of opium-producing poppies.
18	(4) The government meets the conditions out-
19	lined in the United Nations Universal Declaration of
20	Human Rights.
21	SEC. 4. ADMINISTRATION.
22	It is the sense of the Congress that the Administrator
23	should establish—
24	(1) criteria for the selection of projects to re-
25	ceive support under this Act;

1	(2) standards and criteria regarding qualifica-
2	tions of recipients of such support;
3	(3) such rules and procedures as may be nec-
4	essary for projects that receive support under this
5	Act;
6	(4) such rules and procedures as may be nec-
7	essary to ensure transparency and accountability in
8	the grant-making process; and
9	(5) criteria for an annual review process for all
10	projects receiving grants.
11	SEC. 5. REPORTS TO CONGRESS.
12	(a) Annual Reports by Administrator.—
13	(1) In general.—Not later than 1 year after
14	the date of the enactment of this Act, and annually
15	thereafter for the subsequent 4 fiscal years, the Ad-
16	ministrator shall submit to the appropriate commit-
17	tees of Congress a report on the implementation of
18	this Act.
19	(2) Report elements.—The report shall in-
20	clude a description of—
21	(A) the programs, projects, and activities
22	supported by grants made under this Act;
23	(B) the criteria that have been established
24	that are used to determine the programs and

- 1 activities that should be assisted by grants 2 made under this Act;
- 3 (C) an assessment regarding the extent to
 4 which the Government of Afghanistan does or
 5 does not meet the requirements of section 3(c)
 6 for that fiscal year; and
- 7 (D) with respect to a fiscal year for which 8 Afghanistan is eligible to receive a grant under 9 section 3, the impact of programming on food 10 production and rural development in Afghani-11 stan.
- 12 (b) GAO REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS.—Not later than 2 years after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General of the United States shall submit 14 15 to the appropriate committees of Congress a report evaluating the effectiveness of grants made under this Act, in-16 17 cluding the effectiveness of the programs, projects, and activities described in subsection (a)(2)(A) in building sus-18 tainable food production and rural microenterprise loans 19 20 in the countries authorized to receive grants under this 21 section.

22 SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

In addition to any other funds authorized to be ap-24 propriated for bilateral programs related to sustainable 25 food production and microenterprise systems, there is au-

- 1 thorized to be appropriated to the Administrator
- 2 \$25,000,000 for fiscal year 2002 and \$50,000,000 for
- 3 each of the fiscal years 2003 through 2006 to carry out
- 4 this Act. Of the amount appropriated pursuant to the au-
- 5 thorization of appropriations under the preceding sentence
- 6 for a fiscal year 60 percent should be designated for
- 7 grants for Afghanistan.
- 8 SEC. 7. DEFINITIONS.
- 9 In this Act:
- 10 (1) Administrator.—The term "Adminis-
- trator" means the Administrator of the United
- 12 States Agency for International Development.
- 13 (2) APPROPRIATE COMMITTEES.—The term
- 14 "appropriate committees" means the Committee on
- 15 Foreign Relations and the Committee on Appropria-
- tions of the Senate and the Committee on Inter-
- 17 national Relations and the Committee on Appropria-
- tions of the House of Representatives.
- 19 (3) Other countries of central asia.—
- The term "other countries of Central Asia" means
- 21 Kyrgyzstan, Pakistan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan,
- and Uzbekistan.

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
