A BILL

- To direct the Director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency to establish and operate a university-affiliated national integrative center that brings together a broad range of expertise to address the needs of homeland security.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "National Integrative
 - 5 Center for Homeland Security Act of 2002".
 - 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.
 - 7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

- 1 (1) the events of September 11, 2001, have for-2 ever changed how Americans view the security and defense of their homeland: 3
 - potential biological, nuclear, incendiary, chemical, explosive, and cyberterrorism threats surround most daily activities and endanger everything from the food, agriculture, and water supplies to the physical transportation, building, power, and information infrastructures;
 - (3) there is an immediate need to develop new technologies and products, as well as preparedness, prevention, reaction, detection, mitigation, decontamination, attribution, and educational applications in response to these potential threats; and
 - (4) there is a need for a nationally coordinated university-based activity to collect and disseminate information, to focus on critical research and educational needs, and to provide national templates for response and recovery to ensure homeland security.
- 20 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to establish an integrative university-affiliated homeland security 22 program that integrates the full spectrum of information 23 services, research, development, evaluation, education, training, and field delivery of responder services that leads

to a safer, better-prepared society.

3	(a) Establishment.—The Director of the Federal
4	Emergency Management Agency, together with a college
5	or university in the United States selected by the Director,
