Mr. Skelton (for himself and Mrs. Tauscher) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Armed Services

A BILL

To authorize the appropriation of the \$10,000,000,000 reserve fund within the national defense budget function for activities to prosecute the war on terrorism.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Defense Budget Res-
- 5 toration Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:

- 1 (1) On September 11, 2001, the United States 2 was the victim of ruthless and unprovoked terrorist 3 attacks that killed thousands of innocent citizens.
 - (2) In the wake of those attacks the United States has undertaken a global war on terrorism.
 - (3) The war on terrorism has required the use of the military capabilities of the United States on a major scale in multiple theaters of operation simultaneously.
 - (4) The war on terrorism will not be resolved quickly and is expected to continue for a period of years.
 - (5) The nature of the war has already required increased operational tempo for United States military forces, has increased expenditure of resources, and has strained the ability of United States forces to meet the demands placed on them.
 - (6) Several of the uniformed service chiefs and commanders-in-chief of the regional combatant commands have testified before Congress that additional manpower is needed in order to be able to perform all missions associated with the execution of the United States national military strategy.
 - (7) The war on terrorism requires the acquisition and use of more weapon systems, support

- equipment, facilities, and other resources to sustain ongoing operations and to successfully complete future operations.
 - (8) Prosecution of the war on terrorism has caused the President to request a \$48,000,000,000 funding increase for the Department of Defense for fiscal year 2003.
 - (9) Included in this increase is a \$10,000,000,000 reserve fund that is unallocated to any specific programs.
 - (10) Testimony before Congress clearly establishes that the Armed Forces are facing significant shortfalls in manpower, weapons systems, equipment, facilities, and other resources that must be remedied now.
 - (11) Section 201 of House Concurrent Resolution 353 of the One Hundred Seventh Congress, the Concurrent Resolution on the Budget for Fiscal Year 2003, as passed by the House of Representatives, on March 20, 2002, specifically provides that the House Committees on Armed Services and Appropriations may report a bill or joint resolution providing up to \$10,000,000,000 in additional funding for the Department of Defense to prosecute the war on terrorism.

1	(12) That section further provides that if such
2	a bill or joint resolution is reported, then the chair-
3	man of the Committee on the Budget of the House
4	of Representatives shall increase the funding for
5	those committees by up to \$10,000,000,000.
6	SEC. 3. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
7	There is hereby authorized for the Department of De-
8	fense for fiscal year 2003, in order to prosecute the war
9	on terrorism during fiscal year 2003, \$10,000,000,000, al-
10	located as follows:
11	(1) Procurement.—For procurement,
12	\$4,999,000,000, of which—
13	(A) \$700,000,000 is for the Army;
14	(B) \$3,402,000,000 is for the Navy;
15	(C) \$561,000,000 is for the Air Force; and
16	(D) \$336,000,000 is for the Marine Corps.
17	(2) Research, Development, Test, and
18	EVALUATION.—For research, development, test, and
19	evaluation, \$1,900,000,000, of which—
20	(A) \$200,000,000 is for chemical and bio-
21	logical warfare defense programs;
22	(B) \$500,000,000 is for the Army;
23	(C) \$500,000,000 is for the Navy;
24	(D) \$300,000,000 is for the Air Force;
25	and

1	(E) \$400,000,000 is for Defense-Wide.
2	(3) Military Personnel.—For military per-
3	sonnel, \$1,122,000,000, of which—
4	(A) \$257,000,000 is for an increase of
5	5,000 in the active-duty end strength of the
6	Army for fiscal year 2003;
7	(B) \$329,000,000 is for an increase of
8	4,000 in the active-duty end strength of the
9	Navy for fiscal year 2003;
10	(C) \$226,000,000 is for an increase of
11	3,000 in the active-duty end strength of the Air
12	Force for fiscal year 2003;
13	(D) \$228,000,000 is for an additional
14	amount in order to provide a pay raise for the
15	Armed Forces for fiscal year 2003 of 4.6 per-
16	cent;
17	(E) \$2,000,000 is for a targeted pay raise
18	for certain enlisted and junior officer pay
19	grades; and
20	(F) \$79,000,000 is for full-time manning
21	positions in order to achieve full-time manning
22	strengths of 1,448 Active Guard and Reserve
23	personnel and 974 military technicians.
24	(4) Operation and maintenance.—For oper-
25	ation and maintenance, \$280,000,000, of which—

1	(A) \$72,000,000 is for Depot and Aircraft
2	Maintenance for the Air Force Special Oper-
3	ations Command; and
4	(B) \$208,000,000 is for Depot Mainte-
5	nance for the Army.
6	(5) Military construction.—For military
7	construction, \$1,700,000,000.
