Mr. Otter (for himself, Mr. Gibbons, and Mr. Simpson) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Financial Services

A BILL

To authorize the Secretary of the Treasury to purchase silver on the open market when the silver stockpile is depleted, to be used to mint coins.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Support of American
- 5 Eagle Silver Bullion Program Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress finds that—
- 8 (1) the American Eagle silver bullion coin leads
- 9 the global market, and is the largest and most pop-
- 10 ular silver coin program in the United States;

1	(2) established in 1986, the American Eagle sil-
2	ver bullion program is the most successful silver bul-
3	lion program in the world;
4	(3) from fiscal year 1995 through fiscal year
5	2001, the American Eagle silver bullion program
6	generated—
7	(A) revenues of \$264,100,000; and
8	(B) sufficient profits to significantly re-
9	duce the national debt;
10	(4) with the depletion of silver reserves in the
11	Defense Logistic Agency's Strategic and Critical
12	Materials Stockpile, it is necessary for the Depart-
13	ment of the Treasury to acquire silver from other
14	sources in order to preserve the American Eagle sil-
15	ver bullion program;
16	(5) with the ability to obtain silver from other
17	sources, the United States Mint can continue the
18	highly successful American Eagle silver bullion pro-
19	gram, exercising sound business judgment and mar-
20	ket acquisition practices in its approach to the silver
21	market, resulting in continuing profitability of the
22	program;
23	(6) in 2001, silver was commercially produced

in 12 States, including, Alaska, Arizona, California,

1	Colorado, Idaho, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, New
2	Mexico, South Dakota, Utah, and Washington;
3	(7) Nevada is the largest silver producing State
4	in the Nation, producing—
5	(A) 17,500,000 ounces of silver in 2001;
6	and
7	(B) 34 percent of United States silver pro-
8	duction in 2000;
9	(8) the mining industry in Idaho is vital to the
10	economy of the State, and the Silver Valley in north-
11	ern Idaho leads the world in recorded silver produc-
12	tion, with over 1,100,000,000 ounces of silver pro-
13	duced between 1884 and 2001;
14	(9) the largest, active silver producing mine in
15	the Nation is the McCoy/Cove Mine in Nevada,
16	which produced more than 107,000,000 ounces of
17	silver between 1989 and 2001;
18	(10) the mining industry in Idaho—
19	(A) employs more than 3,000 people;
20	(B) contributes more than \$900,000,000
21	to the Idaho economy; and
22	(C) produces \$70,000,000 worth of silver
23	per year;
24	(11) the silver mines of the Comstock lode, the
25	premier silver producing deposit in Nevada, brought

1	people and wealth to the region, paving the way for
2	statehood in 1864, and giving Nevada its nickname
3	as "the Silver State";
4	(12) mines in the Silver Valley—
5	(A) represent an important part of the
6	mining history of Idaho and the United States;
7	and
8	(B) have served in the past as key compo-
9	nents of the United States war effort; and
10	(13) silver has been mined in Nevada through-
11	out its history, with every significant metal mining
12	camp in Nevada producing some silver.

 - (2) RULEMAKING AUTHORITY.—The Secretary of the Treasury shall issue regulations to implement the amendments made by paragraph (1).

(b) Study Required.—

- (1) STUDY.—The Secretary of the Treasury shall conduct a study of the impact on the United States silver market of the coins minted and issued under section 5112(e) of title 31, United States Code, commonly referred to as the "American Eagle silver bullion program".
- (2) Report.—Not later than 1 year after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of the Treasury shall submit a report of the study conducted under paragraph (1) to the chairman and ranking minority member of—
- (A) the Committee on Banking, Housing,
 and Urban Affairs of the Senate; and
- 23 (B) the Committee on Financial Services 24 of the House of Representatives.
- 25 (c) Annual Report.—

1 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Director of the United 2 States Mint shall prepare and submit to Congress an 3 annual report on the purchases of silver made pur-4 suant to this Act and the amendments made by this 5 Act.

(2) Concurrent Submission.—The report required by paragraph (1) may be incorporated into the annual report of the Director of the United States Mint on the operations of the mint and assay offices, referred to in section 1329 of title 44, United States Code.
