A BILL

To provide for the establishment of a task force within the Bureau of Justice Statistics to gather information about, study, and report to the Congress regarding, incidents of abandonment of infant children.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Baby Abandonment
- 5 Prevention Act of 2001".

1 SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF TASK FORCE.

2	(a) In General.—The Attorney General, acting
3	through the Director of the Bureau of Justice Statistics,
4	shall establish a task force (to be known as the Task Force
5	on Baby Abandonment) to carry out the following:
6	(1) Collecting information from State and local
7	law enforcement agencies and child welfare agencies
8	regarding incidents of abandonment of an infant
9	child by a parent of that child.
10	(2) Maintaining that information in a com-
11	prehensive database.
12	(3) Studying that information and making find-
13	ings, conclusions, and recommendations regarding
14	that information.
15	(4) Submitting reports in accordance with this
16	section.
17	(b) Information Included.—The information re-
18	ferred to in subsection (a) shall include information with
19	respect to the following:

- 20 (1) The prevalence of such incidents.
- 21 (2) The demographics of such children and 22 such parents.
- (3) The factors that influence the decision of
 such parents to abandon such children.

1	(4) The circumstances surrounding such aban-
2	donments, including the time, place, and manner of
3	such abandonments.
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- 4 (5) The outcomes for such children and such parents after such abandonments.
- 6 (6) Trends and variations in the matters set 7 forth in paragraphs (1) through (5).
- 8 (c) Definition.—In this section, the term "infant 9 child" means a child not more than 12 months of age.
- 10 (d) Reports.—Not later than one year after the date 11 of the enactment of this Act, and annually thereafter, the 12 task force shall submit a report to the Congress detailing 13 its methodology, findings, conclusions, and recommenda-14 tions.

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
