A BILL

To establish the North American Slavery Memorial Council.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "North American Slav-

5 ery Memorial Council Act".

6 SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT.

7 There is established the North American Slavery Me-

8 morial Council (in this Act referred to as the "Council").

9 SEC. 3. DUTIES.

10 The duties of the Council shall be to—

6	(2) establish a single site within the District of
7	Columbia suitable for the construction and operation
8	of the Memorial and Museum;
9	(3) construct the Memorial and Museum; and
10	(4) operate the Memorial and Museum.
11	SEC. 4. MEMBERSHIP.
12	(a) Number and Appointment.—The Council shall
13	be composed of the following members:

1 (2) Nonvoting members.—3 ex officio non-2 voting members, who shall be appointed— 3 (A) 1 by the Secretary of the Interior; 4 (B) 1 by the Secretary of State; and 5 (C) 1 by the Secretary of Education. 6 (b) CONTINUATION OF MEMBERSHIP.—If a member 7 was appointed to the Council as a Member of Congress 8 and the member ceases to be a Member of Congress, that 9 member may continue as a member for not longer than 10 the 60-day period beginning on the date that member ceases to be a Member of Congress. 11

12 (c) TERM.—Each member shall be appointed for a 13 term of 5 years, except that the terms of the 5 members 14 of the House of Representatives and the 5 members of 15 the Senate appointed during a Congress shall expire at 16 the end of that Congress.

17 (d) VACANCIES.—

18 (1) A vacancy in the Council shall be filled in
19 the manner in which the original appointment was
20 made.

(2) A member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring before the expiration of the term for which the
member's predecessor was appointed shall be appointed only for the remainder of that term.

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(3) A member, except the 5 members of the
 House of Representatives and the 5 members of the
 Senate, may serve after the expiration of a term
 until a successor takes office.

5 (e) BASIC PAY.—

6 (1) RATES OF PAY.—Except as provided in 7 paragraph (2), members shall each be paid at the 8 daily equivalent of the maximum annual rate of 9 basic pay payable under section 5376 of title 5 for 10 each day (including travel time) during which they 11 are engaged in the actual performance of duties 12 vested in the Council.

(2) PROHIBITION OF COMPENSATION OF FED14 ERAL EMPLOYEES.—Members of the Council who
15 are full-time officers or employees of the United
16 States or Members of Congress may not receive ad17 ditional pay, allowances, or benefits by reason of
18 their service on the Council.

(f) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—Each member shall receive
travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence,
in accordance with sections 5702 and 5703 of title 5,
United States Code.

(g) QUORUM.— One-third of the voting members of
the Council shall constitute a quorum but a lesser number
may hold hearings.

1 (h) CHAIRPERSON; VICE CHAIRPERSON.—The Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of the Council shall be ap-2 3 pointed by the President of the United States from among 4 the members of the Council. The term of office of the 5 Chairperson and Vice Chairperson shall be 5 years. A va-6 cancy in the office of the Chairperson or Vice Chairperson 7 shall be filled in the manner in which the original appoint-8 ment was made.

9 (i) MEETINGS.—The Council shall meet not less fre-10 quently than monthly.

11 SEC. 5. DIRECTOR AND STAFF.

(a) DIRECTOR.—The Council shall have a Director
who shall be appointed by the Chairperson. The Director
shall be paid at a rate not to exceed the maximum rate
of basic pay payable under section 5376 of title 5, United
States Code. The Director shall serve at the pleasure of
the Council.

(b) STAFF.—With the approval of the Council, the
Director may appoint and fix the pay of additional personnel as the Director considers appropriate.

(c) EXPERTS AND CONSULTANTS.—With the approval of the Council, the Director may procure temporary
and intermittent services under section 3109(b) of title 5,
United States Code, but at rates for individuals not to
exceed the daily equivalent of the maximum annual rate

of basic pay payable under section 5376 of title 5, United
 States Code.

3 (d) STAFF OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—Upon request 4 of the Council, the head of any Federal department or 5 agency may detail, on a reimbursable basis, any of the 6 personnel of that department or agency to the Council to 7 assist it in carrying out its duties under this Act.

8 SEC. 6. POWERS.

9 (a) HEARINGS AND SESSIONS.—The Council may, for 10 the purpose of carrying out this Act, hold hearings, sit 11 and act at times and places, take testimony, and receive 12 evidence as the Council considers appropriate.

(b) POWERS OF MEMBERS AND AGENTS.—Any member or agent of the Council may, if authorized by the
Council, take any action which the Council is authorized
to take by this section.

17 (c) GIFTS, BEQUESTS, AND DEVISES.—The Council may accept, use, and dispose of gifts, bequests, or devises 18 19 of services or property, both real and personal, for the pur-20 pose of aiding or facilitating the work of the Council. 21 Gifts, bequests, or devises of money and proceeds from 22 sales of other property received as gifts, bequests, or de-23 vises shall be deposited in the Treasury and shall be avail-24 able for disbursement upon order of the Council. For pur-25 poses of Federal income, estate, and gift taxes, property accepted under this subsection shall be considered as a
 gift, bequest, or devise to the United States.

3 (d) MAILS.—The Council may use the United States
4 mails in the same manner and under the same conditions
5 as other departments and agencies of the United States.

6 (e) ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT SERVICES.—Upon
7 the request of the Council, the Administrator of General
8 Services shall provide to the Council, on a reimbursable
9 basis, the administrative support services necessary for the
10 Council to carry out its responsibilities under this Act.

11 SEC. 7. MEMORIAL AND MUSEUM.

(a) ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN.—The Council shall determine the architectural design of the Memorial and Museum subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Interior, in consultation with the Commission of Fine Arts and
the National Capital Planning Commission.

17 (b) Acquisition of Real Property in District OF COLUMBIA.—The Council may, for the purpose of es-18 tablishing a single site for the Memorial and Museum and 19 20 with the approval of the Secretary of the Interior in con-21 sultation with the Commission of Fine Arts and the Na-22 tional Capital Planning Commission, acquire real property 23 in the District of Columbia by one or more of the following 24 procedures:

1	(1) Notwithstanding any other provision of law
2	(including the Federal Property and Administrative
3	Services Act of 1949 (40 U.S.C. et seq.)), any de-
4	partment, agency, or instrumentality of the United
5	States Government may transfer to the Council any
6	real property in the District of Columbia that is
7	under the administrative jurisdiction of the depart-
8	ment, agency, or instrumentality and that the Coun-
9	cil considers suitable for the Memorial and Museum.
10	(2) The Council may purchase, with the consent
11	of the owner, any real property within the District
12	of Columbia that the Council considers suitable for
13	the Memorial and Museum.
14	(c) CONSTRUCTION.—The Council shall construct the
15	Memorial and Museum on the site established under sub-
16	section (b) in accordance with the architectural design de-
17	termined under subsection (a).
18	(d) Operation.—In operating the Memorial and
19	Museum, the Council shall—
20	(1) adopt bylaws;
21	(2) establish annual budgets;
22	(3) subject to the availability of funds and the
23	provisions of annual budgets, purchase, accept, bor-

24 row, or otherwise acquire artifacts and other prop-

erty for addition to the collections of the Memorial
 and Museum;

3 (4) establish policy with respect to the utiliza-4 tion of the collections of the Memorial and Museum;

5 (5) establish policy with respect to educational
6 programs, exhibitions, and research projects relating
7 to slavery in North America;

8 (6) establish programs in cooperation with in-9 stitutions including other museums, historical soci-10 eties, educational institutions, cultural organizations, 11 and other organizations for the education and pro-12 motion of understanding regarding slavery in North 13 America; and

14 (7) support the efforts of such institutions to
15 educate and promote the understanding regarding
16 slavery in North America.

(e) INSURANCE.—The Council shall maintain insurance on the Memorial and Museum covering the risks, in
the amounts, and containing the terms the Council considers necessary.

21 SEC. 8. AUDITS.

When requested by the Congress, the Comptroller General shall audit the financial transactions of the Council, including those involving donated funds, under generally accepted auditing standards. The Council shall make available for an audit under this section all records,
 items, or property used by the Council that are necessary
 for the audit.

4 SEC. 9. ANNUAL REPORT.

Each year, the Council shall submit to the Congress
a report on the activities of the Council, including an accounting of all financial transactions involving donated
funds.

9 SEC. 10. APPLICABILITY OF COMMEMORATIVE WORKS ACT.

10 The Memorial and Museum is not a commemorative
11 work within the meaning of the Commemorative Works
12 Act (40 U.S.C. 1001 et seq.).

13 SEC. 11. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

14 (a) IN GENERAL.—There are authorized to be appro-15 priated such sums as may be necessary to carry out this16 Act.

17 (b) USE OF AMOUNTS FOR CONSTRUCTION OR OPER-18 ATION.—Amounts appropriated to the Council—

(1) may not be used for construction of the Me-morial and Museum; and

(2) may be used for operation of the Memorial
and Museum only if amounts received under section
6(c) that are equal to or greater than such appropriated amounts are also so used.

(c) PRIOR AUTHORITY REQUIRED.—Any spending
 authority (as defined in subparagraphs (A) and (C) of sec tion 401(c)(2) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974
 (2 U.S.C. 651(c)(2)(A) and (C))) contained in this Act
 shall be effective only to such extent and in such amounts
 as are provided in appropriation Acts.

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
