Mr. Israel (for himself, Mr. Lantos, and Mr. Cantor) submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Government Reform

RESOLUTION

Expressing the sense of the House of Representatives that a commemorative postage stamp should be issued in remembrance of the victims of the Holocaust.

Whereas the Holocaust was a defining event in history;

- Whereas the atrocities against humanity that were committed during the Holocaust were of a magnitude not seen either before or since the Holocaust;
- Whereas remembering the Holocaust and the victims of the Holocaust may help ensure that nothing similar is ever allowed to happen again;
- Whereas the evil of the Holocaust underscores the need for tolerance, sensitivity, pluralism, and democracy around the world;

Whereas another lesson of the Holocaust is the need to respect the basic human rights of all;

Whereas many of those who survived the Holocaust rebuilt their lives and raised their families in the United States, and contributed significantly to this, their adopted homeland; and

Whereas 2005 will mark the 60th anniversary of the liberation of the Nazi concentration camps by Allied troops: Now, therefore, be it

1 Resolved, That it is the sense of the House of Rep-2 resentatives that—

(1) a commemorative postage stamp should be issued by the United States Postal Service in remembrance of the victims of the Holocaust; and

(2) the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee should recommend to the Postmaster General that such a stamp be issued.
