## RESOLUTION

Congratulating the Anaheim Angels for winning the 2002 World Series championship.

- Whereas on October 27, 2002, the Anaheim Angels won the 2002 World Series championship;
- Whereas the Angels were the American League wild card team;
- Whereas the Angels defeated the New York Yankees to win the American League Division Series;
- Whereas the Angels defeated the Minnesota Twins to win the American League pennant;
- Whereas the Angels faced the National League pennant champion, the San Francisco Giants, in the World Series finals, and came away victorious, clinching the series 4 games to 3;

- Whereas the Angels had never won a playoff series before beating the New York Yankees;
- Whereas in 2001, the Angels finished 41 games out of first place;
- Whereas the Angels were the first team since the 1912 Boston Red Sox to win the World Series without having any player who had ever played for a World Series winner;
- Whereas Mike Scioscia, the manager of the Angels, led the team to victory;
- Whereas outfielder Tim Salmon has played his entire career for the Angels;
- Whereas pitcher John Lackey became the first rookie to win a Game 7 in 93 years;
- Whereas third baseman Troy Glaus is a native of Orange County, California, and was named most valuable player of the World Series; and
- Whereas this year is the first time the Anaheim Angels have won the World Series championship since Gene Autry formed the team in 1961: Now, therefore, be it
