# A BILL

To direct the Secretary of the Interior to study the suitability and feasibility of designating the International Civil Rights Center and Museum in the State of North Carolina as a unit of the National Park System, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "International Civil
- 5 Rights Center and Museum Study Act of 2001".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress finds that—

- 1 (1) on February 1, 1960, 4 black North Caro2 lina A&T State University students, Ezell Blair, Jr.,
  3 Franklin McCain, Joseph McNeil, and David Rich4 mond, sat at the whites-only lunch counter of a
  5 Woolworth store in Greensboro, North Carolina, to
  6 protest segregation;
  7 (2) in the following days hundreds of students
  - (2) in the following days hundreds of students joined the protest and participated in the Woolworth sit-in;
  - (3) the Woolworth sit-in inspired similar sit-ins in hundreds of communities throughout the United States and was instrumental in leading to the desegregation of public facilities in the South;
  - (4) the Woolworth sit-in was a prominent event in the history of the civil rights movement;
  - (5) Woolworth closed the lunch counter in the Greensboro, North Carolina, store in October 1993 and donated a section of the counter, 4 stools, and other items to the Smithsonian Institution for display at the National Museum of American History;
  - (6) the former Woolworth store is located in a district listed on the National Register of Historic Places; and
- (7) community leaders and businesses in
   Greensboro, North Carolina, have undertaken sig-

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- 1 nificant efforts to preserve the historic site of the
- 2 sit-in and convert the former Woolworth store into
- a museum devoted to the history of the civil rights
- 4 movement.

#### 5 SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.

- 6 In this Act—
- 7 (1) Museum.—The term "Museum" means the
- 8 International Civil Rights Center and Museum lo-
- 9 cated in Greensboro, North Carolina.
- 10 (2) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
- the Secretary of the Interior, acting through the Di-
- rector of the National Park Service.
- 13 (3) STATE.—The term "State" means the State
- of North Carolina.

### 15 SEC. 4. FEASIBILITY STUDY.

- 16 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall, in consulta-
- 17 tion with the Governor of the State, carry out a study on
- 18 the suitability and feasibility of designating the Museum
- 19 as a unit of the National Park System.
- 20 (b) Applicable Law.—Section 8(c) of Public Law
- 21 91–383 (16 U.S.C. 1a–5(c)) shall apply to the conduct
- 22 and completion of the study under subsection (a).
- 23 (c) Report.—
- 24 (1) In General.—The Secretary shall submit
- 25 to the Committee on Resources of the House of Rep-

1	resentatives and the Committee on Energy and Nat-
2	ural Resources of the Senate a report describing the
3	results of the study.
4	(2) Contents.—In addition to the findings re-
5	quired by section 8(c) of Public Law 91–383 (16
6	U.S.C. 1a-5(c)), the report shall contain findings
7	on—
8	(A) the types of Federal, State, and local
9	programs that are available to assist with the
10	development of the Museum; and
11	(B) the potential use of, and coordination
12	with, Federal, State, and local programs to as-
13	sist in the management of the historical and
14	cultural resources of the Museum.

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
