Mr. Rockefeller introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

A BILL

To establish a grant program to enable rural police departments to gain access to the various crime-fighting, investigatory, and information-sharing resources available on the Internet, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Networking Electroni-
- 5 cally To Connect Our Police Act of 2001" or the "NET
- 6 COP Act".
- 7 SEC. 2. FINDINGS; PURPOSES.
- 8 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

- 1 (1) Internet-based crime-fighting, investigatory, 2 and information-sharing technologies have proven to 3 be extremely useful to the law enforcement agencies 4 that use them;
 - (2) the sharing of information and the dissemination of criminal intelligence between and among Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies benefit the society at large by making criminal investigations more inclusive and effective;
 - (3) the sharing of information between and among Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies allows these agencies to find missing, neglected, abused, or abducted children, as well as non-custodial parents seeking to evade their legal or financial responsibilities; and
 - (4) police departments in rural areas of the country tend to be underserved by these Internet-based technologies.
- 19 (b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are—
 - (1) to authorize the Department of Justice to make grants to rural police departments for the purchase or upgrade of computer equipment, and to pay for Internet access for crime-fighting, investigatory, or information-sharing purposes;

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1	(2) to reimburse police department officials or
2	members who, acting on behalf of their rural police
3	departments and using personal funds, have pur-
4	chased computer equipment or paid for Internet ac-
5	cess for crime-fighting, investigatory, or information-
6	sharing purposes; and
7	(3) to require annual reports to Congress on
8	the concentration of police departments that have
9	Internet access, particularly those departments serv-
10	ing rural areas.
11	SEC. 3. GRANTS AUTHORIZED.
12	The Attorney General is authorized to award grants
13	to rural police departments to—
14	(1) enable those departments to gain access to
15	the various crime-fighting, investigatory, and infor-
16	mation sharing resources available on the Internet;
17	and
18	(2) reimburse rural police department officials
19	and members for the cost of computer equipment or
20	Internet access.
21	SEC. 4. USE OF FUNDS.
22	Grants awarded under this Act may be used—
23	(1) for the purchase of new or upgraded com-
24	puter hardware or software;
25	(2) to pay for Internet access; and

1 (3) to reimburse rural police departments that
2 have paid for computer equipment or Internet access
3 out of the funds of the department or department
4 official or members, for some or all of the costs asso5 ciated with those purchases, as determined by the
6 Attorney General.

7 SEC. 5. APPLICATION.

- Each eligible rural police department that desires a grant under this Act shall submit an application to the Attorney General at such time, in such manner, and accompanied by such information as the Attorney General may reasonably require.
- 13 SEC. 6. GRANT PROGRAM CRITERIA.
- (a) IN GENERAL.—In awarding a grant under thisAct, the Attorney General shall—
- 16 (1) set criteria for determining which police de-17 partments are currently underserved by crime-fight-18 investigatory, or information-sharing tech-19 nologies available on the Internet, by differentiating 20 between police departments that do not have Inter-21 net access, and those departments that have access but are using outmoded, obsolete, or otherwise inad-22 23 equate technology; and
 - (2) determine what would constitute the minimum feasible package of technologies required to

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1	enable those police departments to use existing
2	crime-fighting, investigatory, and information-shar-
3	ing technologies.
4	(b) Grant Limitations.—The Attorney General
5	shall set limits for maximum annual grants, based on de-
6	terminations made under subsection (a), for rural police
7	departments that do not have Internet access, and for
8	those that do have access but are using inadequate tech-
9	nology.
10	SEC. 7. POLICE DEPARTMENT TECHNOLOGY ASSISTANCE
11	DESK.
12	The Attorney General shall establish a Police Depart-
13	ment Technology Assistance Desk to offer advice to chiefs
14	of police in rural police departments regarding—
15	(1) the types of products to buy in order to
16	achieve not less than a minimum level of Internet
17	service to access existing crime-fighting, investiga-
18	tory, and information-sharing technologies; and
19	(2) technology upgrades for those police depart-
20	ments in possession of outmoded or obsolete tech-
21	nology;
22	(3) preferred vendors; and
23	(4) any other information the Attorney General
24	determines to be necessary.

1 SEC. 8. REPORT TO CONGRESS.

- 2 The General Accounting Office, in consultation with
- 3 the Attorney General, shall annually report to Congress
- 4 on the concentration of police departments in the country
- 5 that have Internet access, with particular emphasis on the
- 6 number and percentage of rural police departments that
- 7 lack Internet access, especially high-speed Internet access.

8 SEC. 9. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- 9 There is authorized to be appropriated \$500,000,000
- 10 for each of fiscal years 2002 through 2007 to carry out
- 11 this Act.

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
