Mr. McConnell (for himself, Mrs. Feinstein, Ms. Collins, Mr. Smith of Oregon, and Mr. Bennett) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations

A BILL

To hold accountable the Palestine Liberation Organization and the Palestinian Authority, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Arafat Accountability
- 5 Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) The Palestine Liberation Organization
- 9 (PLO), under the leadership of Chairman Yasser
- 10 Arafat, has failed to abide by its promises, enumer-

- ated in the Oslo Accords, to commit itself to "a peaceful resolution of the conflict between the two sides", that "all outstanding issues relating to permanent status will be resolved through negotiations", and that the PLO "renounces the use of terrorism and other acts of violence and will assume responsibility over all PLO elements and personnel in order to assure their compliance, prevent violence, and discipline violators".
 - (2) Yasser Arafat failed to exercise his authority and responsibility to maintain law and order in the West Bank and Gaza, which has resulted in ongoing acts of terrorism against Israeli and American civilians in the State of Israel.
 - (3) Yasser Arafat has failed, through words and deeds, to offer credible security guarantees to the Palestinian and Israeli peoples, and has once again violated his commitment to peace through the recent purchase of 50 tons of offensive weaponry from Iran.
 - (4) Yasser Arafat and the forces directly under his control are responsible for the murder of hundreds of innocent Israelis and the wounding of thousands more since October 2000.

1	(5) Yasser Arafat has been directly implicated
2	in funding and supporting terrorists who have
3	claimed responsibility for homicide bombings in
4	Israel.
5	(6) Under the present circumstances, Yasser
6	Arafat's failure to adequately respond to end the
7	homicide bombings further complicates the prospects
8	for a resolution of the conflict in that region.
9	SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS.
10	It is the sense of Congress that—
11	(1) the United States continue to urge an im-
12	mediate and unconditional cessation of all terrorist
13	activities and the commencement of a cease-fire;
14	(2) the Palestine Liberation Organization and
15	the Palestinian Authority immediately surrender to
16	Israel for detention and prosecution those Pales-
17	tinian extremists wanted by the Government of
18	Israel for assassination of Israeli Minister of Tour-
19	ism Rehavam Zeevi;
20	(3) PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat and the Pal-
21	estine Liberation Organization take immediate and
22	concrete action to—
23	(A) publicly condemn all acts of terrorism,
24	including and especially homicide bombings,
25	which murdered over 125 Israeli men, women,

1	and children during the month of March alone,
2	and the injury of hundreds more;
3	(B) confiscate and destroy the infrastruc-
4	tures of terrorism, including weapons, bomb
5	factories, and other offensive materials;
6	(C) end all financial support for terrorism;
7	and
8	(D) urge all Arab nations and individuals
9	to immediately cease funding for terrorist oper-
10	ations and payments to the families of terror-
11	ists; and
12	(4) the Congress supports the President's ef-
13	forts, in conjunction with Israel, the Arab states,
14	and the international community, to develop a com-
15	prehensive peace in the region, and encourages con-
16	tinued efforts by all parties.
17	SEC. 4. IMPOSITION OF SANCTIONS.
18	(a) Denial of Visas.—
19	(1) Prohibition.—The Secretary of State
20	shall not issue a visa to, and the Attorney General
21	shall not admit to the United States any member of
22	the Palestine Liberation Organization or any official
23	from the Palestinian Authority.

- 1 (2) Waiver.—The President may, on a case-
- 2 by-case basis, waive paragraph (1) based on national
- 3 security considerations.
- 4 (b) Downgrading of PLO Representation in
- 5 THE UNITED STATES.—The Secretary of State shall un-
- 6 dertake such measures as may be necessary to prohibit
- 7 the operation of a Palestine Liberation Organization or
- 8 Palestinian Authority office in the United States from car-
- 9 rying out any function other than those carried out by the
- 10 Palestinian information office in existence in the United
- 11 States prior to the Oslo Accords.
- 12 (c) Travel Restriction on the Senior PLO
- 13 Representative at the United Nations.—The Sec-
- 14 retary of State shall impose the same travel restrictions
- 15 on the senior official of the Permanent Observer Mission
- 16 of Palestine at the United Nations as those imposed on
- 17 officials with the Permanent Mission of the Islamic Re-
- 18 public of Iran to the United Nations.
- 19 (d) Seizure of Assets of the PLO and the PA
- 20 AND PLO CHAIRMAN YASSER ARAFAT.—The Secretary of
- 21 State, in cooperation with the Attorney General, shall
- 22 identify and seize the assets of the Palestine Liberation
- 23 Organization and the Palestinian Authority in the United
- 24 States, and the personal assets in the United States of
- 25 PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat.

1 SEC. 5. REPORT ON PLO TERRORIST ACTIVITIES.

- 2 (a) Within 30 days after the date of enactment of
- 3 this Act, and every 90 days thereafter, the President shall
- 4 submit a report to the appropriate congressional commit-
- 5 tees detailing acts of terrorism, if any, committed by the
- 6 Palestine Liberation Organization or any of its constituent
- 7 elements.
- 8 (b) The report shall include a determination on
- 9 whether acts of terrorism warrant the designation of the
- 10 PLO or any of its constituent elements as terrorist organi-
- 11 zations, and if so, the President shall so designate the
- 12 PLO or any of its constituent elements as terrorist organi-
- 13 zations.
- (c) The President may waive the requirements of this
- 15 section based on national security considerations.
- 16 SEC. 6. DURATION OF SANCTIONS.
- 17 The sanctions imposed under this Act shall remain
- 18 in effect until such time as the President determines and
- 19 reports to the appropriate congressional committees that
- 20 the conditions that warrant these sanctions no longer
- 21 exist.
- 22 SEC. 7. APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES DE-
- FINED.
- In this Act, the term "appropriate congressional com-
- 25 mittees" means the Committee on Appropriations and the
- 26 Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate and the

- 1 Committee on Appropriations and the Committee on
- 2 International Relations of the House of Representatives.
