A BILL

To reauthorize the Museum and Library Services Act, and
for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Museum and Library
5 Services Act of 2002”.

6 **TITLE I—GENERAL PROVISIONS**

7 **SEC. 101. GENERAL DEFINITIONS.**

8 Section 202 of the Museum and Library Services Act
9 (20 U.S.C. 9101) is amended—

1 (1) by striking paragraphs (1) and (4);

2 (2) by redesignating paragraph (2) as para-
3 graph (1);

4 (3) by inserting after paragraph (1), as redesign-
5 ated by paragraph (2) of this section, the following:

6 “(2) INDIAN TRIBE.—The term ‘Indian tribe’
7 means any tribe, band, nation, or other organized
8 group or community, including any Alaska native
9 village, regional corporation, or village corporation,
10 as defined in or established pursuant to the Alaska
11 Native Claims Settlement Act (43 U.S.C. 1601 et
12 seq.), which is recognized by the Secretary of the In-
13 terior as eligible for the special programs and serv-
14 ices provided by the United States to Indians be-
15 cause of their status as Indians.”; and

16 (4) by adding at the end the following:

17 “(4) MUSEUM AND LIBRARY SERVICES
18 BOARD.—The term ‘Museum and Library Services
19 Board’ means the National Museum and Library
20 Services Board established under section 207.”.

21 **SEC. 102. INSTITUTE OF MUSEUM AND LIBRARY SERVICES.**

22 Section 203 of the Museum and Library Services Act
23 (20 U.S.C. 9102) is amended—

24 (1) in subsection (b), by striking the last sen-
25 tence; and

1 (2) by adding at the end the following:

2 “(c) MUSEUM AND LIBRARY SERVICES BOARD.—

3 There shall be a National Museum and Library Services

4 Board within the Institute, as provided under section

5 207.”.

6 **SEC. 103. DIRECTOR OF THE INSTITUTE.**

7 Section 204 of the Museum and Library Services Act

8 (20 U.S.C. 9103) is amended—

9 (1) in subsection (e), by adding at the end the

10 following: “Where appropriate, the Director shall en-

11 sure that activities under subtitle B are coordinated

12 with activities under section 1251 of the Elementary

13 and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.

14 6383).”; and

15 (2) by adding at the end the following:

16 “(f) REGULATORY AUTHORITY.—The Director may

17 promulgate such rules and regulations as are necessary

18 and appropriate to implement the provisions of this title.”.

19 **SEC. 104. NATIONAL MUSEUM AND LIBRARY SERVICES**

20 **BOARD.**

21 The Museum and Library Services Act (20 U.S.C.

22 9101 et seq.) is amended—

23 (1) by redesignating section 207 as section 208;

24 and

25 (2) by inserting after section 206 the following:

1 **“SEC. 207. NATIONAL MUSEUM AND LIBRARY SERVICES**
 2 **BOARD.**

3 “(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the
 4 Institute a board to be known as the ‘National Museum
 5 and Library Services Board’.

6 “(b) MEMBERSHIP.—

7 “(1) NUMBER AND APPOINTMENT.—The Mu-
 8 seum and Library Services Board shall be composed
 9 of the following:

10 “(A) The Director.

11 “(B) The Deputy Director for the Office of
 12 Library Services.

13 “(C) The Deputy Director for the Office of
 14 Museum Services.

15 “(D) The Chairman of the National Com-
 16 mission on Libraries and Information Science.

17 “(E) 10 members appointed by the Presi-
 18 dent, by and with the advice and consent of the
 19 Senate, from among individuals who are citi-
 20 zens of the United States and who are specially
 21 qualified in the area of library services by virtue
 22 of their education, training, or experience.

23 “(F) 11 members appointed by the Presi-
 24 dent, by and with the advice and consent of the
 25 Senate, from among individuals who are citi-
 26 zens of the United States and who are specially

1 qualified in the area of museum services by vir-
2 tue of their education, training, or experience.

3 “(2) SPECIAL QUALIFICATIONS.—

4 “(A) LIBRARY MEMBERS.—Of the mem-
5 bers of the Museum and Library Services
6 Board appointed under paragraph (1)(E)—

7 “(i) 5 shall be professional librarians
8 or information specialists, of whom—

9 “(I) at least 1 shall be knowl-
10 edgeable about electronic information
11 and technical aspects of library and
12 information services and sciences; and

13 “(II) and at least 1 other shall be
14 knowledgeable about the library and
15 information service needs of under-
16 served communities; and

17 “(ii) the remainder shall have special
18 competence in, or knowledge of, the needs
19 for library and information services in the
20 United States.

21 “(B) MUSEUM MEMBERS.—Of the mem-
22 bers of the Museum and Library Services
23 Board appointed under paragraph (1)(F)—

24 “(i) 5 shall be museum professionals
25 who are or have been affiliated with—

1 “(I) resources that, collectively,
2 are broadly representative of the cura-
3 torial, conservation, educational, and
4 cultural resources of the United
5 States; or

6 “(II) museums that, collectively,
7 are broadly representative of various
8 types of museums, including museums
9 relating to science, history, tech-
10 nology, art, zoos, botanical gardens,
11 and museums designed for children;
12 and

13 “(ii) the remainder shall be individ-
14 uals recognized for their broad knowledge,
15 expertise, or experience in museums or
16 commitment to museums.

17 “(3) GEOGRAPHIC AND OTHER REPRESENTA-
18 TION.—Members of the Museum and Library Serv-
19 ices Board shall be appointed to reflect persons from
20 various geographic regions of the United States. The
21 Museum and Library Services Board may not in-
22 clude, at any time, more than 3 appointive members
23 from a single State. In making such appointments,
24 the President shall give due regard to equitable rep-
25 resentation of women, minorities, and persons with

1 disabilities who are involved with museums and li-
 2 braries.

3 “(4) VOTING.—The Director, the Deputy Direc-
 4 tor of the Office of Library Services, and the Deputy
 5 Director of the Office of Museum Services shall be
 6 nonvoting members of the Museum and Library
 7 Services Board.

8 “(c) TERMS.—

9 “(1) IN GENERAL.—Except as otherwise pro-
 10 vided in this subsection, each member of the Mu-
 11 seum and Library Services Board appointed under
 12 subparagraph (E) or (F) of subsection (b)(1) shall
 13 serve for a term of 5 years.

14 “(2) INITIAL BOARD APPOINTMENTS.—

15 “(A) TREATMENT OF MEMBERS SERVING
 16 ON EFFECTIVE DATE.—Notwithstanding sub-
 17 section (b), each individual who is a member of
 18 the National Museum Services Board on Octo-
 19 ber 1, 2002, may, at the individual’s election,
 20 complete the balance of the individual’s term as
 21 a member of the Museum and Library Services
 22 Board.

23 “(B) FIRST APPOINTMENTS.—Notwith-
 24 standing subsection (b), any appointive vacancy
 25 in the initial membership of the Museum and

1 Library Services Board existing after the appli-
 2 cation of subparagraph (A), and any vacancy in
 3 such membership subsequently created by rea-
 4 son of the expiration of the term of an indi-
 5 vidual described in subparagraph (A), shall be
 6 filled by the appointment of a member de-
 7 scribed in subsection (b)(1)(E). When the Mu-
 8 seum and Library Services Board consists of an
 9 equal number of individuals who are specially
 10 qualified in the area of library services and in-
 11 dividuals who are specially qualified in the area
 12 of museum services, this subparagraph shall
 13 cease to be effective and the members of the
 14 Museum and Library Services Board shall be
 15 appointed in accordance with subsection (b).

16 “(C) AUTHORITY TO ADJUST TERMS.—The
 17 terms of the first members appointed to the
 18 Museum and Library Services Board shall be
 19 adjusted by the President as necessary to en-
 20 sure that the terms of not more than 4 mem-
 21 bers expire in the same year. Such adjustments
 22 shall be carried out through designation of the
 23 adjusted term at the time of appointment.

24 “(3) VACANCIES.—Any member appointed to
 25 fill a vacancy shall serve for the remainder of the

1 term for which the predecessor of the member was
2 appointed.

3 “(4) REAPPOINTMENT.—No appointive member
4 of the Museum and Library Services Board who has
5 been a member for more than 7 consecutive years
6 shall be eligible for reappointment.

7 “(5) SERVICE UNTIL SUCCESSOR TAKES OF-
8 FICE.—Notwithstanding any other provision of this
9 subsection, an appointive member of the Museum
10 and Library Services Board shall serve after the ex-
11 piration of the term of the member until the suc-
12 cessor to the member takes office.

13 “(d) DUTIES AND POWERS.—

14 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Museum and Library
15 Services Board shall advise the Director on general
16 policies with respect to the duties, powers, and au-
17 thority of the Institute relating to museum and li-
18 brary services, including financial assistance award-
19 ed under this title.

20 “(2) NATIONAL AWARDS.—The Museum and
21 Library Services Board shall assist the Director in
22 making awards under section 209.

23 “(e) CHAIRPERSON.—The Director shall serve as
24 Chairperson of the Museum and Library Services Board.

25 “(f) MEETINGS.—

1 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Museum and Library
2 Services Board shall meet not less than 2 times each
3 year and at the call of the Director.

4 “(2) VOTE.—All decisions by the Museum and
5 Library Services Board with respect to the exercise
6 of its duties and powers shall be made by a majority
7 vote of the members of the Board who are present
8 and authorized to vote.

9 “(g) QUORUM.—A majority of the voting members of
10 the Museum and Library Services Board shall constitute
11 a quorum for the conduct of business at official meetings,
12 but a lesser number of members may hold hearings.

13 “(h) COMPENSATION AND TRAVEL EXPENSES.—

14 “(1) COMPENSATION.—Each member of the
15 Museum and Library Services Board who is not an
16 officer or employee of the Federal Government may
17 be compensated at a rate to be fixed by the Presi-
18 dent, but not to exceed the daily equivalent of the
19 maximum annual rate of pay authorized for a posi-
20 tion above grade GS–15 of the General Schedule
21 under section 5108 of title 5, United States Code,
22 for each day (including travel time) during which
23 such member is engaged in the performance of the
24 duties of the Museum and Library Services Board.
25 Members of the Museum and Libraries Services

1 Board who are full-time officers or employees of the
2 Federal Government may not receive additional pay,
3 allowances, or benefits by reason of their service on
4 the Board.

5 “(2) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—Each member of the
6 Museum and Library Services Board shall receive
7 travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsist-
8 ence, in accordance with applicable provisions under
9 subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States
10 Code.

11 “(i) COORDINATION.—The Director, with the advice
12 of the Museum and Library Services Board, shall take
13 steps to ensure that the policies and activities of the Insti-
14 tute are coordinated with other activities of the Federal
15 Government.”.

16 **SEC. 105. AWARDS; ANALYSIS OF IMPACT OF SERVICES.**

17 The Museum and Library Services Act (20 U.S.C.
18 9101 et seq.) is amended by inserting after section 208
19 (as redesignated by section 104 of this Act) the following:

20 **“SEC. 209. AWARDS.**

21 “The Director, with the advice of the Museum and
22 Library Services Board, may annually award National
23 Awards for Library Service and National Awards for Mu-
24 seum Service to outstanding libraries and outstanding mu-

1 seums, respectively, that have made significant contribu-
 2 tions in service to their communities.

3 **“SEC. 210. ANALYSIS OF IMPACT OF MUSEUM AND LIBRARY**
 4 **SERVICES.**

5 “From amounts described in sections 214(c) and
 6 274(b), the Director shall carry out and publish analyses
 7 of the impact of museum and library services. Such
 8 analyses—

9 “(1) shall be conducted in ongoing consultation
 10 with—

11 “(A) State library administrative agencies;

12 “(B) State, regional, and national library
 13 and museum organizations; and

14 “(C) other relevant agencies and organiza-
 15 tions;

16 “(2) shall identify national needs for, and
 17 trends of, museum and library services provided with
 18 funds made available under subtitles B and C;

19 “(3) shall report on the impact and effective-
 20 ness of programs conducted with funds made avail-
 21 able by the Institute in addressing such needs; and

22 “(4) shall identify, and disseminate information
 23 on, the best practices of such programs to the agen-
 24 cies and entities described in paragraph (1).”.

1 **TITLE II—LIBRARY SERVICES**
2 **AND TECHNOLOGY**

3 **SEC. 201. PURPOSE.**

4 Section 212 of the Library Services and Technology
5 Act (20 U.S.C. 9121) is amended by striking paragraphs
6 (2) through (5) and inserting the following:

7 “(2) to promote improvement in library services
8 in all types of libraries in order to better serve the
9 people of the United States;

10 “(3) to facilitate access to resources in all types
11 of libraries for the purpose of cultivating an edu-
12 cated and informed citizenry; and

13 “(4) to encourage resource sharing among all
14 types of libraries for the purpose of achieving eco-
15 nomical and efficient delivery of library services to
16 the public.”.

17 **SEC. 202. DEFINITIONS.**

18 Section 213 of the Library Services and Technology
19 Act (20 U.S.C. 9122) is amended—

20 (1) by striking paragraph (1); and

21 (2) by redesignating paragraphs (2), (3), (4),
22 (5), and (6) as paragraphs (1), (2), (3), (4), and
23 (5), respectively.

1 **SEC. 203. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

2 Section 214 of the Library Services and Technology
3 Act (20 U.S.C. 9123) is amended—

4 (1) by amending subsection (a) to read as fol-
5 lows:

6 “(a) IN GENERAL.—There are authorized to be ap-
7 propriated to carry out this subtitle \$350,000,000 for fis-
8 cal year 2003 and such sums as may be necessary for fis-
9 cal years 2004 through 2008.”; and

10 (2) in subsection (c), by striking “3 percent”
11 and inserting “3.5 percent”.

12 **SEC. 204. RESERVATIONS AND ALLOTMENTS.**

13 Section 221(b)(3) of the Library Services and Tech-
14 nology Act (20 U.S.C. 9131(b)(3)) is amended to read as
15 follows:

16 “(3) MINIMUM ALLOTMENTS.—

17 “(A) IN GENERAL.—For purposes of this
18 subsection, the minimum allotment for each
19 State shall be \$340,000, except that the min-
20 imum allotment shall be \$40,000 in the case of
21 the United States Virgin Islands, Guam, Amer-
22 ican Samoa, the Commonwealth of the North-
23 ern Mariana Islands, the Republic of the Mar-
24 shall Islands, the Federated States of Micro-
25 nesia, and the Republic of Palau.

1 “(B) Ratable reductions.—Notwith-
 2 standing subparagraph (A), if the sum appro-
 3 priated under the authority of section 214 and
 4 not reserved under subsection (a) for any fiscal
 5 year is insufficient to fully satisfy the require-
 6 ment of subparagraph (A), each of the min-
 7 imum allotments under such subparagraph shall
 8 be reduced ratably.

9 “(C) Exception.—

10 “(i) In general.—Notwithstanding
 11 subparagraph (A), if the sum appropriated
 12 under the authority of section 214 and not
 13 reserved under subsection (a) for any fiscal
 14 year exceeds the aggregate of the allot-
 15 ments for all States under this subsection
 16 for fiscal year 2002—

17 “(I) the minimum allotment for
 18 each State otherwise receiving a min-
 19 imum allotment of \$340,000 under
 20 subparagraph (A) shall be increased
 21 to \$680,000; and

22 “(II) the minimum allotment for
 23 each State otherwise receiving a min-
 24 imum allotment of \$40,000 under

1 subparagraph (A) shall be increased
2 to \$60,000.

3 “(ii) INSUFFICIENT FUNDS TO AWARD
4 ALTERNATIVE MINIMUM.—If the sum ap-
5 propriated under the authority of section
6 214 and not reserved under subsection (a)
7 for any fiscal year exceeds the aggregate of
8 the allotments for all States under this
9 subsection for fiscal year 2002 yet is insuf-
10 ficient to fully satisfy the requirement of
11 clause (i), such excess amount shall first
12 be allotted among the States described in
13 clause (i)(I) so as to increase equally the
14 minimum allotment for each such State
15 above \$340,000. After the requirement of
16 clause (i)(I) is fully satisfied for any fiscal
17 year, any remainder of such excess amount
18 shall be allotted among the States de-
19 scribed in clause (i)(II) so as to increase
20 equally the minimum allotment for each
21 such State above \$40,000.

22 “(D) SPECIAL RULE.—

23 “(i) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding
24 any other provision of this subsection and
25 using funds allotted for the Republic of the

1 Marshall Islands, the Federated States of
 2 Micronesia, and the Republic of Palau
 3 under this subsection, the Director shall
 4 award grants to the United States Virgin
 5 Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Com-
 6 monwealth of the Northern Mariana Is-
 7 lands, the Republic of the Marshall Is-
 8 lands, the Federated States of Micronesia,
 9 or the Republic of Palau to carry out ac-
 10 tivities described in this subtitle in accord-
 11 ance with the provisions of this subtitle
 12 that the Director determines are not incon-
 13 sistent with this subparagraph.

14 “(ii) AWARD BASIS.—The Director
 15 shall award grants pursuant to clause (i)
 16 on a competitive basis and pursuant to rec-
 17 ommendations from the Pacific Region
 18 Educational Laboratory in Honolulu, Ha-
 19 waii.

20 “(iii) ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS.—The
 21 Director may provide not more than 5 per-
 22 cent of the funds made available for grants
 23 under this subparagraph to pay the admin-
 24 istrative costs of the Pacific Region Edu-

1 cational Laboratory regarding activities as-
 2 sisted under this subparagraph.”.

3 **SEC. 205. STATE PLANS.**

4 Section 224 of the Library Services and Technology
 5 Act (20 U.S.C. 9134) is amended—

6 (1) in subsection (a)(1), by striking “not later
 7 than April 1, 1997.” and inserting “once every 5
 8 years, as determined by the Director.”; and

9 (2) in subsection (f)—

10 (A) by striking “this Act” each place such
 11 term appears and inserting “this subtitle”;

12 (B) in paragraph (1)—

13 (i) by striking “1934,” and all that
 14 follows through “Act, may” and inserting
 15 “1934 (47 U.S.C. 254(h)(6)) may”; and

16 (ii) by striking “section 213(2)(A) or
 17 (B)” and inserting “section 213(1)(A) or
 18 (B)”; and

19 (C) in paragraph (7)—

20 (i) in the matter preceding subpara-
 21 graph (A), by striking “section:” and in-
 22 serting “subsection:”; and

23 (ii) in subparagraph (D), by striking
 24 “given” and inserting “applicable to”.

1 **SEC. 206. GRANTS TO STATES.**

2 Section 231 of the Library Services and Technology
3 Act (20 U.S.C. 9141) is amended—

4 (1) in subsection (a), by striking paragraphs
5 (1) and (2) and inserting the following:

6 “(1) expanding services for learning and access
7 to information and educational resources in a variety
8 of formats, in all types of libraries, for individuals
9 of all ages;

10 “(2) developing library services that provide all
11 users access to information through local, State, re-
12 gional, national, and international electronic net-
13 works;

14 “(3) providing electronic and other linkages
15 among and between all types of libraries;

16 “(4) developing public and private partnerships
17 with other agencies and community-based organiza-
18 tions;

19 “(5) targeting library services to individuals of
20 diverse geographic, cultural, and socioeconomic back-
21 grounds, to individuals with disabilities, and to indi-
22 viduals with limited functional literacy or informa-
23 tion skills; and

24 “(6) targeting library and information services
25 to persons having difficulty using a library and to
26 underserved urban and rural communities, including

1 children (from birth through age 17) from families
 2 with incomes below the poverty line (as defined by
 3 the Office of Management and Budget and revised
 4 annually in accordance with section 673(2) of the
 5 Community Services Block Grant Act (42 U.S.C.
 6 9902(2))) applicable to a family of the size in-
 7 volved.”; and

8 (2) in subsection (b), by striking “between the
 9 two purposes described in paragraphs (1) and (2) of
 10 such subsection,” and inserting “among such pur-
 11 poses,”.

12 **SEC. 207. NATIONAL LEADERSHIP GRANTS, CONTRACTS, OR**
 13 **COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.**

14 Section 262(a)(1) of the Library Services and Tech-
 15 nology Act (20 U.S.C. 9162(a)(1)) is amended by striking
 16 “education and training” and inserting “education, re-
 17 cruitment, and training”.

18 **TITLE III—MUSEUM SERVICES**

19 **SEC. 300. SHORT TITLE.**

20 Subtitle C of the Museum and Library Services Act
 21 (20 U.S.C. 9171 et seq.) is amended by inserting before
 22 section 271 the following:

23 **“SEC. 270. SHORT TITLE.**

24 “This subtitle may be cited as the ‘Museum Services
 25 Act’.”.

1 **SEC. 301. PURPOSE.**

2 Section 271 of the Museum and Library Services Act
3 (20 U.S.C. 9171) is amended to read as follows:

4 **“SEC. 271. PURPOSE.**

5 “It is the purpose of this subtitle—

6 “(1) to encourage and support museums in car-
7 rying out their public service role of connecting the
8 whole of society to the cultural, artistic, historical,
9 natural, and scientific understandings that con-
10 stitute our heritage;

11 “(2) to encourage and support museums in car-
12 rying out their educational role, as core providers of
13 learning and in conjunction with schools, families,
14 and communities;

15 “(3) to encourage leadership, innovation, and
16 applications of the most current technologies and
17 practices to enhance museum services;

18 “(4) to assist, encourage, and support museums
19 in carrying out their stewardship responsibilities to
20 achieve the highest standards in conservation and
21 care of the cultural, historic, natural, and scientific
22 heritage of the United States to benefit future gen-
23 erations;

24 “(5) to assist, encourage, and support museums
25 in achieving the highest standards of management
26 and service to the public, and to ease the financial

1 burden borne by museums as a result of their in-
 2 creasing use by the public; and

3 “(6) to support resource sharing and partner-
 4 ships among museums, libraries, schools, and other
 5 community organizations.”.

6 **SEC. 302. DEFINITIONS.**

7 Section 272(1) of the Museum and Library Services
 8 Act (20 U.S.C. 9172(1)) is amended by adding at the end
 9 the following: “Such term includes aquariums, arbore-
 10 tums, botanical gardens, art museums, children’s muse-
 11 ums, general museums, historic houses and sites, history
 12 museums, nature centers, natural history and anthro-
 13 pology museums, planetariums, science and technology
 14 centers, specialized museums, and zoological parks.”.

15 **SEC. 303. MUSEUM SERVICES ACTIVITIES.**

16 Section 273 of the Museum and Library Services Act
 17 (20 U.S.C. 9173) is amended to read as follows:

18 **“SEC. 273. MUSEUM SERVICES ACTIVITIES.**

19 “(a) IN GENERAL.—The Director, subject to the pol-
 20 icy advice of the Museum and Library Services Board,
 21 may enter into arrangements, including grants, contracts,
 22 cooperative agreements, and other forms of assistance to
 23 museums and other entities as the Director considers ap-
 24 propriate, to pay for the Federal share of the cost—

1 “(1) to support museums in providing learning
2 and access to collections, information, and edu-
3 cational resources in a variety of formats (including
4 exhibitions, programs, publications, and websites)
5 for individuals of all ages;

6 “(2) to support museums in building learning
7 partnerships with the Nation’s schools and devel-
8 oping museum resources and programs in support of
9 State and local school curricula;

10 “(3) to support museums in assessing, con-
11 serving, researching, maintaining, and exhibiting
12 their collections, and in providing educational pro-
13 grams to the public through the use of their collec-
14 tions;

15 “(4) to stimulate greater collaboration among
16 museums, libraries, schools, and other community
17 organizations in order to share resources and
18 strengthen communities;

19 “(5) to encourage the use of new technologies
20 and broadcast media to enhance access to museum
21 collections, programs, and services;

22 “(6) to support museums in providing services
23 to people of diverse geographic, cultural, and socio-
24 economic backgrounds and to individuals with dis-
25 abilities;

1 “(7) to support museums in developing and car-
2 rying out specialized programs for specific segments
3 of the public, such as programs for urban neighbor-
4 hoods, rural areas, Indian reservations, and State
5 institutions;

6 “(8) to support professional development and
7 technical assistance programs to enhance museum
8 operations at all levels, in order to ensure the high-
9 est standards in all aspects of museum operations;

10 “(9) to support museums in research, program
11 evaluation, and the collection and dissemination of
12 information to museum professionals and the public;
13 and

14 “(10) to encourage, support, and disseminate
15 model programs of museum and library collabora-
16 tion.

17 “(b) FEDERAL SHARE.—

18 “(1) 50 PERCENT.—Except as provided in para-
19 graph (2), the Federal share described in subsection
20 (a) shall be not more than 50 percent.

21 “(2) GREATER THAN 50 PERCENT.—The Direc-
22 tor may use not more than 20 percent of the funds
23 made available under this subtitle for a fiscal year
24 to enter into arrangements under subsection (a) for

1 which the Federal share may be greater than 50
2 percent.

3 “(3) OPERATIONAL EXPENSES.—No funds for
4 operational expenses may be provided under this sec-
5 tion to any entity that is not a museum.

6 “(c) REVIEW AND EVALUATION.—The Director shall
7 establish procedures for reviewing and evaluating arrange-
8 ments described in subsection (a) entered into under this
9 subtitle. Procedures for reviewing such arrangements shall
10 not be subject to any review outside of the Institute.

11 “(d) SERVICES FOR NATIVE AMERICANS.—From
12 amounts appropriated under section 274, the Director
13 shall reserve 1.75 percent to award grants to, or enter into
14 contracts or cooperative agreements with, Indian tribes
15 and to organizations that primarily serve and represent
16 Native Hawaiians (as defined in section 7207 of the Na-
17 tive Hawaiian Education Act (20 U.S.C. 7517)) to enable
18 such tribes and organizations to carry out the activities
19 described in subsection (a).”.

20 **SEC. 304. REPEALS.**

9 2008.”.
