# A BILL

To establish the Crossroads of the American Revolution National Heritage Area in the State of New Jersey, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Crossroads of the
- 5 American Revolution National Heritage Area Act of
- 6 2002".

#### SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

2 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—	2	(a)	FINDINGS.—	-Congress	finds	that-
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- 1) the State of New Jersey was critically important during the American Revolution because of
  the strategic location of the State between the British armies headquartered in New York City, New
  York, and the Continental Congress in the city of
  Philadelphia, Pennsylvania;
  - (2) General George Washington spent almost half of the period of the American Revolution personally commanding troops of the Continental Army in the State of New Jersey, including 2 severe winters spent in encampments in the area that is now Morristown National Historical Park, a unit of the National Park System;
  - (3) it was during the 10 crucial days of the American Revolution between December 25, 1776, and January 3, 1777, that General Washington, after retreating across the State of New Jersey from the State of New York to the State of Pennsylvania in the face of total defeat, recrossed the Delaware River on the night of December 25, 1776, and went on to win crucial battles at Trenton and Princeton in the State of New Jersey;

1	(4) Thomas Paine, who accompanied the troops
2	during the retreat, described the events during those
3	days as "the times that try men's souls";
4	(5) the sites of 296 military engagements are
5	located in the State of New Jersey, including—
6	(A) several important battles of the Amer-
7	ican Revolution that were significant to—
8	(i) the outcome of the American Revo-
9	lution; and
10	(ii) the history of the United States;
11	and
12	(B) several national historic landmarks, in-
13	cluding Washington's Crossing, the Old Tren-
14	ton Barracks, and Princeton, Monmouth and
15	Red Bank Battlefields;
16	(6) additional national historic landmarks in
17	the State of New Jersey include the homes of—
18	(A) Richard Stockton, Joseph Hewes, John
19	Witherspoon, and Francis Hopkinson, signers
20	of the Declaration of Independence;
21	(B) Elias Boudinout, President of the Con-
22	tinental Congress; and
23	(C) William Livingston, patriot and Gov-
24	ernor of the State of New Jersey from 1776 to
25	1790;

1	(7) portions of the landscapes important to the
2	strategies of the British and Continental armies, in-
3	cluding waterways, mountains, farms, wetlands, vil-
4	lages, and roadways—
5	(A) retain the integrity of the period of the
6	American Revolution; and
7	(B) offer outstanding opportunities for
8	conservation, education, and recreation;
9	(8) the National Register of Historic Places
10	lists 251 buildings and sites in the National Park
11	Service study area for the Crossroads of the Amer-
12	ican Revolution that are associated with the period
13	of the American Revolution;
14	(9) civilian populations residing in the State of
15	New Jersey during the American Revolution suffered
16	extreme hardships because of—
17	(A) the continuous conflict in the State;
18	(B) foraging armies; and
19	(C) marauding contingents of loyalist To-
20	ries and rebel sympathizers;
21	(10) because of the important role that the
22	State of New Jersey played in the successful out-
23	come of the American Revolution, there is a Federal
24	interest in developing a regional framework to assist

1	the State of New Jersey, local governments and or-
2	ganizations, and private citizens in—
3	(A) preserving and protecting cultural, his-
4	toric, and natural resources of the period; and
5	(B) bringing recognition to those resources
6	for the educational and recreational benefit of
7	the present and future generations of citizens of
8	the United States; and
9	(11) the National Park Service has conducted a
10	national heritage area feasibility study in the State
11	of New Jersey that demonstrates that there is a suf-
12	ficient assemblage of nationally distinctive cultural,
13	historic, and natural resources necessary to establish
14	the Crossroads of the American Revolution National
15	Heritage Area.
16	(b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are—
17	(1) to assist communities, organizations, and
18	citizens in the State of New Jersey in preserving—
19	(A) the special historic identity of the
20	State; and
21	(B) the importance of the State to the
22	United States;
23	(2) to foster a close working relationship among
24	all levels of government, the private sector, and local
25	communities in the State;

1	(3) to provide for the management, preserva-
2	tion, protection, and interpretation of the cultural,
3	historic, and natural resources of the State for the
4	educational and inspirational benefit of future gen-
5	erations;
6	(4) to strengthen the value of Morristown Na-
7	tional Historical Park as an asset to the State by—
8	(A) establishing a network of related his-
9	toric resources, protected landscapes, edu-
10	cational opportunities, and events depicting the
11	landscape of the State of New Jersey during
12	the American Revolution; and
13	(B) establishing partnerships between Mor-
14	ristown National Historical Park and other
15	public and privately owned resources in the
16	Heritage Area that represent the strategic ful-
17	crum of the American Revolution; and
18	(5) to authorize Federal financial and technical
19	assistance for the purposes described in paragraphs
20	(1) through (4).
21	SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.
22	In this Act:
23	(1) Association.—The term "Association"
24	means the Crossroads of the American Revolution

1	Association, Inc., a nonprofit corporation in the
2	State.
3	(2) Heritage Area.—The term "Heritage
4	Area" means the Crossroads of the American Revo-
5	lution National Heritage Area established by section
6	4(a).
7	(3) Management entity.—The term "man-
8	agement entity" means the management entity for
9	the Heritage Area designated by section 4(d).
10	(4) Management plan.—The term "manage-
11	ment plan" means the management plan for the
12	Heritage Area developed under section 5.
13	(5) MAP.—The term "map" means the map en-
14	titled "Crossroads of the American Revolution Na-
15	tional Heritage Area", numbered CRRE\80,000, and
16	dated April 2002.
17	(6) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
18	the Secretary of the Interior.
19	(7) STATE.—The term "State" means the State
20	of New Jersey.
21	SEC. 4. CROSSROADS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION NA
22	TIONAL HERITAGE AREA.
23	(a) Establishment.—There is established in the
24	State the Crossroads of the American Revolution National

25 Heritage Area.

1	(b) Boundaries.—The Heritage Area shall consist
2	of the land and water within the boundaries of the Herit-
3	age Area, as depicted on the map.
4	(c) AVAILABILITY OF MAP.—The map shall be on file
5	and available for public inspection in the appropriate of-
6	fices of the National Park Service.
7	(d) Management Entity.—The Association shall
8	be the management entity for the Heritage Area.
9	SEC. 5. MANAGEMENT PLAN.
10	(a) In General.—Not later than 3 years after the
11	date on which funds are first made available to carry out
12	this Act, the management entity shall submit to the Sec-
13	retary for approval a management plan for the Heritage
14	Area.
15	(b) REQUIREMENTS.—The management plan shall—
16	(1) include comprehensive policies, strategies,
17	and recommendations for conservation, funding,
18	management, and development of the Heritage Area;
19	(2) take into consideration existing State, coun-
20	ty, and local plans;
21	(3) describe actions that units of local govern-
22	ment, private organizations, and individuals have
23	agreed to take to protect the cultural, historic, and

natural resources of the Heritage Area;

1	(4) identify existing and potential sources of
2	funding for the protection, management, and devel-
3	opment of the Heritage Area during the first 5 years
4	of implementation of the management plan; and
5	(5) include—
6	(A) an inventory of the cultural, edu-
7	cational, historic, natural, recreational, and sce-
8	nic resources of the Heritage Area relating to
9	the themes of the Heritage Area that should be
10	restored, managed, or developed;
11	(B) recommendations of policies and strat-
12	egies for resource management that result in—
13	(i) application of appropriate land and
14	water management techniques; and
15	(ii) development of intergovernmental
16	and interagency cooperative agreements to
17	protect the cultural, educational, historic
18	natural, recreational, and scenic resources
19	of the Heritage Area;
20	(C) a program of implementation of the
21	management plan that includes for the first 5
22	years of implementation—
23	(i) plans for resource protection, res-
24	toration, construction; and

1	(ii) specific commitments for imple-
2	mentation that have been made by the
3	management entity or any government, or-
4	ganization, or individual;
5	(D) an analysis of and recommendations
6	for ways in which Federal, State, and local pro-
7	grams, including programs of the National
8	Park Service, may be best coordinated to pro-
9	mote the purposes of this Act; and
10	(E) an interpretive plan for the Heritage
11	Area.
12	(c) Approval or Disapproval of Management
12

6	(B) the management entity provided ade-
7	quate opportunity for public and governmental
8	involvement in the preparation of the manage-
9	ment plan, including public hearings;
10	(C) the resource protection and interpreta-
11	tion strategies in the management plan would
12	adequately protect the cultural, historic, and
13	natural resources of the Heritage Area; and
14	(D) the Secretary has received adequate
15	assurances from the appropriate State and local
16	officials whose support is needed to ensure the
17	effective implementation of the State and local
18	aspects of the management plan.
19	(3) ACTION FOLLOWING DISAPPROVAL.—If the
20	Secretary disapproves the management plan under
21	paragraph (1), the Secretary shall—
22	(A) advise the management entity in writ-
23	ing of the reasons for the disapproval;
24	(B) make recommendations for revisions to
25	the management plan; and

1 (C) not later than 60 days after the receipt 2 of any proposed revision of the management 3 plan from the management entity, approve or 4 disapprove the proposed revision. 5 (d) Amendments.— 6 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall approve 7 or disapprove each amendment to the management 8 plan that the Secretary determines may make a sub-9 stantial change to the management plan. 10 (2) Use of funds.—Funds made available 11 under this Act shall not be expended by the manage-12 ment entity to implement an amendment described 13 in paragraph (1) until the Secretary approves the 14 amendment. 15 (e) Implementation.—On completion of the 3-year period described in subsection (a), any funding made 16 17 available under this Act shall be made available to the management entity only for implementation of the ap-18 19 proved management plan. SEC. 6. AUTHORITIES, DUTIES, AND PROHIBITIONS APPLI-21 CABLE TO THE MANAGEMENT ENTITY. 22 (a) AUTHORITIES.—For purposes of preparing and 23 implementing the management plan, the management en-

tity may use funds made available under this Act to—

1	(1) make grants to, provide technical assistance
2	to, and enter into cooperative agreements with, the
3	State (including a political subdivision), a nonprofit
4	organization, or any other person;
5	(2) hire and compensate staff, including individ-
6	uals with expertise in—
7	(A) cultural, historic, or natural resource
8	protection; or
9	(B) heritage programming;
10	(3) obtain funds or services from any source
11	(including a Federal law or program);
12	(4) contract for goods or services; and
13	(5) support any other activity—
14	(A) that furthers the purposes of the Her-
15	itage Area; and
16	(B) that is consistent with the manage-
17	ment plan.
18	(b) Duties.—In addition to developing the manage-
19	ment plan, the management entity shall—
20	(1) assist units of local government, regional
21	planning organizations, and nonprofit organizations
22	in implementing the approved management plan
23	by—

1	(A) carrying out programs and projects
2	that recognize, protect, and enhance important
3	resource values in the Heritage Area;
4	(B) establishing and maintaining interpre-
5	tive exhibits and programs in the Heritage
6	Area;
7	(C) developing recreational and educational
8	opportunities in the Heritage Area;
9	(D) increasing public awareness of and ap-
10	preciation for cultural, historic, and natural re-
11	sources of the Heritage Area;
12	(E) protecting and restoring historic sites
13	and buildings that are—
14	(i) located in the Heritage Area; and
15	(ii) related to the themes of the Herit-
16	age Area;
17	(F) ensuring that clear, consistent, and ap-
18	propriate signs identifying points of public ac-
19	cess and sites of interest are installed through-
20	out the Heritage Area; and
21	(G) promoting a wide range of partner-
22	ships among governments, organizations, and
23	individuals to further the purposes of the Herit-
24	age Area;

1	(2) in preparing and implementing the manage-
2	ment plan, consider the interests of diverse units of
3	government, businesses, organizations, and individ-
4	uals in the Heritage Area;
5	(3) conduct public meetings at least semiannu-
6	ally regarding the development and implementation
7	of the management plan;
8	(4) for any fiscal year for which Federal funds
9	are received under this Act—
10	(A) submit to the Secretary a report that
11	describes for the year—
12	(i) the accomplishments of the man-
13	agement entity;
14	(ii) the expenses and income of the
15	management entity; and
16	(iii) each entity to which a grant was
17	made;
18	(B) make available for audit all informa-
19	tion relating to the expenditure of the funds
20	and any matching funds; and
21	(C) require, for all agreements authorizing
22	expenditures of Federal funds by any entity,
23	that the receiving entity make available for
24	audit all records and other information relating
25	to the expenditure of the funds:

1	(5) encourage, by appropriate means, economic
2	viability that is consistent with the purposes of the
3	Heritage Area; and
4	(6) maintain headquarters for the management
5	entity at Morristown National Historical Park and
6	in Mercer County.
7	(c) Prohibition on the Acquisition of Real
8	Property.—
9	(1) Federal funds.—The management entity
10	shall not use Federal funds made available under
11	this Act to acquire real property or any interest in
12	real property.
13	(2) Other funds.—Notwithstanding para-
14	graph (1), the management entity may acquire real
15	property or an interest in real property using any
16	other source of funding, including other Federal
17	funding.
18	SEC. 7. TECHNICAL AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE; OTHER
19	FEDERAL AGENCIES.
20	(a) TECHNICAL AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.—
21	(1) In general.—On the request of the man-
22	agement entity, the Secretary may provide technical
23	and financial assistance to the Heritage Area for the
24	development and implementation of the management
25	plan.

1	(2) Priority for assistance.—In providing
2	assistance under paragraph (1), the Secretary shall
3	give priority to actions that assist in—
4	(A) conserving the significant cultural, his-
5	toric, natural, and scenic resources of the Her-
6	itage Area; and
7	(B) providing educational, interpretive, and
8	recreational opportunities consistent with the
9	purposes of the Heritage Area.
10	(3) OPERATIONAL ASSISTANCE.—Subject to the
11	availability of appropriations, the Superintendent of
12	Morristown National Historical Park may, on re-
13	quest, provide to public and private organizations in
14	the Heritage Area, including the management entity,
15	any operational assistance that is appropriate for the
16	purpose of supporting the implementation of the
17	management plan.
18	(4) (3) Preservation of Historic Prop-
19	ERTIES.—To carry out the purposes of this Act, the
20	Secretary may provide assistance to a State or local
21	government or nonprofit organization to provide for
22	the appropriate treatment of—
23	(A) historic objects; or

1	(B) structures that are listed or eligible for
2	listing on the National Register of Historic
3	Places.
4	(5) (4) Cooperative agreements.—The Sec-
5	retary may enter into cooperative agreements with
6	the management entity and other public or private
7	entities to carry out this subsection.
8	(b) Other Federal Agencies.—Any Federa
9	agency conducting or supporting an activity that directly
10	affects the Heritage Area shall—
11	(1) consult with the Secretary and the manage
12	ment entity regarding the activity;
13	(2)(A) cooperate with the Secretary and the
14	management entity in carrying out the of the Fed-
15	eral agency under this Act; and
16	(B) to the maximum extent practicable, coordi-
17	nate the activity with the carrying out of those du-
18	ties; and
19	(3) to the maximum extent practicable, conduct
20	the activity to avoid adverse effects on the Heritage
21	Area.
22	SEC. 8. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
23	(a) In General.—There is authorized to be appro-
24	priated to carry out this Act \$10,000,000, of which not

- 1 more than \$1,000,000 may be authorized to be appro-
- 2 priated for any fiscal year.
- 3 (b) Cost-Sharing Requirement.—The Federal
- 4 share of the cost of any activity assisted under this Act
- 5 shall be not more than 50 percent.
- 6 SEC. 9. TERMINATION OF AUTHORITY.
- 7 The authority of the Secretary to provide assistance
- 8 under this Act terminates on the date that is 15 years
- 9 after the date of enactment of this Act.

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
