A BILL

To establish the Champlain Valley National Heritage Partnership in the States of Vermont and New York, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Champlain Valley Na-
- 5 tional Heritage Partnership Act of 2002".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

3	(1) the Champlain Valley and its extensive cul-
4	tural and natural resources have played a significant
5	role in the history of the United States and the indi-
6	vidual States of Vermont and New York;
7	(2) archaeological evidence indicates that the
8	Champlain Valley has been inhabited by humans
9	since the last retreat of the glaciers, with the Native
10	Americans living in the area at the time of Euro-
11	pean discovery being primarily of Iroquois and
12	Algonquin descent;
13	(3) the linked waterways of the Champlain Val-
14	ley, including the Richelieu River in Canada, played
15	a unique and significant role in the establishment
16	and development of the United States and Canada
17	through several distinct eras, including—
18	(A) the era of European exploration, dur-
19	ing which Samuel de Champlain and other ex-
20	plorers used the waterways as a means of ac-
21	cess through the wilderness;
22	(B) the era of military campaigns, includ-
23	ing highly significant military campaigns of the
24	French and Indian War, the American Revolu-
25	tion, and the War of 1812; and

1	(C) the era of maritime commerce, during
2	which canal boats, schooners, and steamships
3	formed the backbone of commercial transpor-
4	tation for the region;
5	(4) those unique and significant eras are best
6	described by the theme "The Making of Nations and
7	Corridors of Commerce";
8	(5) the artifacts and structures associated with
9	those eras are unusually well-preserved;
10	(6) the Champlain Valley is recognized as hav-
11	ing one of the richest collections of historical re-
12	sources in North America;
13	(7) the history and cultural heritage of the
14	Champlain Valley are shared with Canada and the
15	Province of Quebec;
16	(8) there are benefits in celebrating and pro-
17	moting this mutual heritage;
18	(9) tourism is among the most important indus-
19	tries in the Champlain Valley, and heritage tourism
20	in particular plays a significant role in the economy
21	of the Champlain Valley;
22	(10) it is important to enhance heritage tourism
23	in the Champlain Valley while ensuring that in-
24	ereased visitation will not impair the historical and
25	cultural resources of the region;

1	(11) according to the 1999 report of the Na-
2	tional Park Service entitled "Champlain Valley Her-
3	itage Corridor Project", "the Champlain Valley con-
4	tains resources and represents a theme 'the Making
5	of Nations and Corridors of Commerce', that is of
6	outstanding importance in U.S. history"; and
7	(12) it is in the interest of the United States
8	to preserve and interpret the historical and cultural
9	resources of the Champlain Valley for the education
10	and benefit of present and future generations.
11	(b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are—
12	(1) to establish the Champlain Valley National
13	Heritage Partnership in the States of Vermont and
14	New York to recognize the importance of the histor-
15	ical, cultural, and recreational resources of the
16	Champlain Valley region to the United States;
17	(2) to assist the States of Vermont and New
18	York, including units of local government and non-
19	governmental organizations in the States, in pre-
20	serving, protecting, and interpreting those resources

for the benefit of the people of the United States;

3	(2) Management entity.—The term "man-
4	agement entity" means the Lake Champlain Basin
5	Program.
6	(3) Management Plan.—The term "manage-
7	ment plan" means the management plan developed
8	under section $4(b)(1)(B)(i)$.
9	(4) Region.—
10	(A) In GENERAL.—The term "region"
11	means any area or community in 1 of the
12	States in which a physical, cultural, or histor-
13	ical resource that represents the theme is lo-
14	cated.
15	(B) Inclusions.—The term "region" in-
16	cludes—
17	(i) the linked navigable waterways
18	of
19	(I) Lake Champlain;
20	(H) Lake George;
21	(III) the Champlain Canal; and
22	(IV) the portion of the Upper
23	Hudson River extending south to
24	Saratoga;

1	(ii) portions of Grand Isle, Franklin,
2	Chittenden, Addison, Rutland, and
3	Bennington Counties in the State of
4	Vermont; and
5	(iii) portions of Clinton, Essex, War-
6	ren, Saratoga, and Washington Counties in
7	the State of New York.
8	(5) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
9	the Secretary of the Interior.
10	(6) STATE.—The term "State" means—
11	(A) the State of Vermont; and
12	(B) the State of New York.
13	(7) THEME.—The term "theme" means the
14	theme "The Making of Nations and Corridors of
15	Commerce", as the term is used in the 1999 report
16	of the National Park Service entitled "Champlain
17	Valley Heritage Corridor Project", that describes the
18	periods of international conflict and maritime com-
19	merce during which the region played a unique and
20	significant role in the development of the United
21	States and Canada.
22	SEC. 4. HERITAGE PARTNERSHIP.
23	(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the re-
24	gion the Champlain Valley National Heritage Partnership.
25	(b) Management Entity.—

1	(1) Duties.—
2	(A) In General.—The management entity
3	shall implement this Act.
4	(B) Management Plan.—
5	(i) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 3
6	years after the date of enactment of this
7	Act, the management entity shall develop a
8	management plan for the Heritage Part-
9	nership.
10	(ii) Contents.—The management
11	plan shall include—
12	(I) recommendations for funding,
13	managing, and developing the Herit-
14	age Partnership;
15	(II) a description of activities to
16	be carried out by public and private
17	organizations to protect the resources
18	of the Heritage Partnership;
19	(III) a list of specific, potential
20	sources of funding for the protection,
21	management, and development of the
22	Heritage Partnership;
23	(IV) an assessment of the organi-
24	zational capacity of the management

1	entity to achieve the goals for imple-
2	mentation; and
3	(V) recommendations of ways in
4	which to encourage collaboration with
5	Canada and the Province of Quebec in
6	implementing this Act.
7	(iii) Considerations.—In developing
8	the management plan under clause (i), the
9	management entity shall take into consid-
10	eration existing Federal, State, and local
11	plans relating to the region.
12	(2) Partnerships.—
13	(A) In General.—In carrying out this
14	Act, the management entity may enter into
15	partnerships with—
16	(i) the States, including units of local
17	governments in the States;
18	(ii) nongovernmental organizations;
19	(iii) Indian tribes; and
20	(iv) other persons in the Heritage
21	Partnership.
22	(B) Grants.—Subject to the availability
23	of funds, the management entity may provide
24	grants to partners under subparagraph (A) to
25	assist in implementing this Act.

1	(3) Prohibition on the acquisition of
2	REAL PROPERTY.—The management entity shall no
3	use Federal funds made available under this Act to
4	acquire real property or any interest in real prop
5	e rty.
6	(c) Assistance From Secretary.—To carry our
7	the purposes of this Act, the Secretary may provide ad
8	ministrative, technical, financial, design, development, and
9	operations assistance.
10	SEC. 5. EFFECT.
11	Nothing in this Act—
12	(1) grants powers of zoning or land use to the
13	management entity;
14	(2) modifies, enlarges, or diminishes the author
15	ity of the Federal Government or a State or loca
16	government to manage or regulate any use of land
17	under any law (including regulations); or
18	(3) obstructs or limits private business develop
19	ment activities or resource development activities.
20	SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
21	(a) In General.—There is authorized to be appro-
22	priated to carry out this Act not more than a total or
23	\$30,000,000, of which not more than \$2,000,000 may be
24	made available for any fiscal year.

1	(b) Non-Federal Share.—The non-Federal share
2	of the cost of any activities carried out using Federal
3	funds made available under subsection (a) shall be not less
4	than 10 percent.
5	SEC. 7. TERMINATION OF AUTHORITY.
6	The authority of the Secretary to provide assistance
7	under this Act terminates on the date that is 15 years
8	after the date of enactment of this Act.

5	(I) In general.—Not later than
6	3 years after the date of enactment of
7	this Act, the management entity shall
8	submit the management plan to the
9	Secretary for approval.
10	(II) Efffect of failure to
11	SUBMIT.—If a management plan is not
12	submitted to the Secretary by the date
13	specified in paragraph (I), the Sec-
14	retary shall not provide any additional
15	funding under this Act until a man-
16	agement plan for the Heritage Partner-
17	ship is submitted to the Secretary.
18	(vi) Approval.—Not later than 90
19	days after receiving the management plan
20	$submitted\ under\ subparagraph\ (V)(I),\ the$
21	Secretary, in consultation with the States,

13	and financial assistance to the management entity.
14	SEC. 5. EFFECT.
15	Nothing in this Act—
16	(1) grants powers of zoning or land use to the
17	management entity;
18	(2) modifies, enlarges, or diminishes the author-
19	ity of the Federal Government or a State or local gov-
20	ernment to manage or regulate any use of land under
21	any law (including regulations); or
22	(3) obstructs or limits private business develop-
23	ment activities or resource development activities.
