A BILL

- To establish a system of Interagency Homeland Security Fusion Centers, to require that budget requests for the Coast Guard for non-homeland security missions are not reduced, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Coast Guard Readiness
- 5 Act of 2002".

3 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary of Homeland
4 Security shall establish a system of Interagency Homeland
5 Security Fusion Centers.

6 (b) DUTIES.—The Centers shall collectively, have the7 following duties:

8 (1) Coordinate the interagency fusion of mari9 time homeland security information focusing on the
10 air and sea approaches to the United States.

(2) Facilitate information sharing between all
of the Federal agencies named in subsection (c) and
any foreign governments represented in the membership of a Center.

15 (3) Timely provide the appropriate Federal
16 agencies with intelligence information concerning
17 maritime threats to the homeland security of the
18 United States.

(c) MEMBERSHIP.—The Secretary of Homeland Security shall designate the members of each Interagency
Homeland Security Fusion Center from among personnel
of any or all of the following Federal agencies and foreign
governments.

24 (1) The United States Coast Guard.

25 (2) The United States Customs Service.

26 (3) The Drug Enforcement Administration.

1	(4) The Department of Defense.
2	(5) The Immigration and Naturalization Serv-
3	ice.
4	(6) The Transportation Security Administra-
5	tion.
6	(7) The Federal Bureau of Investigation.
7	(8) The Central Intelligence Agency.
8	(9) The National Security Agency.
9	(10) Any other Federal agency as the Secretary
10	determines necessary.
11	(11) Representatives of such foreign govern-
12	ments as the President may direct.
13	(d) FUNCTION.—Interagency Fusion Centers shall—
14	(1) have access to all databases and information
15	systems of Federal agencies represented in the mem-
16	bership of a Center subject to adequate protections
17	to ensure the security of such databases and sys-
18	tems;
19	(2) collect, compile, analyze, and disseminate
20	information from such agencies, including any infor-
21	mation concerning tracking vessels, cargo, and per-
22	sons of interest, to identify and locate potential
23	threats to the security of the homeland of the
24	United States; and

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(3) alert all pertinent government agencies re garding each potential homeland security threat im mediately upon ascertaining the threat.

4 (e) IMPLEMENTATION PLAN.—Not later than 1 year 5 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit to the Committee on 6 7 Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the Senate, the 8 Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the 9 House of Representatives, the Committee on Govern-10 mental Affairs of the Senate, the Committee on Government Reform of the House of Representatives, and the 11 12 Committees on Appropriations of the Senate and the 13 House of Representatives a detailed plan to implement the requirements of Interagency Homeland Security Fusion 14 15 Centers. The plan shall include the following matters:

- 16 (1) The number and location of the Interagency17 Homeland Security Fusion Centers.
- (2) Policies and procedures for establishing the
 Centers and commencing operations by the Centers,
 including the Federal agencies to be represented in
 the membership of the Centers.

(3) A discussion of how the Centers are to operate in conjunction with or in place of other intelligence or fusion centers.

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(4) Proposed legislation for any changes in au thorities of the Federal agencies represented in the
 membership of the Interagency Homeland Security
 Fusion Centers that the Secretary considers nec essary.

6 SEC. 3. COAST GUARD FUNDING FLOORS.

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—No budget request submitted to 8 the Congress pursuant to section 1105 of title 31, United 9 States Code, for fiscal year 2004 or fiscal year 2005 may 10 contain a request for the Coast Guard a reduction in annual total spending and annual internal budget allocations 11 for each non-homeland security mission area below the lev-12 13 els appropriated and allocated for the Coast Guard for fiscal year 2002 or for fiscal year 2003, whichever is greater 14 15 for each area.

16 (b) NON-HOMELAND SECURITY MISSIONS.—The
17 term "non-homeland security missions" means the fol18 lowing missions of the Coast Guard:

- 19 (1) Marine safety.
- 20 (2) Search and rescue.
- 21 (3) Aids to navigation.

22 (4) Living marine resources, including enforce-23 ment of laws relating to fisheries.

24 (5) Marine environmental protection.

25 (6) Ice operations.

1 (c) WAIVER.—

2 (1) IN GENERAL.—The President may waive 3 the requirements of subsection (a) if the Com-4 mandant of the Coast Guard simultaneously submits 5 to the President and to Congress in order to miti-6 gate substantially the consequences of a specific 7 major accident occurring after the date of the enact-8 ment of this Act, respond successfully to a specific 9 and unanticipated national or international crisis 10 arising after such date, counter a specific, unantici-11 pated threat to United States homeland security 12 identified after such date, or otherwise react satis-13 factorily to a specific, unanticipated event occurring 14 within a mission area of the Coast Guard after such 15 date.

16 (2) JUSTIFICATION.—Each recommendation of 17 a waiver under paragraph (1) shall include a de-18 tailed justification for the recommendation, includ-19 ing the specific information upon which the rec-20 ommendation is based and the specific reasons why 21 the Coast Guard could not effectively respond to the 22 accident, crisis, threat, or event without the waiver.

(3) INTELLIGENCE CERTIFICATION.—Any recommendation for a waiver based on a need to
counter a specific, unanticipated threat to United

States homeland security shall be accompanied by a
 certification by the Director of Central Intelligence
 that—

4 (A) there exists a preponderance of cred-5 ible, accurate, and compelling evidence within 6 the Intelligence Community that demonstrates 7 that the threat upon which the Commandant's 8 recommendation is based is real, unanticipated, 9 and acute, and that immediate action must be 10 taken to counter it; and

(B) the Intelligence Community is taking
specific and decisive steps to reduce significantly the probability that such threats will be
unanticipated in the future.

15SEC. 4. REPORT ON ACCELERATING THE INTEGRATED16DEEPWATER SYSTEM.

17 Not later than 90 days after the date of enactment of the National Homeland Security and Combating Ter-18 rorism Act of 2002, the Secretary of Homeland Security, 19 in consultation with the Commandant of the Coast Guard 20 21 shall submit a report to the Committee on Commerce, 22 Science, and Transportation of the Senate, and the Com-23 mittees on Appropriations of the Senate and the House 24 of Representatives a report that—

(1) contains an analysis of the feasibility of ac-1 2 celerating the rate of procurement in the Coast 3 Guard's Integrated Deepwater System from 20 4 years to 10 years; 5 (2) includes an estimate of the additional resources necessary for accelerating such rate of pro-6 7 curement; (3) describes the increased capabilities that 8 9 would result from the accelerated procurement, including any increase in the Coast Guard's homeland 10

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(4) provides a revised asset phase-in schedule
consistent with such an accelerated rate of procurement.
