- 3 SEC. 101. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This title may be eited as the "Education Sciences"
- 5 Reform Act of 2002".
- 6 SEC. 102. DEFINITIONS.
- 7 In this title:
- 8 (1) In GENERAL.—The terms "elementary
- 9 school", "secondary school", "local educational agen-
- 10 cy", and "State educational agency" have the mean-
- ings given those terms in section 9101 of the Ele-
- 12 mentary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20
- 13 U.S.C. 7801) and the terms "freely associated
- states" and "outlying area" have the meanings given

1	those terms in section 1121(e) of such Act (20
2	U.S.C. 6331(e)).
3	(2) APPLIED RESEARCH.—The term "applied
4	research" means research—
5	(A) to gain knowledge or understanding
6	necessary for determining the means by which
7	a recognized and specific need may be met; and
8	(B) that is specifically directed to the ad-
9	vancement of practice in the field of education.
10	(3) Basic research.—The term "basic re-
11	search'' means research—
12	(A) to gain fundamental knowledge or un-
13	derstanding of phenomena and observable facts.
14	without specific application toward processes or
15	products; and
16	(B) for the advancement of knowledge in
17	the field of education.
18	(4) BOARD.—The term "Board" means the Na-
19	tional Board for Education Sciences established
20	under section 116.
21	(5) DEPARTMENT.—The term "Department"
22	means the Department of Education.
23	(6) DEVELOPMENT.—The term "development"
24	means the systematic use of knowledge or under-
25	standing gained from the findings of scientifically

valid research and the shaping of that knowledge or understanding into products or processes that can be applied and evaluated and may prove useful in areas such as the preparation of materials and new methods of instruction and practices in teaching, that lead to the improvement of the academic skills of students, and that are replicable in different educational settings.

- (7) DIRECTOR.—The term "Director" means the Director of the Institute for Education Sciences.
- "dissemination" means the communication and transfer of the results of scientifically valid research, statistics, and evaluations, in forms that are understandable, easily accessible, and usable, or adaptable for use in, the improvement of educational practice by teachers, administrators, librarians, other practitioners, researchers, parents, policymakers, and the public, through publications, electronic transfer, and other means.
- (9) FIELD-INITIATED RESEARCH. The term "field-initiated research" means basic research or applied research in which specific questions and methods of study are generated by investigators

1	(including teachers and other practitioners) and that
2	conforms to standards of scientifically valid research.
3	(10) HISTORICALLY BLACK COLLEGE OR UNI-
4	VERSITY.—The term "historically Black college or
5	university" means a part B institution as defined in
6	section 322 of the Higher Education Act of 1965
7	(20 U.S.C. 1061).
8	(11) Institute.—The term "Institute" means
9	the Institute for Education Sciences established
10	under section 111.
11	(12) Institution of Higher Education.
12	The term "institution of higher education" has the
13	meaning given that term in section 101(a) of the
14	Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001(a)).
15	(13) National research and development
16	CENTER.—The term "National Research and Devel-
17	opment Center" means a research and development
18	center supported under section 133(e).
19	(14) Scientifically based research
20	STANDARDS.—(A) The term "scientifically based re-
21	search standards" means research standards that
22	(i) apply rigorous, systematic, and objec-
23	tive methodology to obtain reliable and valid
24	knowledge relevant to education activities and
25	programs; and

1	(ii) present findings and make claims that
2	are appropriate to and supported by the meth-
3	ods that have been employed.
4	(B) The term includes, appropriate to the re-
5	search being conducted—
6	(i) employing systematic, empirical meth-
7	ods that draw on observation or experiment;
8	(ii) involving data analyses that are ade-
9	quate to support the general findings;
10	(iii) relying on measurements or observa-
11	tional methods that provide reliable data;
12	(iv) making claims of causal relationships
13	only in random assignment experiments or
14	other designs (to the extent such designs sub-
15	stantially eliminate plausible competing expla-
16	nations for the obtained results);
17	(v) ensuring that studies and methods are
18	presented in sufficient detail and clarity to
19	allow for replication or, at a minimum, to offer
20	the opportunity to build systematically on the
21	findings of the research;
22	(vi) obtaining acceptance by a peer-re-
23	viewed journal or approval by a panel of inde-
24	pendent experts through a comparably rigorous,
25	objective, and scientific review; and

1	(vii) using research designs and methods
2	appropriate to the research question posed.
3	(15) Scientifically valid education eval-
4	UATION.—The term "scientifically valid education
5	evaluation" means an evaluation that—
6	(A) adheres to the highest possible stand-
7	ards of quality with respect to research design
8	and statistical analysis;
9	(B) provides an adequate description of the
10	programs evaluated and, to the extent possible,
11	examines the relationship between program im-
12	plementation and program impacts;
13	(C) provides an analysis of the results
14	achieved by the program with respect to its pro-
15	jeeted effects;
16	(D) employs experimental designs using
17	random assignment, when feasible, and other
18	research methodologies that allow for the
19	strongest possible causal inferences when ran-
20	dom assignment is not feasible; and
21	(E) may study program implementation
22	through a combination of scientifically valid and
23	reliable methods.
24	(16) Scientifically valid research.—The
25	term "scientifically valid research" includes applied

1	research and basic research in which the rationale,
2	design, and interpretation are soundly developed in
3	accordance with scientifically based research stand-
4	ards.
5	(17) Secretary.—The term "Secretary"
6	means the Secretary of Education.
7	(18) STATE.—The term "State" includes
8	(except as provided in section 158) each of the 50
9	States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth
10	of Puerto Rico, the freely associated states, and the
11	outlying areas.
12	(19) Technical assistance.—The term
13	"technical assistance" means—
14	(A) assistance in identifying, selecting, or
15	designing solutions based on scientifically valid
16	research, including professional development
17	and high quality training to implement solu-
18	tions leading to—
19	(i) improved practices and classroom
20	instruction; and
21	(ii) improved planning, design, and
22	administration of programs;
23	(B) assistance in interpreting, analyzing,
24	and utilizing statistics and evaluations, and

1	(C) other assistance necessary to encour-
2	age the improvement of teaching and learning
3	through the applications of techniques sup-
4	ported by scientifically valid research.
5	PART A—INSTITUTE FOR EDUCATION
6	SCIENCES
7	SEC. 111. ESTABLISHMENT.
8	(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There shall be in the Depart-
9	ment an Institute for Education Sciences, to be adminis-
10	tered by a Director (as described in section 114) and a
11	board of directors (as described in section 116).
12	(b) Mission.—
13	(1) In General.—The mission of the Institute
14	is to provide national leadership in expanding funda-
15	mental knowledge and understanding of education
16	from early childhood through postsecondary study,
17	in order to provide parents, educators, students, re-
18	searchers, policymakers, and the general public with
19	reliable information about—
20	(A) the condition and progress of edu-
21	cation in the United States;
22	(B) educational practices that support
23	learning and improve academic achievement and
24	educational equity for all students; and

1	(C) the effectiveness of Federal and other
2	education programs.
3	(2) Carrying out mission.—In carrying out
4	the mission described in paragraph (1), the Institute
5	shall compile statistics, develop products, and con-
6	duet research, evaluations, and dissemination activi-
7	ties in areas of demonstrated national need
8	(including in technology areas) that are supported
9	by Federal funds appropriated to the Institute and
10	ensure that such activities—
11	(A) conform to high standards of quality,
12	integrity, and accuracy; and
13	(B) are objective, secular, neutral, and
14	nonideological and are free of partisan political
15	influence and racial, cultural, gender, or re-
16	gional bias.
17	(e) Organization.—The Institute shall consist of
18	the following:
19	(1) The Office of the Director (as described in
20	section 114).
21	(2) The National Board for Education Sciences
22	(as described in section 116).
23	(3) The Office of Knowledge Utilization (as de-
24	scribed in section 118).

1	(4) The National Education Centers, which in-
2	clude—
3	(A) the National Center for Education Re-
4	search (as described in part B);
5	(B) the National Center for Education
6	Statistics (as described in part C); and
7	(C) the National Center for Education
8	Evaluation (as described in part D).
9	SEC. 112. FUNCTIONS.
10	From funds appropriated under section 191, the In-
11	stitute, directly or through grants, contracts, or coopera-
12	tive agreements, shall—
13	(1) conduct and support scientifically valid re-
14	search activities, including basic research and ap-
15	plied research, statistics activities, scientifically valid
16	education evaluation, development, and dissemina-
17	tion;
18	(2) disseminate the findings and results of sei-
19	entifically valid research in education;
20	(3) promote the use and application of knowl-
21	edge gained from scientifically valid research activi-
22	ties;
23	(4) strengthen the national capacity to conduct
24	scientifically valid research in education; and

1 (5) promote the coordination of scientifically 2 valid research in education within the Department 3 and the Federal Government. SEC. 113. DELEGATION. (a) DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY.—Notwithstanding 5 section 412 of the Department of Education Organization Act (20 U.S.C. 3472), the Secretary shall delegate to the 8 Director all functions for earrying out this title (other than administrative and support functions), except that— 10 (1) nothing in this title or in the National As-11 sessment of Educational Progress Authorization Act 12 shall be construed to alter or diminish the role, re-13 sponsibilities, or authority of the National Assess-14 ment Governing Board with respect to the National 15 Assessment of Educational Progress from those au-16 thorized by the National Education Statistics Act of 17 1994 on the day before the date of enactment of this 18 Act; 19 (2) members of the National Assessment Gov-20 erning Board shall continue to be appointed by the 21 Secretary: 22 (3) section 302(f)(1) of the National Assess-23 ment of Educational Progress Authorization Act

shall apply to the National Assessment Governing

1	Board in the exercise of its responsibilities under
2	this Act;
3	(4) sections 115 and 116 shall not apply to the
4	National Assessment of Educational Progress; and
5	(5) sections 115 and 116 shall not apply to the
6	National Assessment Governing Board.
7	(b) OTHER ACTIVITIES.—The Secretary may assign
8	the Institute responsibility for administering other activi-
9	ties, if those activities are consistent with—
10	(1) the Institute's priorities, as approved by the
11	National Board for Education Sciences under sec-
12	tion 115, and the Institute's mission, as described in
13	section 111(b); or
14	(2) the Institute's mission, but only if those ac-
15	tivities do not divert the Institute's focus from ac-
16	tivities that are consistent with its priorities and
17	mission.
18	SEC. 114. OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR.
19	(a) Appointment.—Except as provided in sub-
20	section (b)(2), the President, with the advice and consent
21	of the Senate, shall appoint the Director of the Institute.
22	(b) TERM.—
23	(1) In General.—The Director shall serve for
24	a term of 6 years, beginning on the date of appoint-

- 1 ment of the Director, but may be removed by the 2 President prior to the expiration of that term. 3 (2) First director.—The President, without 4 the advice and consent of the Senate, may appoint 5 the Assistant Secretary for the Office of Educational 6 Research and Improvement (as such office existed 7 on the day before the date of enactment of this Act) 8 to serve as the first Director of the Institute. 9 (3) Subsequent directors.—The Board may
- 9 (3) Subsequent directors.—The Board may
 10 make recommendations to the President with respect
 11 to the appointment of a Director under subsection
 12 (a), other than a Director appointed under para13 graph (2).
- (c) PAY.—The Director shall receive the rate of basic
 pay for level III of the Executive Schedule.
- 16 (d) QUALIFICATIONS.—The Director shall be selected
 17 from individuals who are highly qualified authorities in the
 18 fields of scientifically valid research, statistics, or evalua19 tion in education, as well as management within such
 20 areas, and have a demonstrated capacity for sustained
 21 productivity and leadership in these areas.
- 22 (e) ADMINISTRATION.—The Director shall—
- 23 (1) administer, oversee, and coordinate the ac-24 tivities earried out under the Institute; and

1	(2) coordinate and approve budgets and oper-
2	ating plans for each of the National Education Cen-
3	ters for submission to the Secretary.
4	(f) Duties.—The duties of the Director shall include
5	the following:
6	(1) To propose to the Board priorities for the
7	Institute, in accordance with section 115(a).
8	(2) To ensure the methodology applied in con-
9	ducting research, evaluation, and statistical analysis
10	is consistent with the standards for such activities
11	under this title.
12	(3) To coordinate education research and re-
13	lated activities earried out by the Institute with such
14	research and activities carried out by other agencies
15	within the Department and the Federal Government.
16	(4) To advise the Secretary on research, evalua-
17	tion, and statistics activities relevant to the activities
18	of the Department.
19	(5) To establish necessary procedures for tech-
20	nical and scientific peer review of the activities of
21	the Institute, consistent with section 116(b)(3).
22	(6) To ensure that all participants in research
23	conducted or supported by the Institute are afforded
24	their privacy rights and other relevant protections as
25	research subjects, in accordance with section 183 of

- this title, section 552a of title 5, United States

 Code, and sections 444 and 445 of the General Edu
 eation Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g, 1232h).
 - (7) To ensure that activities conducted or supported by the Institute are objective, secular, neutral, and nonideological and are free of partisan political influence and racial, cultural, gender, or regional bias.
 - (8) To undertake initiatives and programs to increase the participation of researchers and institutions that have been historically underutilized in Federal education research activities of the Institute, including historically Black colleges or universities or other institutions of higher education with large numbers of minority students.
 - (9) To coordinate with the Secretary to promote and provide for the coordination of research and development activities and technical assistance activities between the Institute and regional education laboratories and comprehensive centers.
 - (10) To solicit and consider the recommendations of education stakeholders, in order to ensure that there is broad and regular public and professional input from the educational field in the planning and carrying out of the Institute's activities.

1	(11) To coordinate the dissemination of infor-
2	mation on scientifically valid research.
3	(12) At the discretion of the Director and in
4	consultation with the National Academy of Sciences,
5	to conduct a study to determine—
6	(A) a standard by which States may accu-
7	rately measure the rate at which students drop
8	out of or graduate from secondary schools in
9	the United States (including on-time gradua-
10	tion); and
11	(B) the use of alcohol or illegal narcotics
12	as contributing factors to incidents of school vi-
13	olence committed by students during the reg-
14	ular school day and while participating in other
15	school-related activities.
16	(13) To earry out and support other activities
17	consistent with the priorities and mission of the In-
18	stitute.
19	(g) EXPERT GUIDANCE AND ASSISTANCE.—The Di-
20	rector may establish technical and scientific peer-review
21	groups and scientific program advisory committees for re-
22	search and evaluations that the Director determines are
23	necessary to earry out the requirements of this title. The
24	Director shall appoint such personnel, except that officers
25	and employees of the United States shall comprise no

- 1 more than one-fourth of the members of any such group
- 2 or committee and shall not receive additional compensa-
- 3 tion for their service as members of such a group or com-
- 4 mittee. The Director shall ensure that reviewers are highly
- 5 qualified and eapable to appraise education research and
- 6 development projects. The Federal Advisory Committee
- 7 Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to a peer-review group
- 8 or an advisory committee established under this sub-
- 9 section.
- 10 (h) REVIEW.—The Director may, when requested by
- 11 other officers of the Department or directed by the Sec-
- 12 retary, review the products and publications of other of-
- 13 fices of the Department to certify that evidence-based
- 14 claims about those products and publications are scientif-
- 15 ically valid.
- 16 SEC. 115. PRIORITIES.
- 17 (a) Proposal.—The Director shall propose to the
- 18 Board priorities for the Institute (taking into consider-
- 19 ation long-term research and development on core issues
- 20 conducted through the national research and development
- 21 centers (as defined in section 102)). The Director shall
- 22 identify topics that may require long-term research and
- 23 topics that are focused on understanding and solving par-
- 24 ticular education problems and issues, including those as-
- 25 sociated with the goals and requirements established in

the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20) U.S.C. 6301 et seq.) and the Higher Education Act of 2 3 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001 et seq.), such as— 4 (1) closing the achievement gap between high-5 performing and low-performing children, especially 6 achievement gaps between minority and nonminority 7 children and between socio-economically disadvan-8 taged children and such children's more advantaged 9 peers; and 10 (2) ensuring— 11 (A) that all children have the ability to ob-12 tain a high quality education and reach, at a 13 minimum, proficiency on challenging State aca-14 demic achievement standards and State aca-15 demic assessments, particularly in mathematics, 16 science, and reading or language arts; and 17 (B) educational access to, and opportuni-18 ties for, postsecondary education. 19 (b) APPROVAL.—The Board shall approve or disapprove the priorities for the Institute proposed by the Director, including any necessary revision of those priorities. 21 The Board shall transmit any priorities so approved to 23 the appropriate congressional committees. 24 (e) Consistency.—The Board shall ensure that priorities of the Institute and the National Center for Edu-

- 1 cation Research and the National Center for Education
- 2 Evaluation are consistent with the mission of the Insti-
- 3 tute.
- 4 (d) Public Availability and Comment.—
- 5 (1) PRIORITIES.—Before submitting to the
 6 Board proposed priorities for the Institute, the Di-
- 7 rector shall make such priorities available to the
- 8 public for comment (including by means of the
- 9 Internet and through publishing such priorities in
- the Federal Register). The Director shall provide to
- the Board a copy of each such comment submitted.
- 12 (2) Plan.—Upon approval of such priorities,
- the Director shall make the Institute's plan for ad-
- 14 dressing such priorities available for public comment
- in the same manner as under paragraph (1).
- 16 SEC. 116. NATIONAL BOARD FOR EDUCATION SCIENCES.
- 17 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Institute shall have a
- 18 board of directors, which shall be known as the National
- 19 Board for Education Sciences.
- 20 (b) DUTIES.—The duties of the Board shall be the
- 21 following:
- 22 (1) To advise and collaborate with the Director
- on the policies of the Institute.

1	(2) To consider and approve priorities proposed
2	by the Director under section 115 to guide the work
3	of the Institute.
4	(3) To review and approve procedures for tech-
5	nical and scientific peer review of the activities of
6	the Institute.
7	(4) To advise the Director on the establishment
8	of activities to be supported by the Institute, includ-
9	ing the general areas of research to be carried out
10	by the National Center for Education Research.
11	(5) To present to the Director such rec-
12	ommendations as it may find appropriate for—
13	(A) the strengthening of education re-
14	search; and
15	(B) the funding of the Institute.
16	(6) To advise the Director on the funding of
17	applications for grants, contracts, and cooperative
18	agreements for research, after the completion of peer
19	review.
20	(7) To review and regularly evaluate the work
21	of the Institute, to ensure that scientifically valid re-
22	search, evaluation, and statistical analysis are con-
23	sistent with the standards for such activities under
24	this title.

- (8) To advise the Director on ensuring that activities conducted or supported by the Institute are objective, secular, neutral, and nonideological and are free of partisan political influence and racial, cultural, gender, or regional bias.
 - (9) To solicit advice and information from those in the educational field, particularly practitioners and researchers, to recommend to the Director topies that require long-term, sustained, systematic, programmatic, and integrated research efforts, including knowledge utilization and wide dissemination of research, consistent with the priorities and mission of the Institute.
 - (10) To advise the Director on opportunities for the participation in, and the advancement of, women, minorities, and persons with disabilities in education research, statistics, and evaluation activities of the Institute.
 - (11) To recommend to the Director ways to enhance strategic partnerships and collaborative efforts among other Federal and State research agencies.
 - (12) To recommend to the Director individuals to serve as Commissioners of the National Education Centers.
- 25 (e) Composition.—

1	(1) VOTING MEMBERS.—The Board shall have
2	15 voting members appointed by the President, with
3	the advice and consent of the Senate.
4	(2) ADVICE.—The President shall solicit advice
5	regarding individuals to serve on the Board from the
6	National Academy of Sciences, the National Science
7	Board, and the National Science Advisor.
8	(3) Nonvoting ex officio members.—The
9	Board shall have the following nonvoting ex officie
10	members:
11	(A) The Director of the Institute for Edu-
12	cation Sciences.
13	(B) Each of the Commissioners of the Na-
14	tional Education Centers.
15	(C) The Director of the National Institute
16	of Child Health and Human Development.
17	(D) The Director of the Census.
18	(E) The Commissioner of Labor Statistics.
19	(F) The Director of the National Science
20	Foundation.
21	(4) Appointed membership.—
22	(A) QUALIFICATIONS.—Members ap-
23	pointed under paragraph (1) shall be highly
24	qualified to appraise education research, statis-

1	tics, evaluations, or development, and shall in-
2	elude the following individuals:
3	(i) Not fewer than 8 researchers in
4	the field of statistics, evaluation, social
5	sciences, or hard sciences, which may in-
6	elude those researchers recommended by
7	the National Academy of Sciences.
8	(ii) Individuals who are knowledgeable
9	about the educational needs of the United
10	States, who may include school-based pro-
11	fessional educators, parents with experi-
12	ence in promoting parental involvement in
13	education, Chief State School Officers
14	State postsecondary education executives
15	presidents of institutions of higher edu-
16	eation, local educational agency super-
17	intendents, early childhood experts, prin-
18	cipals, members of State or local boards of
19	education or Bureau-funded school boards
20	and individuals from business and industry
21	with experience in promoting private sector
22	involvement in education.
23	(B) Terms.—Each member appointed
24	under paragraph (1) shall serve for a term of
25	4 years, except that—

1	(i) the terms of the initial members
2	appointed under such paragraph shall (as
3	determined by a random selection process

16	pointed to fill a vacancy occurring before the

19	only for the remainder of that term.
20	(D) Conflict of interest.—A voting
21	member of the Board shall be considered a spe-
22	cial Government employee for the purposes of
23	the Ethics in Government Act of 1978.
24	(5) CHAIR.—The Board shall elect a chair from
25	among the members of the Board.

1 (6) Compensation.—Members of the Board 2 shall serve without pay for such service. Members of 3 the Board who are officers or employees of the 4 United States may not receive additional pay, allow-5 ances, or benefits by reason of their service on the 6 Board. 7 (7) Travel expenses.—The members of the 8 Board shall receive travel expenses, including per 9 diem in lieu of subsistence, in accordance with sub-10 chapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States 11 Code. 12 (8) Powers of the board.— 13 (A) EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR.—The Board shall have an Executive Director who shall be 14 15 appointed by the Board. 16 (B) ADDITIONAL STAFF.—The Board shall 17 utilize such additional staff as may be ap-18 pointed or assigned by the Executive Director, 19 in consultation with the Chair and the approval 20 of the Director. 21 (C) DETAIL OF PERSONNEL.—The Board 22 may use the services and facilities of any de-23 partment or agency of the Federal Government.

10	SEC. 118. OFFICE OF KNOWLEDGE UTILIZATION.
11	(a) Establishment.—There is established within
12	the Institute an Office of Knowledge Utilization.
13	(b) Duties.—The Office of Knowledge Utilization
14	shall—
15	(1) disseminate information on scientifically
16	valid research, statistics, and evaluation on edu-

21	(C) to the public, the media, voluntary or-

9	(c) Additional Duties.—In carrying out sub-
10	section (b), the Office of Knowledge Utilization shall—
11	(1) ensure that information disseminated under
12	this section is provided in a cost-effective, non-
13	duplicative manner that includes the most current
14	research findings, including through the continu-
15	ation of individual elearinghouses authorized under
16	the Educational Research, Development, Dissemina-
17	tion, and Improvement Act of 1994 (20 U.S.C. 6001
18	et seq.) (as such Act was in effect on the day before
19	the date of enactment of this Act);
20	(2) describe prominently the type of scientific
21	evidence that is used to support the findings that
22	are disseminated;
23	(3) explain clearly the scientifically appropriate
24	and inappropriate uses of—
25	(A) the findings that are disseminated and

1	(B) the types of evidence used to support
2	those findings; and
3	(4) respond, as appropriate, to inquiries from
4	schools, educators, parents, administrators, policy-

9	(1) School facilities clearinghouse.—
10	(A) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall
11	award a grant or contract to an entity, on a

13	elearinghouse that will collect and disseminate
14	information on effective, best educational prac-
15	tices and the latest research studies regarding
16	kindergarten through grade 12 school facilities
17	planning, design, financing, construction, oper-
18	ations, and maintenance.

11	(e) Continuation.—The Director shall continue
12	awards for the support of the Educational Resources In-
13	formation Center Clearinghouses (under section 941(f) of
14	the Educational Research, Development, Dissemination,
15	and Improvement Act of 1994 (as such awards were in
16	effect on the day before the date of enactment of this Act))
17	for the duration of those awards, in accordance with the
18	terms and agreements of such awards.
19	(f) National Library of Education.—
20	(1) Establishment. There is established
21	within the Office of Knowledge Utilization a Na-
22	tional Library of Education that shall—
23	(A) be headed by an individual who is
24	highly qualified in library science;
25	(B) collect and archive information;

1	(C) provide a central location within the
2	Federal Government for information about edu-
3	eation;
4	(D) provide comprehensive reference serv-
5	ices on matters related to education to employ-
6	ees of the Department of Education and its
7	contractors and grantees, other Federal employ-
8	ees, and members of the public; and
9	(E) promote greater cooperation and re-
10	source sharing among providers and reposi-
11	tories of education information in the United
12	States.
13	(2) Information.—The information collected
14	and archived by the National Library of Education
15	shall include—
16	(A) products and publications developed
17	through, or supported by, the Institute; and
18	(B) other relevant and useful education-re-
19	lated research, statistics, and evaluation mate-
20	rials and other information, projects, and publi-
21	eations that are—
22	(i) consistent with—
23	(I) scientifically valid research; or
24	(II) the priorities and mission of
25	the Institute; and

1	(ii) developed by the Department,
2	other Federal agencies, or entities
3	(including entities supported under the Re-
4	gional Assistance Act of 2002).
5	SEC. 119. AGREEMENTS.
6	The Institute may earry out research projects of com-
7	mon interest with entities such as the National Science
8	Foundation and the National Institute of Child Health
9	and Human Development through agreements that are in
10	accordance with section 430 of the General Education
11	Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1231).
12	SEC. 120. BIENNIAL REPORT.
13	The Director shall, on a biennial basis, transmit to
14	the President, the Board, and the appropriate congres-
15	sional committees, and make widely available to the public
16	(including by means of the Internet), a report containing
17	the following:
18	(1) A description of the activities carried out by
19	and through the National Education Centers during
20	the prior fiscal years.
21	(2) A summary of each grant, contract, and co-
22	operative agreement in excess of \$100,000 funded
23	through the National Education Centers during the
24	prior fiscal years, including, at a minimum, the

10	SEC. 121. COMPETITIVE AWARDS.
11	Research carried out under this Act through grants,

13	be awarded on a competitive basis and, when practicable,

17	SEC. 131. ESTABLISHMENT.
18	(a) Establishment.—There is established in the
19	Institute a National Center for Education Research (in
20	this part referred to as the "Research Center").
21	(b) Mission.—The mission of the Research Center
22	is
23	(1) to sponsor sustained research that will lead
24	to the accumulation of knowledge and understanding
25	of education, to—

1	(A) ensure that all children have the ability
2	to obtain a high quality education;
3	(B) improve student academic achieve-
4	ment;
5	(C) close the achievement gap between
6	high-performing and low-performing students
7	through the improvement of teaching and learn-
8	ing of reading, writing, mathematics, science,
9	and other academic subjects; and
10	(D) ensure educational access and oppor-
11	tunity for postsecondary education;
12	(2) to support the synthesis and, as appro-
13	priate, the integration of education research;
14	(3) to promote quality and integrity through
15	the use of accepted practices of scientific inquiry to
16	obtain knowledge and understanding of the validity
17	of education theories, practices, or conditions; and
18	(4) to promote scientifically valid research find-
19	ings that can provide the basis for improving aca-
20	demic instruction and lifelong learning.
21	SEC. 132. COMMISSIONER FOR EDUCATION RESEARCH.
22	The Research Center shall be headed by a Commis-
23	sioner for Education Research (in this part referred to as
24	the "Research Commissioner") who shall have substantial
25	knowledge of the activities of the Research Center, includ-

1	ing a high level of expertise in the fields of research and
2	research management.
3	SEC. 133. DUTIES.
4	(a) General Duties.—The Research Center shall—
5	(1) maintain published peer-review standards
6	and standards for the conduct and evaluation of all
7	research and development carried out under the aus-
8	pices of the Research Center in accordance with this
9	part;
10	(2) propose to the Director a research plan
11	that
12	(A) is consistent with the priorities and
13	mission of the Institute and the mission of the
14	Research Center and includes the activities de-
15	scribed in paragraph (3); and
16	(B) shall be carried out pursuant to para-
17	graph (4) and, as appropriate, be updated and
18	modified;
19	(3) carry out specific, long-term research activi-
20	ties that are consistent with the priorities and mis-
21	sion of the Institute, and are approved by the Direc-
22	tor;
23	(4) implement the plan proposed under para-
24	graph (2) to carry out scientifically valid research
25	that—

1	(A) uses objective and measurable indica-
2	tors, including timelines, that are used to assess
3	the progress and results of such research;
4	(B) meets the procedures for peer review
5	established by the Director under section
6	114(f)(5) and the standards of research de-
7	scribed in section 134; and
8	(C) includes both basic research and ap-
9	plied research, which shall include research con-
10	ducted through field-initiated research and shall
11	include ongoing research initiatives;
12	(5) promote the use of scientifically valid re-
13	search within the Federal Government, including ac-
14	tive participation in interagency research projects
15	described in section 119;
16	(6) ensure that research conducted under the
17	direction of the Research Center is relevant to edu-
18	eation practice and policy;
19	(7) synthesize and disseminate, through the Of-
20	fice of Knowledge Utilization, the findings and re-
21	sults of education research conducted or supported
22	by the Research Center;
23	(8) assist the Director in the preparation of ϵ
24	biennial report, as described in section 120, which

1	shall be made available to the public through such
2	means as the Internet; and
3	(9) carry out research on successful State and
4	local education reform activities, as approved by the
5	Director.
6	(b) Eligibility.—Research carried out under sub-
7	section (a) through contracts, grants, or cooperative
8	agreements shall be carried out only by recipients with the
9	ability and capacity to conduct scientifically valid research.
10	(c) National Research and Development Cen-
11	TERS.
12	(1) Support. In carrying out activities under
13	subsection (a)(3), the Director, acting through the
14	Research Commissioner, shall support not more than
15	15 national research and development centers.
16	(2) Duties of centers.—The national re-
17	search and development centers shall address areas
18	of national need.
19	(3) Scope.—Support for a national research
20	and development center shall be for a period of not
21	more than 5 years, shall be of sufficient size and
22	scope to be effective, and notwithstanding section
23	134(b), may be renewed without competition for not
24	more than 5 additional years if the Director, in con-

sultation with the Research Commissioner and the

1	Board, determines that the research of the national
2	research and development center—
3	(A) continues to address priorities of the
4	Institute; and
5	(B) merits renewal (applying the proce-
6	dures and standards established in section
7	134).
8	(4) Limit.—No national research and develop-
9	ment center may be supported under this subsection
10	for a period of more than 10 years without submit-
11	ting to a competitive process for the award of the
12	support.
13	(5) Continuation of Awards.—The Director,
14	acting through the Research Commissioner, shall
15	continue awards made to the national research and
16	development centers that are in effect on the day be-
17	fore the date of enactment of this Act in accordance
18	with the terms of those awards and may renew them
19	in accordance with paragraphs (2) and (4).
20	SEC. 134. STANDARDS FOR CONDUCT AND EVALUATION OF
21	RESEARCH.
22	(a) In General.—In carrying out this part, the Di-
23	rector acting through the Research Commissioner shall—

- (1) ensure that all research conducted under the direction of the Research Center follows scientifically based research standards;
 - (2) develop such other standards as may be necessary to govern the conduct and evaluation of all research, development, and dissemination activities carried out by the Research Center to assure that such activities meet the highest standards of professional excellence;
 - (3) review the procedures utilized by the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, and other Federal departments or agencies engaged in research and development, and actively solicit recommendations from research organizations and members of the general public in the development of the standards described in paragraph (2); and
 - (4) ensure that all research complies with Federal guidelines relating to research misconduct.

(b) PEER REVIEW.—

(1) In GENERAL.—The Director shall establish a peer review system, involving highly qualified individuals with an in-depth knowledge of the subject to be investigated, for reviewing and evaluating all applications for grants and cooperative agreements

1	that exceed \$100,000, and for evaluating and assess-
2	ing the products developed by all recipients of grants
3	and cooperative agreements under this Act.
4	(2) EVALUATION.—The Director, acting
5	through the Research Commissioner, shall—

18	search for each fiscal year shall be used to fund long-term

21	of the Research Center.

COMMISSIONER FOR EDUCATION STATISTICS. 23 The Statistics Center shall be headed by a Commissioner for Education Statistics (in this part referred to as the "Statistics Commissioner") who shall have substan-

2	undertaken by the Statistics Center.
3	SEC. 153. DUTIES.
4	(a) General Duties.—The Statistics Center shall
5	collect, report, analyze, and disseminate statistical data re-
6	lated to education in the United States and in other na-

8	(1) collecting, acquiring, compiling (where ap-
9	propriate, on a State-by-State basis), and dissemi-
10	nating full and complete statistics disaggregated by
11	gender, by each major racial and ethnic group, by
12	English proficiency status, by students with disabil-
13	ities as compared to nondisabled students, and by
14	economically disadvantaged students as compared to
15	students who are not economically disadvantaged, on
16	the condition and progress of education, at the pre-
17	school, elementary, secondary, postsecondary, and
18	adult levels in the United States, including data
19	on—
20	(A) State and local education reform ac-
21	tivities;
22	(B) student achievement in, at a minimum,
23	the core academic areas of reading, mathe-

7	reporting, to the extent feasible, information by gen-
8	der, race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, limited
9	English proficiency, mobility, disability, and other
10	population characteristics, when such disaggregated
11	information will facilitate educational and policy de
12	cisionmaking;
13	(4) assisting public and private educational
14	agencies, organizations, and institutions in improv
15	ing and automating statistical and data collection
16	activities, which may include assisting State edu
17	eational agencies and local educational agencies with
18	the disaggregation of data;
19	(5) acquiring and disseminating data on edu
20	eational activities and student achievement (such as
21	the Third International Math and Science Study) is
22	the United States compared with foreign nations;
23	(6) conducting longitudinal and special data
24	collections necessary to report on the condition and

progress of education; and

1	(7) assisting the Director in the preparation of

15 SEC. 157. COOPERATIVE EDUCATION STATISTICS SYSTEMS.

18	(d) Networking.—In order to improve the effi-
19	ciency and effectiveness of the regional laboratories, the
20	governing boards of the regional laboratories shall estab-
21	lish and maintain a network to—
22	(1) share information about the activities each
23	laboratory is carrying out;
24	(2) plan joint activities that would meet the
25	needs of multiple regions:

1	(3) create a strategic plan for the development
2	of activities undertaken by the laboratories to reduce
3	redundancy and increase collaboration and resource-
4	sharing in such activities; and
5	(4) otherwise devise means by which the work
6	of the individual laboratories could serve national, as
7	well as regional, needs.
8	(e) Additional Duties.—Each regional education
9	laboratory receiving assistance under this subsection shall
10	earry out the following activities:
11	(1) Collaborate with the National Research
12	Centers (referred to in the section as "Centers") es-

7	(5) Identify successful educational programs
8	that have either been developed by such laboratory
9	in carrying out such laboratory's functions or that
10	have been developed or used by others within the re-
11	gion served by the laboratory and make such infor-
12	mation available to the Secretary and the network of
13	regional laboratories so that such programs may be
14	considered for inclusion in the national education
15	dissemination system.
16	(f) CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS.—In carrying out its
17	responsibilities, each regional educational laboratory
18	shall—
19	(1) establish a governing board that—
20	(A) reflects a balanced representation of
21	the States in the region, as well as the interests
22	and concerns of regional constituencies, and
23	that includes teachers and education research-
24	ers;
25	(B) is the sole entity that—

1	(i) guides and directs the laboratory
2	in carrying out the provisions of this sub-
3	section and satisfying the terms and condi-
4	tions of the contract award;

18	quality in the laboratory's work and products;
19	(D) establishes standards to ensure that
20	the regional educational laboratory has strong
21	and effective governance, organization, manage-
22	ment, and administration, and employs quali-
23	fied staff;
24	(E) directs the regional educational labora-
25	tory to carry out the laboratory's duties in a

manner as will make progress toward achieving
the State education goals and reforming schools
and educational systems; and

(F) conducts a continuing survey of the educational needs, strengths, and weaknesses within the region, including a process of open hearings to solicit the views of schools and teachers.

(2) Allocate the regional educational laboratory's resources to and within each State in a manner which reflects the need for assistance, taking into account such factors as the proportion of economically disadvantaged students, the increased cost burden of service delivery in areas of sparse populations, and any special initiatives being undertaken by State, intermediate, local educational agencies, or Bureau-funded schools, as appropriate, which may require special assistance from the laboratory.

(g) EVALUATIONS.—The Director shall provide for independent evaluations of each of the regional educational laboratories in earrying out the duties described in paragraph (1) in the third year that such laboratory receives assistance under this subsection in accordance with the standards developed by the Director and approved by the Board and shall transmit the results of such

 - "dissemination" means the communication and transfer of the results of scientifically valid research, statistics, and evaluations, in forms that are understandable, easily accessible, and usable, or adaptable for use in, the improvement of educational practice by teachers, administrators, librarians, other practitioners, researchers, parents, policymakers, and the public, through publications, electronic transfer, and other means.
 - (11) Early Childhood educator" means a person providing, or employed by a provider of, nonresidential child care services (including center-based, family-based, and in-home child care services) that is legally operating under State law, and that complies with applicable State and local requirements for the provision of child care services to children at any age from

- birth through the age at which a child may start kindergarten in that State.
- 3 (12) FIELD-INITIATED RESEARCH.—The term
 4 "field-initiated research" means basic research or ap5 plied research in which specific questions and meth6 ods of study are generated by investigators (including
 7 teachers and other practitioners) and that conforms to
 8 standards of scientifically valid research.
 - (13) HISTORICALLY BLACK COLLEGE OR UNIVER-SITY.—The term "historically Black college or university" means a part B institution as defined in section 322 of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1061).

 - (15) Institution of Higher Education.—The term "institution of higher education" has the meaning given that term in section 101(a) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001(a)).
 - (16) National research and development center" means a research and development center supported under section 133(c).

20	(v) ensuring that studies and methods
21	are presented in sufficient detail and clarity
22	to allow for replication or, at a minimum,
23	to offer the opportunity to build systemati-
24	cally on the findings of the research;

1	(vi) obtaining acceptance by a peer-re-
2	viewed journal or approval by a panel of
3	independent experts through a comparably
4	rigorous, objective, and scientific review;

6	(vii) using research designs and meth-
7	ods appropriate to the research question
8	posed.
9	(19) Scientifically valid education evalua-
10	TION.—The term "scientifically valid education eval-
11	uation" means an evaluation that—
12	(A) adheres to the highest possible standards
13	of quality with respect to research design and
14	statistical analysis;
15	(B) provides an adequate description of the
16	programs evaluated and, to the extent possible,
17	examines the relationship between program im-
18	plementation and program impacts;
19	(C) provides an analysis of the results
20	achieved by the program with respect to its pro-
21	jected effects;
22	(D) employs experimental designs using
23	random assignment, when feasible, and other re-
24	search methodologies that allow for the strongest

3	(E) may study program implementation

 - (6) To ensure that all participants in research conducted or supported by the Institute are afforded their privacy rights and other relevant protections as research subjects, in accordance with section 183 of this title, section 552a of title 5, United States Code, and sections 444 and 445 of the General Education Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g, 1232h).
 - (7) To ensure that activities conducted or supported by the Institute are objective, secular, neutral, and nonideological and are free of partisan political influence and racial, cultural, gender, or regional bias.
 - (8) To undertake initiatives and programs to increase the participation of researchers and institutions that have been historically underutilized in Federal education research activities of the Institute, including historically Black colleges or universities or other institutions of higher education with large numbers of minority students.

1	(9) To coordinate with the Secretary to promote
2	and provide for the coordination of research and de-
3	velopment activities and technical assistance activi-
4	ties between the Institute and comprehensive centers.

- (10) To solicit and consider the recommendations of education stakeholders, in order to ensure that there is broad and regular public and professional input from the educational field in the planning and carrying out of the Institute's activities.
- (11) To coordinate the wide dissemination of information on scientifically valid research.
- 12 (12) To carry out and support other activities 13 consistent with the priorities and mission of the Insti-14 tute.
- 15 (g) Expert Guidance and Assistance.—The Director may establish technical and scientific peer-review 16 groups and scientific program advisory committees for re-17 18 search and evaluations that the Director determines are nec-19 essary to carry out the requirements of this title. The Direc-20 tor shall appoint such personnel, except that officers and 21 employees of the United States shall comprise no more than 22 1/4 of the members of any such group or committee and shall 23 not receive additional compensation for their service as members of such a group or committee. The Director shall ensure that reviewers are highly qualified and capable to

18	(b) APPROVAL.—The Board shall approve or dis-
19	approve the priorities for the Institute proposed by the Di-
20	rector, including any necessary revision of those priorities.
21	The Board shall transmit any priorities so approved to the

23	(c) Consistency.—The Board shall ensure that prior-
24	ities of the Institute and the National Education Centers

14	plications for grants, contracts, and cooperative
15	agreements for research, after the completion of peer
16	review.
17	(7) To review and regularly evaluate the work of
18	the Institute, to ensure that scientifically valid re-
19	search, development, evaluation, and statistical anal-
20	ysis are consistent with the standards for such activi-
21	ties under this title.
22	(8) To advise the Director on ensuring that ac-
23	tivities conducted or supported by the Institute are
24	objective, secular, neutral, and nonideological and are

- free of partisan political influence and racial, cul tural, gender, or regional bias.
 - (9) To solicit advice and information from those in the educational field, particularly practitioners and researchers, to recommend to the Director topics that require long-term, sustained, systematic, programmatic, and integrated research efforts, including knowledge utilization and wide dissemination of research, consistent with the priorities and mission of the Institute.
 - (10) To advise the Director on opportunities for the participation in, and the advancement of, women, minorities, and persons with disabilities in education research, statistics, and evaluation activities of the Institute.
 - (11) To recommend to the Director ways to enhance strategic partnerships and collaborative efforts among other Federal and State research agencies.
 - (12) To recommend to the Director individuals to serve as Commissioners of the National Education Centers.
- 22 (c) Composition.—
- 23 (1) VOTING MEMBERS.—The Board shall have 15 24 voting members appointed by the President, by and 25 with the advice and consent of the Senate.

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1	(2) Advice.—The President shall solicit advice
2	regarding individuals to serve on the Board from the

5	(3) Nonvoting ex officio members.—The

19	(A) QUALIFICATIONS.—Members appointed

24	(i) Not fewer than 8 researchers in the
25	field of statistics, evaluation, social sciences,

1	or physical and biological sciences, which
2	may include those researchers recommended
3	by the National Academy of Sciences.

17	(3) Duties of centers.—The national research
18	and development centers shall address areas of na-
19	tional need, including in technology areas. The re-

22	where appropriate, in achieving the goals of each cen-

24	(4) Scope.—Support for a national research

9	fied and have substantial knowledge of statistical meth-
10	odologies and activities undertaken by the Statistics Center.
11	SEC. 143. DUTIES.

10	financial aid to postsecondary students;
11	(F) teaching, including—
12	(i) data on in-service professional de-
13	velopment, including a comparison of
14	courses taken in the core academic areas of
15	reading, mathematics, and science with
16	courses in noncore academic areas, includ-
17	ing technology courses; and
18	(ii) the percentage of teachers who are
19	highly qualified (as such term is defined in
20	section 9101 of the Elementary and Sec-
21	ondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.
22	7801)) in each State and, where feasible, in
23	each local educational agency and school;

1	(G) instruction, the conditions of the edu-

20	(I) the social and economic status of chil-
21	dren, including their academic achievement;
22	(K) the existence and use of educational
23	technology and access to the Internet by students
24	and teachers in elementary schools and sec-
25	ondary schools;

1	(L) educational access to, and opportunity
2	for, early childhood education;
3	(M) the availability of, and access to, be-
4	fore-school and after-school programs (including
5	such programs during school recesses);
6	(N) student participation in and comple-
7	tion of secondary and postsecondary vocational
8	and technical education programs by specific
9	program area; and
10	(O) the existence and use of school libraries;
11	(2) conducting and publishing reports on the
12	meaning and significance of the statistics described in
13	paragraph (1);
14	(3) collecting, analyzing, cross-tabulating, and
15	reporting, to the extent feasible, information by gen-
16	der, race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, limited
17	English proficiency, mobility, disability, urban,
18	rural, suburban districts, and other population char-
19	acteristics, when such disaggregated information will
20	facilitate educational and policy decisionmaking;
21	(4) assisting public and private educational
22	agencies, organizations, and institutions in improv-
23	ing and automating statistical and data collection ac-
24	tivities, which may include assisting State edu-
25	cational agencies and local educational agencies with

- the disaggregation of data and with the development
 of longitudinal student data systems;
 - (5) determining standards and guidelines to assist State educational agencies in developing statewide longitudinal systems to track individual student progress, ensure interoperability across States, protect student privacy, and facilitate research to improve student academic achievement;
 - (6) acquiring and disseminating data on educational activities and student achievement (such as the Third International Math and Science Study) in the United States compared with foreign nations;
 - (7) conducting longitudinal and special data collections necessary to report on the condition and progress of education;
 - (8) assisting the Director in the preparation of a biennial report, as described in section 119, which shall be available to the public through such means as the Internet; and

5	(c) Additional Duties.—In carrying out subsection
6	(b), the National Center for Knowledge Utilization in Edu-

9	this section is provided in a cost-effective, nonduplica-

11	findings, including through—
12	(A) support of the Educational Resources
13	Information Center and such Center's component

16	at a minimum, those topics covered by the Edu-

19	(2) describe prominently the type of scientific

8	available information and technical assistance
9	relating to the competition; and
10	(B) seek input from the chief executive offi-
11	cers of States, chief State school officers, edu-
12	cators, and parents regarding the need for ap-
13	plied research, wide dissemination, training,
14	technical assistance, and development activities
15	authorized by this title in the regions to be
16	served by the regional educational laboratories
17	and how those educational needs could be ad-
18	dressed most effectively.
19	(4) Objectives and indicators.—Before enter-
20	ing into a contract under this section, the Director
21	shall design specific objectives and measurable indica-
22	tors to be used to assess the particular programs or
23	initiatives, and ongoing progress and performance, of
24	the regional educational laboratories, in order to en-

sure that the educational needs of the region are being

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- met and that the latest and best research and proven
 practices are being carried out as part of school improvement efforts.
- 4 STANDARDS.—The Knowledge Utilization 5 Commissioner shall establish a system for technical 6 and peer review to ensure that applied research ac-7 tivities, research-based reports, and products of the re-8 gional educational laboratories are consistent with the 9 research standards described in section 134 and the 10 evaluation standards established insection 11 163(a)(2)(A).
- 12 (f) Central Mission and Primary Function.—
 13 Each regional educational laboratory receiving assistance
 14 under this section shall promote the implementation of
 15 broad-based systemic school improvement strategies and
 16 shall have as such laboratory's central mission and primary
 17 function to—
- 18 (1) develop and widely disseminate educational 19 research products and processes to schools, teachers, 20 local educational agencies, State educational agencies, 21 State and local agencies responsible for early edu-22 cation, librarians, and schools funded by the Bureau, 23 as appropriate, and through such development and 24 wide dissemination, and provide technical assistance, 25 to help all students meet standards;

1	(2) develop a plan for identifying and serving
2	the needs of the region by conducting a continuing
3	survey of the educational needs, strengths, and weak-
4	nesses within the region, including a process of open
5	hearings to solicit the views of schools, teachers, ad-
6	ministrators, parents, local educational agencies, li-
7	brarians, and State educational agencies within the
8	region;
9	(3) provide technical assistance to State edu-
10	cational agencies, local educational agencies, school
11	boards, schools funded by the Bureau, as appropriate,
12	and State boards of education;
13	(4) serve the educational development needs of
14	the region by providing education research in usable
15	forms in order to promote school improvement and
16	academic achievement and to correct educational defi-
17	ciencies;
18	(5) facilitate communication between educational
19	experts, school officials, and teachers, parents, and li-
20	brarians, to enable such individuals to assist schools
21	to develop a plan to meet State education goals;
22	(6) provide training in—
23	(A) the field of education research and re-
24	lated areas;
25	(B) the use of new educational methods: and

1	(C) the use of information-finding methods,
2	practices, techniques, and products developed in
3	connection with such training for which the re-
4	gional educational laboratory may support in-
5	ternships and fellowships and provide stipends;
6	(7) use applied educational research to assist in
7	solving site-specific problems and to assist in develop-
8	ment activities, including high quality, ongoing, pro-
9	fessional development, and effective parental involve-
10	ment strategies;
11	(8) conduct applied research projects designed to
12	serve the particular needs of the region only in the
13	event that such quality applied research does not exist
14	as determined by the regional educational laboratory
15	or the Department of Education;
16	(9) collaborate and coordinate services with other
17	technical assistance providers funded by the Depart-
18	ment of Education;
19	(10) provide support and technical assistance
20	in—
21	(A) replicating and adapting exemplary
22	and promising practices;
23	(B) the development of high-quality, chal-
24	lenging curriculum frameworks;

1	(C) the development of valid, reliable assess-
2	ments which are linked to State, local, or Bu-
3	reau-funded content and student performance
4	standards and reflect recent advances in the field
5	$of\ educational\ assessment;$
6	(D) the improvement of professional devel-
7	opment strategies to assure that all teachers are
8	prepared to teach a challenging curriculum;
9	(E) expanding and improving the use of
10	technology in education to improve teaching and
11	learning;
12	(F) the development of alternatives for re-
13	structuring school finance systems to promote
14	greater equity in the distribution of resources
15	among public schools to better serve public school
16	students; and
17	(G) the development of alternative adminis-
18	trative structures which are more conducive to
19	planning, implementing, and sustaining school
20	reform and improved educational outcomes; and
21	(11) bring teams of experts together to develop
22	and implement school improvement plans and strate-
23	gies.

1	(g) ACTIVITIES.—Each regional educational labora-
2	tory receiving assistance under this subsection shall carry
3	out the following activities:
4	(1) Collaborate with the National Education
5	Centers in order to—
6	(A) maximize the use of research conducted
7	through the National Education Centers in the
8	work of such laboratory;
9	(B) keep the National Education Centers
10	apprised of the work of the regional educational
11	laboratory in the field; and
12	(C) inform the National Education Centers
13	about additional research needs identified in the
14	field.
15	(2) Consult with the State educational agencies
16	and library agencies in the region in developing the
17	plan for serving the region.
18	(3) Develop strategies to utilize schools as critical
19	components in reforming education and revitalizing
20	rural communities in the United States.
21	(4) Report and disseminate information on over-
22	coming the obstacles faced by educators and schools in
23	high poverty, urban, and rural areas.
24	(5) Identify successful educational programs that
25	have either been developed by such laboratory in car-

1	rying out such laboratory's functions or that have
2	been developed or used by others within the region
3	served by the laboratory and make such information
4	available to the Secretary and the network of regional
5	educational laboratories so that such programs may
6	be considered for inclusion in the national education
7	dissemination system.
8	(h) Governing Board and Allocation.—In car-
9	rying out its responsibilities, each regional educational lab-
10	oratory, in keeping with the terms and conditions of such
11	laboratory's contract, shall—
12	(1) establish a governing board that—
13	(A) reflects a balanced representation of—
14	(i) the States in the region;
15	(ii) the interests and concerns of re-
16	gional constituencies; and
17	(iii) technical expertise;
18	(B) includes the chief State school officer or
19	such officer's designee of each State represented
20	in such board's region;
21	(C) includes representatives nominated by
22	State organizations representing superintend-
23	ents, principals, institutions of higher education,
24	teachers, parents, business, and researchers;

1	(D) in order to meet the requirement of sub-
2	paragraph (A), is not more than 10 percent
3	independently selected by the regional edu-
4	$cational\ laboratory;$
5	(E) is the sole entity that—
6	(i) guides and directs the laboratory in
7	carrying out the provisions of this sub-
8	section and satisfying the terms and condi-
9	tions of the contract award;
10	(ii) determines the regional agenda of
11	$the \ laboratory;$
12	(iii) engages in an ongoing dialogue
13	with the Knowledge Utilization Commis-
14	sioner concerning the laboratory's goals, ac-
15	tivities, and priorities; and
16	(iv) determines at the start of the con-
17	tract period, subject to the requirements of
18	this section and in consultation with the
19	Knowledge Utilization Commissioner, the
20	mission of the regional educational labora-
21	tory for the duration of the contract period;
22	(F) ensures that the regional educational
23	laboratory attains and maintains a high level of
24	quality in the laboratory's work and products;

1	(G) establishes standards to ensure that the
2	regional educational laboratory has strong and
3	effective governance, organization, management,
4	and administration, and employs qualified staff;
5	(H) directs the regional educational labora-
6	tory to carry out the laboratory's duties in a
7	manner that will make progress toward achiev-
8	ing State education goals and reforming schools
9	and educational systems; and
10	(I) conducts a continuing survey of the edu-
11	cational needs, strengths, and weaknesses within
12	the region, including a process of open hearings
13	to solicit the views of schools and teachers; and
14	(2) allocate the regional educational laboratory's
15	resources to and within each State in a manner
16	which reflects the need for assistance, taking into ac-
17	count such factors as the proportion of economically
18	disadvantaged students, the increased cost burden of
19	service delivery in areas of sparse populations, and
20	any special initiatives being undertaken by State, in-
21	termediate, local educational agencies, or Bureau-
22	funded schools, as appropriate, which may require
23	special assistance from the laboratory.
24	(i) Duties of Governing Board.—In order to im-
25	prove the efficiency and effectiveness of the regional edu-

1	cational laboratories, the governing boards of the regional
2	educational laboratories shall establish and maintain a net-
3	work to—
4	(1) share information about the activities each
5	laboratory is carrying out;
6	(2) plan joint activities that would meet the
7	needs of multiple regions;
8	(3) create a strategic plan for the development of
9	activities undertaken by the laboratories to reduce re-
10	dundancy and increase collaboration and resource-
11	sharing in such activities; and
12	(4) otherwise devise means by which the work of
13	the individual laboratories could serve national, as
14	well as regional, needs.
15	(j) Additional Activities of the Regional Edu-
16	CATIONAL LABORATORIES.—
17	(1) Assessment.—Each regional educational
18	laboratory awarded a contract under this section shall
19	conduct a biennial needs assessment of the region
20	served by the laboratory.
21	(2) Regional support activities.—Each re-
22	gional educational laboratory awarded a contract
23	under this section shall support applied research, de-
24	velopment, wide dissemination, and technical assist-
25	ance activities_

1	(A) by providing training and technical as-
2	sistance to State departments of education and
3	school districts regarding, at a minimum—
4	(i) the administration and implemen-
5	tation of programs under the No Child Left
6	Behind Act of 2001 (Public Law 107–110);
7	(ii) scientifically valid research in edu-
8	cation on teaching methods and assessment
9	tools for use by teachers and administrators
10	in, at a minimum—
11	(I) the core academic subjects of
12	mathematics, science, and reading;
13	(II) English language acquisition;
14	and
15	(III) education technology; and
16	(iii) the facilitation of communication
17	between education experts, school officials,
18	teachers, parents, and librarians, as appro-
19	priate;
20	(B) through dissemination, including
21	through Internet-based means, and by providing
22	scientifically valid research, information, re-
23	ports, and publications that are usable for im-
24	proving academic achievement, narrowing

1	achievement gaps, and encouraging and sus-
2	taining school improvement, to—
3	(i) schools, institutions of higher edu-
4	cation, educators, parents, policymakers,
5	and other constituencies, as appropriate,
6	within the region in which the regional edu-
7	cational laboratory is located; and
8	(ii) the National Center for Knowledge
9	Utilization in Education;
10	(C) by carrying out applied research
11	projects that are designed to serve the particular
12	educational needs (in prekindergarten through
13	grade 16) of the region in which the regional
14	educational laboratory is located, that reflect
15	findings from scientifically valid research, and
16	that result in user-friendly, replicable classroom
17	applications geared toward promoting increased
18	student achievement; and
19	(D) by supporting development activities
20	and contributing to the current base of education
21	knowledge by addressing enduring problems in
22	elementary and secondary education and access
23	$to\ postsecondary\ education.$
24	(3) Coordination and collaboration.—Each
25	regional educational laboratory awarded a contract

1	under this section shall coordinate its activities, col-
2	laborate, and regularly exchange information with the
3	Secretary, the Director, the National Center for
4	Knowledge Utilization in Education, and other ap-
5	propriate entities (including educational service agen-
6	cies, as defined in section 9101 of the Elementary and
7	Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801)
8	and other regional technical assistance providers).
9	(k) Evaluations.—The Knowledge Utilization Com-
10	missioner shall—
11	(1) provide for independent evaluations of each
12	of the regional educational laboratories in carrying
13	out the duties described in this section in the third
14	year that such laboratory receives assistance under
15	this section in accordance with the standards devel-
16	oped by the Knowledge Utilization Commissioner and
17	approved by the governing board; and
18	(2) transmit the results of such evaluations to the
19	relevant committees of Congress, the governing board,
20	and the appropriate regional educational laboratory
21	governing board.
22	(1) Rule of Construction.—No regional edu-
23	cational laboratory receiving assistance under this section

24 shall, by reason of the receipt of that assistance, be ineligible

25 to receive any other assistance from the Department of Edu-

1	cation as authorized by law or be prohibited from engaging
2	in activities involving international projects or endeavors.
3	(m) Advance Payment System.—Each regional edu-
4	cational laboratory shall participate in the advance pay-
5	ment system at the Department of Education.
6	(n) Additional Projects.—In addition to activities
7	authorized under this section, the Director is authorized to
8	enter into contracts or agreements with a regional edu-
9	cational laboratory for the purpose of carrying out addi-
10	tional projects to enable such regional educational labora-
11	tory to assist in efforts to achieve State education goals and
12	for other purposes.
13	(o) Plan.—Not later than July 1 of each year, each
14	regional educational laboratory shall submit to the Knowl-
15	edge Utilization Commissioner a plan covering the suc-
16	ceeding fiscal year, in which such laboratory's mission, ac-
17	tivities, and scope of work are described, including a gen-
18	eral description of—
19	(1) the plans such laboratory expects to submit
20	in the remaining years of such laboratory's contract;
21	and
22	(2) an assessment of how well such laboratory is
23	meeting the needs of the region, including a summary
24	of activities during the preceding year, a list of enti-
25	ties served, a list of products, and any other informa-

- 1 tion that the regional educational laboratory may
- 2 consider relevant or the Knowledge Utilization Com-
- 3 missioner may require.
- 4 (p) Construction.—Nothing in this section shall be
- 5 construed to require any modifications in a regional edu-
- 6 cational laboratory contract in effect on the day before the
- 7 date of enactment of this Act.

8 PART F—GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 9 SEC. 181. INTERAGENCY DATA SOURCES AND FORMATS.
- 10 The Secretary, in consultation with the Director, shall
- 11 ensure that the Department and the Institute use common
- 12 sources of data in standardized formats.
- 13 SEC. 182. PROHIBITIONS.
- 14 (a) National Database.—Nothing in this title may
- 15 be construed to authorize the establishment of a nationwide
- 16 database of individually identifiable information on indi-
- 17 viduals involved in studies or other collections of data under
- 18 this title.
- 19 (b) Federal Government and Use of Federal
- 20 Funds.—Nothing in this title may be construed to author-
- 21 ize an officer or employee of the Federal Government to
- 22 mandate, direct, or control the curriculum, program of in-
- 23 struction, or allocation of State or local resources of a State,
- 24 local educational agency, or school, or to mandate a State,

- 1 or any subdivision thereof, to spend any funds or incur any
- 2 costs not provided for under this title.
- 3 (c) Endorsement of Curriculum.—Notwith-
- 4 standing any other provision of Federal law, no funds pro-
- 5 vided under this title to the Institute, including any office,
- 6 board, committee, or center of the Institute, may be used
- 7 by the Institute to endorse, approve, or sanction any cur-
- 8 riculum designed to be used in an elementary school or sec-
- 9 ondary school.

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- 10 (d) Federally Sponsored Testing.—
- 11 (1) In GENERAL.—Subject to paragraph (2), no 12 funds provided under this title to the Secretary or to 13 the recipient of any award may be used to develop, 14 pilot test, field test, implement, administer, or dis-15 tribute any federally sponsored national test in read-16 ing, mathematics, or any other subject, unless specifi-17 cally and explicitly authorized by law.
 - (2) Exceptions.—Subsection (a) shall not apply to international comparative assessments developed under the authority of section 143(a)(6) of this title or section 404(a)(6) of the National Education Statistics Act of 1994 (20 U.S.C. 9003(a)(6)) (as such section was in effect on the day before the date of enactment of this Act) and administered to only a rep-

- 1 resentative sample of pupils in the United States and
- 2 in foreign nations.

3 SEC. 183. CONFIDENTIALITY.

- 4 (a) In General.—All collection, maintenance, use,
- 5 and wide dissemination of data by the Institute, including
- 6 each office, board, committee, and center of the Institute,
- 7 shall conform with the requirements of section 552a of title
- 8 5, United States Code, the confidentiality standards of sub-
- 9 section (c) of this section, and sections 444 and 445 of the
- 10 General Education Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g,
- 11 *1232h*).
- 12 (b) Student Information.—The Director shall en-
- 13 sure that all individually identifiable information about
- 14 students, their academic achievements, their families, and
- 15 information with respect to individual schools, shall remain
- 16 confidential in accordance with section 552a of title 5,
- 17 United States Code, and sections 444 and 445 of the Gen-
- 18 eral Education Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g, 1232h).

19 SEC. 184. AVAILABILITY OF DATA.

- 20 Subject to section 183, data collected by the Institute,
- 21 including any office, board, committee, or center of the In-
- 22 stitute, in carrying out the priorities and mission of the
- 23 Institute, shall be made available to the public, including
- 24 through use of the Internet.

1 SEC. 185. PERFORMANCE MANAGEMENT.

2	The Director shall ensure that all activities conducted
3	or supported by the Institute or a National Education Cen-
4	ter make customer service a priority. The Director shall en-
5	sure a high level of customer satisfaction through the fol-
6	lowing methods:
7	(1) Establishing and improving feedback mecha-
8	nisms in order to anticipate customer needs.
9	(2) Disseminating information in a timely fash-
10	ion and in formats that are easily accessible and usa-
11	ble by researchers, practitioners, and the general pub-
12	lic.
13	(3) Utilizing the most modern technology and
14	other methods available, including arrangements to
15	use data collected electronically by States and local
16	educational agencies, to ensure the efficient collection
17	and timely distribution of information, including
18	data and reports.
19	(4) Establishing and measuring performance
20	against a set of indicators for the quality of data col-
21	lected, analyzed, and reported.
22	(5) Continuously improving management strate-
23	gies and practices.
24	(6) Making information available to the public
25	in an expeditious fashion.

1 SEC. 186. AUTHORITY TO PUBLISH.

2	(a) Publication.—The Director may prepare and
3	publish (including through oral presentation) such research,
4	statistics, and evaluation information and reports from any
5	office, board, committee, and center of the Institute, with
6	the exception of the National Assessment of Educational
7	Progress, as needed to carry out the priorities and mission
8	of the Institute without the approval of the Secretary or
9	any other office of the Department.
10	(b) Comment.—The Director shall provide other of-
11	fices of the Department with an opportunity to comment
12	upon any report of the Institute prior to publication when
13	the contents relate to matters for which such offices have
14	responsibility.
15	(c) Peer Review.—All research, statistics, and eval-
16	uation reports conducted by, or supported through, the In-
17	stitute shall be subjected to rigorous peer review before being
18	published or otherwise made available to the public.
19	(d) Items Not Covered.—Nothing in subsections (a),
20	(b), or (c) shall be construed to apply to—
21	(1) information on current or proposed budgets,
22	appropriations, or legislation;
23	(2) information prohibited from disclosure by
24	law or the Constitution, classified national security
25	information, or information described in section
26	552(b) of title 5, United States Code; and

1	(3) review by officers of the United States in
2	order to prevent the unauthorized disclosure of infor-
3	mation described in paragraph (1) or (2).
4	SEC. 187. VACANCIES.
5	Any member appointed to fill a vacancy on the Board
6	occurring before the expiration of the term for which the
7	member's predecessor was appointed shall be appointed only
8	for the remainder of that term. A vacancy in an office,
9	board, committee, or center of the Institute shall be filled
10	in the manner in which the original appointment was
11	made. This section does not apply to employees appointed
12	under section 188.
13	SEC. 188. SCIENTIFIC OR TECHNICAL EMPLOYEES.
14	(a) In General.—The Director may appoint, for
15	terms not to exceed 6 years (without regard to the provisions
16	of title 5, United States Code, governing appointment in
17	the competitive service) and may compensate (without re-
18	gard to the provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III of
19	chapter 53 of such title relating to classification and Gen-
20	eral Schedule pay rates) such scientific or technical employ-
21	ees to carry out the functions of the Institute or the office,
22	board, committee, or center, respectively, if—
23	(1) not less than 30 days prior to the appoint-
24	ment of any such employee, public notice is given of
25	the availability of such position and an opportunity

- is provided for qualified individuals to apply and
 compete for such position;
- 3 (2) the rate of basic pay for such employees does 4 not exceed the maximum rate of basic pay payable for 5 positions at GS-15, as determined in accordance with 6 section 5376 of title 5, United States Code, except that 7 not more than 5 individuals appointed under this sec-8 tion may be paid at a rate that does not exceed the rate of basic pay for level III of the Executive Sched-9 10 ule;
 - (3) the appointment of such employee is necessary (as determined by the Director on the basis of clear and convincing evidence) to provide the Institute or the office, board, committee, or center with scientific or technical expertise which could not otherwise be obtained by the Institute or the office, board, committee, or center through the competitive service; and
 - (4) the total number of such employees does not exceed 30 individuals or ½ of the number of full-time, regular scientific or professional employees of the Institute, whichever is greater.
- 23 (b) Duties of Employees.—All employees described 24 in subsection (a) shall work on activities of the Institute 25 or the office, board, committee, or center, and shall not be

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- 1 reassigned to other duties outside the Institute or the office,
- 2 board, committee, or center during their term.

3 SEC. 189. FELLOWSHIPS.

- 4 In order to strengthen the national capacity to carry
- 5 out high-quality research, evaluation, and statistics related
- 6 to education, the Director shall establish and maintain re-
- 7 search, evaluation, and statistics fellowships in institutions
- 8 of higher education (which may include the establishment
- 9 of such fellowships in historically Black colleges and univer-
- 10 sities and other institutions of higher education with large
- 11 numbers of minority students) that support graduate and
- 12 postdoctoral study. In establishing the fellowships, the Di-
- 13 rector shall ensure that women and minorities are actively
- 14 recruited for participation.

15 SEC. 190. VOLUNTARY SERVICE.

- 16 The Director may accept voluntary and uncompen-
- 17 sated services to carry out and support activities that are
- 18 consistent with the priorities and mission of the Institute.

19 SEC. 191. RULEMAKING.

- Notwithstanding section 437(d) of the General Edu-
- 21 cation Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1232(d)), the exemption
- 22 for public property, loans, grants, and benefits in section
- 23 553(a)(2) of title 5, United States Code, shall apply to the
- 24 Institute.

1 SEC. 192. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

2	(a) In General.—There are authorized to be appro-
3	priated to administer and carry out this title (except sec-
4	tion 172) \$400,000,000 for fiscal year 2003 and such sums
5	as may be necessary for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years,
6	of which—
7	(1) not less than the amount provided to the Na-
8	tional Center for Education Statistics (as such Center
9	was in existence on the day before the date of enact-
10	ment of this Act) for fiscal year 2002 shall be pro-
11	vided to the National Center for Education Statistics,
12	as authorized under part C; and
13	(2) not more than the lesser of 2 percent of such
14	funds or \$1,000,000 shall be made available to carry
15	out section 116 (relating to the National Board for
16	Education Sciences).
17	(b) Regional Educational Laboratories.—There
18	are authorized to be appropriated to carry out section 172
19	\$120,000,000 for fiscal year 2003 and such sums as may
20	be necessary for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years. Of
21	the amounts appropriated under the preceding sentence for
22	a fiscal year, the Director shall obligate not less than 25
23	percent to carry out such purpose with respect to rural
24	areas (including schools funded by the Bureau which are

25 located in rural areas).

1	(c) Available under available under
2	this section shall remain available until expended.
3	TITLE II—REGIONAL EDU-
4	CATIONAL TECHNICAL AS-
5	SISTANCE
6	SEC. 201. SHORT TITLE.
7	This title may be cited as the "Regional Assistance Act
8	of 2002".
9	SEC. 202. DEFINITIONS.
10	In this title:
11	(1) In general.—The terms "local educational
12	agency" and "State educational agency" have the
13	meanings given those terms in section 9101 of the El-
14	ementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20
15	U.S.C. 7801).
16	(2) Early Childhood Educator.—The term
17	"early childhood educator" means a person providing,
18	or employed by a provider of, nonresidential child
19	care services (including center-based, family-based,
20	and in-home child care services) that is legally oper-
21	ating under State law, and that complies with appli-
22	cable State and local requirements for the provision
23	of child care services to children at any age from
24	birth through the age at which a child may start kin-
25	dergarten in that State.

1	(3) Provider of Early Childhood Serv-
2	ICES.—
3	(A) In General.—The term "provider of
4	early childhood services" means a public or pri-
5	vate entity that has regular contact with young
6	children.
7	(B) Inclusions.—The term "provider of
8	early childhood services" includes—
9	(i) child care providers;
10	(ii) Head Start agencies operating
11	Head Start programs, and entities carrying
12	out Early Head Start programs, under the
13	Head Start Act (42 U.S.C. 9831 et seq.);
14	$(iii)\ preschools;$
15	(iv) kindergartens; and
16	(v) libraries.
17	(4) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
18	the Secretary of Education.
19	SEC. 203. COMPREHENSIVE CENTERS.
