Whereas there are 105 historically black colleges and universities in the United States;

Whereas black colleges and universities provide the quality education so essential to full participation in a complex, highly technological society;

Whereas black colleges and universities have a rich heritage
and have played a prominent role in American history;

Whereas black colleges and universities have allowed many
underprivileged students to attain their full potential
through higher education; and

Whereas the achievements and goals of historically black col-
leges and universities are deserving of national recogni-
tion: Now, therefore, be it

2 **SECTION 1. DESIGNATION OF NATIONAL HISTORICALLY**

4 The Senate—

5 (1) designates the week beginning September
6 15, 2002, as “National Historically Black Colleges
7 and Universities Week”; and

8 (2) requests that the President of the United
9 States issue a proclamation calling on the people of
10 the United States and interested groups to observe
11 the week with appropriate ceremonies, activities, and
12 programs to demonstrate support for historically
13 black colleges and universities in the United States.
