# RESOLUTION

Authorizing expenditures by committees of the Senate for the periods March 1, 2001, through September 30, 2001, October 1, 2001, through September 30, 2002, and October 1, 2002, through February 28, 2003.

2    **SECTION 1. AGGREGATE AUTHORIZATION.**

3        (a) IN GENERAL.—For purposes of carrying out the  
4    powers, duties, and functions under the Standing Rules  
5    of the Senate, and under the appropriate authorizing reso-

1 lutions of the Senate there is authorized for the period  
2 March 1, 2001, through September 30, 2001, in the ag-  
3 gregate of \$44,140,402, for the period October 1, 2001,  
4 through September 30, 2002, in the aggregate of  
5 \$78,295,919, and for the period October 1, 2002, through  
6 February 28, 2003, in the aggregate of \$33,485,138, in  
7 accordance with the provisions of this resolution, for  
8 standing committees of the Senate, the Special Committee  
9 on Aging, the Select Committee on Intelligence, and the  
10 Committee on Indian Affairs.

11 (b) AGENCY CONTRIBUTIONS.—There are authorized
