Mr. SAXTON (for himself and Mr. ANDREWS) introduced the following bill;
which was referred to the Committee on Education and the Workforce

A BILL

To direct the Secretary of Education to provide grants to
promote Holocaust education and awareness.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Holocaust Education
5 and Awareness Act of 2003”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 The Congress finds the following:

8 (1) The Holocaust was the government-spon-
9 sored event that occurred in Europe between 1933
10 and 1945 in which Nazis and their collaborators—

1 both to suppress dissidence and in the name of ra-
2 cial, ethnic, and social purity—systemically mur-
3 dered 11 million people, including Jews, Jehovah’s
4 Witnesses, Serbs, Gypsies, homosexuals, Polish intel-
5 ligentsia, and German opponents of Nazism.

6 (2) Six States—California, Florida, Illinois,
7 Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York—cur-
8 rently mandate that the Holocaust be taught in the
9 educational curriculum and ten States—Connecticut,
10 Georgia, Indiana, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsyl-
11 vania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and
12 Washington—recommend teaching the Holocaust
13 but do not provide sufficient funds to assist in train-
14 ing and educating teachers about it.

15 (3) Revisionist historians and Holocaust deniers
16 throughout the world, including those in the United
17 States, perpetuate inaccuracies and falsehoods re-
18 garding the Holocaust and thereby make it more dif-
19 ficult for educators effectively to teach students
20 about the Holocaust.

21 **SEC. 3. GRANTS FOR HOLOCAUST EDUCATION AND AWARE-**
22 **NESS.**

23 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Education shall
24 devise and administer a program to make grants—

1 (1) to provide the necessary tools and resources
2 to educate Americans regarding the Holocaust;

3 (2) to dispel falsehoods circulated by Holocaust
4 deniers; and

5 (3) to facilitate Holocaust awareness in commu-
6 nities throughout the United States.

7 (b) REQUIREMENTS.—Such program shall—

8 (1) provide for grants of not more than
9 \$10,000 each for new or existing Holocaust edu-
10 cation programs;

11 (2) condition each grant on assurance of match-
12 ing funds either from State or local governmental
13 sources or from private sources, or from both, com-
14 bined to total not less than 50 percent of the
15 amount of Federal funds to be provided by such
16 grant; and

17 (3) be established in coordination with the
18 United States Holocaust Memorial Council estab-
19 lished under chapter 23 of title 36, United States
20 Code.

21 (c) REPORTS TO CONGRESS.—The Secretary of Edu-
22 cation shall submit to the Congress a report detailing the
23 criteria used in administering the grant program in sub-
24 section (a) and listing program expenditures and grant
25 amounts and recipients. Such report shall be submitted

1 not later than 180 days after the date on which funds
2 are appropriated to carry out this Act and twice annually
3 thereafter for the duration of the program.

4 (d) DEFINITIONS.—In this Act:

5 (1) The term “Holocaust” means the historical
6 event described in section 2(1).

7 (2) The term “Holocaust education program”
8 means a program which encourages and promotes
9 awareness and historical accuracy about the Holo-
10 caust in public and private schools, community
11 groups, State and local governments, and other or-
12 ganizations.

13 (e) REGULATIONS AUTHORIZED.—The Secretary of
14 Education may establish regulations to carry out this Act.

15 **SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

16 There is authorized to be appropriated to carry out
17 this Act \$3,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2004 through
18 2008, to remain available until expended.

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
