Mr. Taylor of North Carolina introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

A BILL

To ensure that a flag is furnished to drape the casket of each public safety officer killed in the line of duty.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Public Safety Officers
- 5 Flag Act''.
- 6 SEC. 2. FLAG FURNISHED FOR PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICERS
- 7 KILLED IN THE LINE OF DUTY.
- 8 (a) In General.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-
- 9 rity shall furnish a flag to drape the casket of each public
- 10 safety officer killed in the line of duty.

- 1 (b) Furnishing After Burial.—After the burial
- 2 of such a public safety officer, the flag so furnished shall
- 3 be given to the officer's next of kin. If no claim is made
- 4 for the flag by the next of kin, it may be given, upon re-
- 5 quest, to a close friend or associate of the deceased officer.
- 6 If a flag is given to a close friend or associate of the de-
- 7 ceased officer, no flag shall be given to any other person
- 8 on account of the death of such officer.
- 9 (c) Definition.—In this section, the term "public
- 10 safety officer" means an individual serving a public agency
- 11 in an official capacity, with or without compensation, as
- 12 a law enforcement officer, as a firefighter, or as a member
- 13 of a rescue squad or ambulance crew.
