A BILL

To amend title 49, United States Code, to exempt airports in economically depressed communities from matching grant obligations under the airport improvement program.

- 3 SECTION 1. INCREASED UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT
- 4 SHARE OF AIRPORT IMPROVEMENT PRO-

- 6 Section 47109 of title 49, United States Code, is
- 7 amended—

1	(1) in subsection (a) by striking "subsection
2	(b)" and inserting "subsections (b) and (d)"; and
3	(2) by adding at the end the following:
4	"(d) Special Rule for Economically De-
5	PRESSED COMMUNITIES.—
6	"(1) IN GENERAL.—The United States Govern-
7	ment's share of allowable project costs is 100 per-
8	cent for a project at an airport that is located in a
9	community that, at the time a project grant applica-
10	tion is submitted under section 47105, is an eco-
11	nomically depressed community.
12	"(2) Economically depressed community
13	DEFINED.—In this section, the term 'economically
14	depressed community' means a unit of local govern-
15	ment that the Secretary of Transportation deter-
16	mines has—
17	"(A) an unemployment rate that is, for the
18	most recent 24-month period for which data are
19	available, at least 1 percent greater than the
20	national average unemployment rate;
21	"(B) per capita income that is, for the
22	most recent period for which data are available,
23	80 percent or less of the national average per
24	capita income; or

1	"(C) a special need arising from actual or
2	threatened severe unemployment or economic
3	adjustment problems resulting from severe
4	short-term or long-term changes in economic
5	conditions, such as—
6	"(i) substantial outmigration or popu-
7	lation loss;
8	"(ii) underemployment;
9	"(iii) military base closures or realign-
10	ments, defense contractor reductions-in-
11	force, or Department of Energy defense-re-
12	lated funding reductions;
13	"(iv) natural or other major disasters
14	or emergencies;
15	"(v) extraordinary depletion of nat-
16	ural resources;
17	"(vi) closure or restructuring of in-
18	dustrial firms essential to area economies;
19	and
20	"(vii) destructive impacts of foreign
21	trade.".

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
