A BILL

To amend the Older Americans Act of 1965 to provide information and outreach for the prevention of osteoporosis.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Osteoporosis Edu-
- 5 cation and Prevention Act of 2004".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress finds the following:

- 1 (1) Osteoporosis is a major public health prob-2 lem affecting 44,000,000 Americans: 10,000,000 3 who already have the disease and 34,000,000 more 4 who have low bone mass placing them at risk for 5 fractures.
 - (2) Although there is currently no cure for osteoporosis, it is preventable in most cases if proper steps are taken to preserve bone mass as an individual ages.
 - (3) Osteoporosis is a silent disease that often is not discovered until a fracture occurs. One out of two women and one out of four men over age 50 will have an osteoporosis-related fracture in their lifetimes.
 - (4) While both men and women may develop osteoporosis, 80 percent of the individuals who develop the disease are women. Most adult women are not aware of their personal risk factors for osteoporosis. A woman's risk hip fracture is equal to her combined risk of breast, uterine, and ovarian cancer.
 - (5) Osteoporosis is responsible for more than 1,500,000 fractures annually, including over 300,000 hip fractures, approximately 700,000

- vertebral fractures, 250,000 wrist fractures, and 300,000 other fractures.
- 3 (6) The estimated nationwide medical costs di-
- 4 rectly attributable to osteoporosis-related treatment
- 5 was \$17,000,000,000 in 2001—\$47,000,000 each
- 6 day—and the cost is rising. Much of this cost might
- 7 be avoidable with proper education about prevention,
- 8 diagnosis, and treatment of osteoporosis.

9 SEC. 3. NATIONAL PUBLIC AWARENESS CAMPAIGN.

- The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall
- 11 carry out a national campaign to increase awareness and
- 12 knowledge with respect to osteoporosis. As part of such
- 13 campaign, the Secretary shall provide public service an-
- 14 nouncements, in accordance with applicable law and regu-
- 15 lations, by developing and placing in telecommunications
- 16 media announcements intended to encourage at-risk popu-
- 17 lations to discuss their risks of osteoporosis with their phy-
- 18 sicians, and to call attention to early warning signs and
- 19 risks factors based on the best available medical informa-
- 20 tion.

21 SEC. 4. AMENDMENT.

- Section 202 of the Older Americans Act of 1995 (42)
- 23 U.S.C. 3012) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
- 24 lowing:

- 1 "(g)(1) The Assistant Secretary shall carry out an
- 2 osteoporosis prevention demonstration program by making
- 3 grants to public and private nonprofit agencies, organiza-
- 4 tions, and institutions for purposes of—
- 5 "(A) determining the best practices for pro-
- 6 viding information and outreach services (including
- 7 programs and information, such as forums, semi-
- 8 nars, and large-print, easy-to-understand, multi-
- 9 lingual literature) relating to prevention, diagnosis,
- and treatment of osteoporosis; and
- 11 "(B) measuring the effectiveness of such pro-
- gram over a 3-year-period, as shown by an increase
- in the percentages of individuals who have dem-
- onstrated expanded awareness and knowledge of
- osteoporosis (including knowledge of personal risk
- 16 factors).
- 17 "(2) In carrying out such program, the Assistant Sec-
- 18 retary shall collaborate with the leading nonprofit health
- 19 organization, as well as other health entities, with a mis-
- 20 sion both to promote lifelong bone health nationwide and
- 21 to provide outreach to State and local governments and
- 22 communities, for the purpose of determining the best prac-
- 23 tices for providing bone-health information and outreach
- 24 services to at-risk populations.

- 1 "(3) The Assistant Secretary shall include in the an-
- 2 nual report required by section 207(a) to be submitted by
- 3 the Assistant Secretary, a description of the program car-
- 4 ried out under paragraph (1) and of the collaboration pro-

5 vided under paragraph (2).".

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
